S'side Co-operative Ass'n Organized Yesterday

The Summerside Co-operative Association Ltd. was formally organized at a meeting held in the Summerside High School auditorium yesterday afternoon attended by about 70 men, mostly from the surrounding rural area.

A board of twelve directors was elected and at a meeting of the board following the general meeting Mr. Brenton Clark of Summerside was appointed president. Mr. Reuben Large of Wilmet Valley is the vice president and Mr. Harold Rodd, Summerside, secretary-treasurer.

Other members of the board of directors are: Kenneth MacLean, Lot 16; Victor Inman, St. Eleonors; Edmund Gallant, Miscouche; Harry Linkletter, Linkletter; Joseph Martin, Read's Corner; Allison Proffitt, Freetown; James Tuplin, New Annan; Edward Gillis, Summerside; Eric Madson, Sherbrooke.

Mr. Charles Yeo of Summerside acted as chairman of the meeting and reports of the canvassing were received from various members. The reports were not conclusive as the canvass was not complete but a great deal of interest in the movement was reported and no difficulty in securing sufficient share and loan capital was anticipated.

The proposed by-laws were read by Mr. J. G. Dennis, supervisor of cooperatives and Mr. Leo Corcoran, assistant supervisor, and approved by the meeting. The authorized share capital was set at \$100,000.00 consisting of 4,000 shares at a par value of \$25.00. The minimum down payment on a share is to be \$5.00 and the balance must be paid within the fiscal year.

It was decided that the maximum number of shares to be held by any one member will be forty and the interest to be paid on share and loan capital will not be more than five per cent.

Mr. Dennis advised the meeting that it will be necessary to raise \$15,000.00 to start operations. Mr. Harry Linkletter of Linkletter Road reported that shares to the value of \$1,425.00 had been subscribed in his school district, which was considered to be very good, but when reports from other districts showed that the personal canvass was only partially completed he suggested that it might be well not to organize until a thorough canvass had been made.

Mr. Dennis suggested that it would be better to organize now and if sufficient money was not forthcoming the charter could be turned in. The meeting then unanimously decided to proceed with the organization.—S
