Mints are always popular. Here is a recipe that can be used as the salad course or just right for a light dessert. Minted Orange Salad — 1 tablespoon gelatin, ¼ cup cold water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, ¼ cups not water, ¼ cup after dinner mints, 1 cup heavy cream, ¼ cup walnuts (chopped) 2 cups fresh orange chunks. Method — Soften gelatin in cold water. Add hot water and dissolve. Add lemon juice. Chill until slightly thicker than unbeaten egg whites. Whip cream after dinner mints. Be gelatin until light and fluffy. Fold in whipped cream mints, walnut (or pecans) and orange chunks. Pour into six individual molds. Chill. Serve as dessert or salad.
