Household Hints.

The following is an excellent receipt for

a little grated nutmeg. When well mixed
add three eggs beaten up with a teaspoonful
of cream. When well mixed a teaspoonful
of carbonate soda, beat the mixture well, nearly
fill some small patty pans well buttered,
sprinkle a little sugar over, and bake it in
the oven for about twenty minutes.
