**UNION WITH NEWFOUNDLAND**

Mr. MARTIN, M. P., brought up, in the House of Commons, a few days ago, the question of the admission of Newfoundland to the Canadian confederation. His speech, judged by the reports of the newspapers, was a statesmanlike presentation of the case. He briefly reviewed the original Confederation system, of which Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper were the master builders, and pointed out that by the addition of Newfoundland 162,200 square miles of territory—an area nearly as large as that of France—would be added to Canada which already comprises about a third of the immense extent of the British Empire. He showed that the union of Newfoundland and Canada would be, in many respects advantageous to Canada, and he quoted from Berkles Wilson, showing how advantageous it would be to Newfoundland. He quoted Sir Charles Tupper as having told Sir John Macdonald that he had always regarded the entrance of Newfoundland into Confederation as of the utmost importance, but did not desire to see it come in except with the free consent of the people. He pointed out that, under existing conditions, our trade with Newfoundland is decreasing and showed that the union of Newfoundland and Canada would be mutually beneficial as Newfoundland would get food stuffs free of duty, while Canada could get fish from Newfoundland. Mr. Martin's peroration in praise of Canada and her institutions was really eloquent. It is, indeed, pleasing to know that, while advocating and pressing forward all measures beneficial to this Province, Mr. Martin is taking a leading part in the discussion of great national questions.

—The Montreal Gazette thinks it irregular to charge Mr. Tarte's holiday expenses to repairs of piers in P. E. Island. It adds, "There is nothing that pleases a happy people so much as to see their masters enjoying themselves, and because of this the happy people would like to pay for a good time as a good time and not under the degrading alias of a patch on a pier."

—Judging by the reports of the House of Commons at Ottawa, one thing is certain, and that is that the Government is not prepared to go on with the business of the country.

**TAXES KEPT UP.**

The Liberals have let slip another excellent opportunity to fulfil their promise to lower the rate of taxation. Mr. Fielding estimates a revenue of upwards of \$50,000,000, and a clear surplus of \$7,500,000. Yet the rate of taxation is practically as high as ever. The reduction, after the 1st of July, of another third from the rate levied upon British goods will not relieve the taxpayer in the slightest degree; for the reduction is so trifling that merchants will not be able to take anything from the prices of the goods, as sold at retail. Canadian manufactures of beet root sugar will have additional protection in the admission of their machinery free of duty. But the ordinary taxpayer will not be affected in any way by the change. The tariff is only a little more protective than it was last year. From the free trader's point of view, this will not be regarded as an improvement; and many of our farmers must continue to be bitterly disappointed on account of the failure of the Liberals for whom they voted to reduce taxation and prices.

**CONSPIRACY ALLEGED**

The Montreal Times states that "it is probable that, in the not very distant future some new light will be thrown on the charges brought against Warden Forster of the Dorchester penitentiary and the investigation thereof. For over three years before accomplishing their object, which was his dismissal, the Grits of Dorchester pursued Warden Forster with the malignity of fiends incarnate. The so-called investigating commission, which was accompanied by revels of drunkenness and licentiousness, the equal of which has seldom been witnessed at the shiretown, lasted for six months and cost in the vicinity of four or five thousand dollars, and the evidence as submitted to the Minister of Justice, was largely made up of perjured statements. As a result of facts that have come to his knowledge it is understood that Mr. Forster has instructed his solicitors to bring an action against a prominent Dorchester Liberal for conspiracy. The evidence in this case when given, it is said, will cause a sensation in the country, involving, as it will, men occupying high places in church and state, including the president of the conference of a large religious denomination." The Times publishes some of the facts which show that Mr. Forster is guiltless of the charges trumped up by his accusers. Mr. Forster has many friends in Prince Edward Island who will be glad to learn that steps are being taken for the vindication of his honor.
