

White Sox Defeat Boston Redlegs Lose Brooks Win

CHICAGO (AP)—Billy Pierce, the major league's winningest pitcher, hurled the league-leading Chicago White Sox to a 10-inning 1-0 victory over Boston Red Sox Tuesday night before a crowd of 36,490.

Nellie Fox' bases-loaded single with one out in the 10th inning brought home rookie Jim Landis with the game's only run and enabled the White Sox to maintain their five-game lead over New York Yankees who whipped Cleveland 7-4.

Pierce was near perfect in posting his ninth victory of the season against two losses. He allowed but two hits—a leadoff double to Billy Klaus in the third and a leadoff single to Nob Zuchin in the eighth.

The little lefthander now was at least one victory over every other team in the league.

Reliever Leo Delock, who came on in the eighth inning after starter Dean Stone developed a blister on his pitching hand, suffered the loss, his fifth in eight decisions.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Dee Fondy, the red-hot hitting Pittsburgh Pirate first baseman who is leading the National League in batting average to .375 Tuesday night, with three singles in five chances. His final hit drove in the winning run in the eighth inning for two runs in the eighth inning to nip St. Louis Cardinals 5-4 and extend the Pirate winning streak to four games, longest of the season for them.

The Pirates out-hit the Cards 16 to 9 and left 12 base runners stranded.

Sta Musial, the No. 2 National League batter who had a .359 average going into the game, had one hit in an official trip. It was a two-run homer in the fourth his 10th circuit blast of the year and the 362nd of his major league career. It moved him into the No. 7 position among the all-time home run leaders. He had been tied with Joe Di Maggio.

Koufax had no-hit the Bruins for five frames and fanned 12 to take over the National League strikeout lead.

A two-run homer by Bob Speake broke up Koufax' no-hitter in the sixth and a three-run homer by Ernie Banks started Sandy on his way out in the eighth.

CLEVELAND (AP)—New York Yankees rapped out 12 hits, including a home run by Hank Bauer, and defeated Cleveland Indians here Tuesday night, 7-4. Tom Sturdivant posted his fourth win of the season.

Bud Daley, making his first start against the Yankees, was knocked out of the box in the first inning and was charged with the loss, his fourth against one victim.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Clem Labine had to come on for a 1-13 inning mop up job Tuesday night for a 7-5 Brooklyn victory over Chicago Cubs after two home runs had shelled young Sandy Doufax.

We Are Not Interested In Free Riders Says Joe Dey

NEW YORK (AP)—Joe Dey, executive director of the United States Golf Association, answered criticism of the association's national open qualifying practices Tuesday with the comment: "We are not interested in free riders. We are interested in determining a true champion on current ability. A man good enough to play in the open should be good enough to qualify in his own section."

Dey's informal statement came after veteran Jimmy Demaret, with some fellow pro echoing his sentiments, had levelled a blast at the USGA for making Sam Snead and other established pros qualify for the open.

Demaret, 47, a three-time Masters champion and a leading money winner this year, termed the USGA's procedure "stupid" and "ridiculous," adding: "Making Sam Snead qualify is like making Caruso audition for the Metropolitan Opera. Sam has won more than 100 tournaments. What does a guy have to do to prove he's worth of playing the open?"

Claude Harmon, another Masters champion, joined Demaret in the criticism and also in the suggestion that some day the pros might boycott the blue ribbon tournament.

"If 15 or 16 top pros decided not to play in it, the open would suffer," Harmon said. "The USGA should establish an automatic qualification list based on performance of the past two years."

Gene Sarazen, who along with Snead and Demaret qualified for the tournament in which he first played in 1920, said: "It is a blow at a man's dignity. If I ever imagined I was a golfer of any stature, it was erased by having to qualify against a bunch of 90 shooters."

Stadium Plans Are Abandoned

MONTREAL (CP)—Plans to build a 40,000-seat stadium on University of Montreal property have been abandoned.

Leo Dandurand, president of the Montreal Alouettes and representative of a group which was considering construction of the stadium because of a lack of parking space.

"After studying the terrain, our engineers decided there would be no parking room for only about 850 cars," Dandurand said. "That's not enough."

University officials had offered the property to Dandurand's group in exchange for the stadium, which would have been leased back to the builders for 99 years at nominal fee.

Dandurand said his group is still interested in building a stadium "but we can't do anything unless we find the right piece of property."

Red Top Davis Beats Howard

HALIFAX (CP)—Teddy (Red Top) Davis, 142, of New York City battered Canadian lightweight champion Richte (Kid) Howard, 140, of Halifax in a technical knockout at 2:46 of the eighth in a 10-round boxing bout here Tuesday.

Davis knocked Howard down with a sharp left hook for an eight count midway through the eighth. Howard rose, fell into the ropes, and Davis went after him with a hard two-fisted attack. He had stepped away from the reeling champion when the referee stopped the bout.

Howard's title was not at stake. In the first round, a steaming left hook put Howard on the canvas for eight seconds. In the seventh, both were hurt in an exchange of heavy body blows.

Howard had an edge on points until the eighth. He forced the fight, landing more punches, mostly in the predominant infighting. Davis, however, threw booming counter-punches and seemed to be taking his time and stalking Howard for the kill.

Howard won two of three decisions from Davis in earlier matches. It was Howard's fourth loss in a row.

He dropped two decisions to British Empire lightweight champion Willie Towel in South Africa last fall and another here to Arthur Persley of Red Cross, La., in May.

Davis lost a decision to Felix Chicoa in Paris in his last encounter.

In a second 10-round bout, Jerry Fraser, 156, Bridgewater, N.S., pounded out an unanimous decision.

Edouard Carpentier Beats Gallagher; Geohagen Wins

Edouard Carpentier won two straight falls against "Doc" Gallagher before a crowd of about 1,000 wildly cheering fans at Summerside Civic Stadium last night. In the course of the match Carpentier went through most of the acrobatic stunts which have made him famous on this continent. His first fall was won, however, on a disqualification of Gallagher. At the 14:56 mark. The second go saw the action speeded up considerably, and after a series of punishing neck twists by Carpentier, and a lot of fierce slugging on the part of both wrestlers, the boy from Paris nailed Gallagher on the press after flipping over Doc's body pin with one of his sensational manoeuvres. The time was 26:10.

Mike Gallagher won over Len "Marvel" Hughes in 16:25 getting an assist from brother "Doc" who forsook his spectator role long enough to pull the legs from under Hughes. Timothy Geohagen used his famous "Sleeper" hold to dispose of Gypsy Joe after over 17 minutes of gruelling wrestling, much of it of the illegal variety. Fred Hayter of Halifax was the referee.

Braves Going To Try To Buy Hits

MILWAUKEE (AP)—There is a quip saying in the baseball business that sometimes you can't buy a hit, but Milwaukee Braves apparently are going to give it another try.

During the last 10 days, the Braves have had seven in owner Lou Perini's best striped pants for something like \$200,000 to obtain the services of two players whose combined batting average is upwards of .500 to date.

Bob Taylor, the 15-year-old high school whiz from Metropolis, Ill., joined the club Tuesday night at New York. The way was cleared earlier in the day when the Braves, hit "well over 700," according to reports from his home town, hit Taylor and hit 18 home runs in 14 games.

Johnny De Merit, like Taylor a righthander, is a 23-year-old outfielder who was just elected the University of Wisconsin's most valuable player as a Junior.

Both players are expected to be in Milwaukee this season, Johnny batted .382.

He worked out briefly with the club Sunday, returned to the university to write examinations this week and will join the club about June 16.

The return to the bonus market by the Braves comes after other National League clubs have expressed an understandable reluctance to present Milwaukee—and thus possibly a pennant.

Crepello Head Horse In Betting For Race

EPSOM, Surrey (CP)—Having resisted Sundry equine ailments and a variety of racetrack rumors the British colt Crepello today faces an even sterner task—delivering the goods in the 178th Derby.

Head horse in the betting since early spring, the handsome chestnut son of Donatello II-Crepescule takes on a field of 20 three-year-olds in Britain's premier race. Despite the confidence shown by big-money backers, Crepello faces two big hazards.

He has never run more than a mile. The derby is 1 1/2 miles, with a long homestretch and a testing, uphill finish. Non-stayers never win the race.

As a Two Thousand Guineas winner, Crepello has a hoodoo to beat. Since the First World War, only five horses—Manna, Gammeronia, Bahram, Blue Peter and Nimsch—have achieved the guinea-derby double. Difference of track and distance may be the reason.

NOT SINCE 1951
It hasn't happened since Nimbus pulled it off in 1951.

Such warnings hold little interest for the fans, who at one time threatened to make Crepello one of the hottest favorites in derby history. Their single-minded interest in Crepello made the market
