You don't expect any real treasure—just husks and crumbs at most, and you starkly suppose that it's necessary to sneak and connive, and forfeit all pride, to put yourself in line for even that little.

NOBODY WINS Actually, by prevalent standards of successful womanhood, a girl in her mid-30s is comparatively young, with her future more or less what she works to make it—if she is generously endowed with common sense. Thus in your case it is unrealistic to imagine that your potentially fruitful years are gone, that you've nothing much left to lose, etc., and therefore may as well play a philanderer's game, just on the chance that you might win him.

SALAD DRESSING

3/4 cup white sugar, 1 tsp. salt, 3 eggs, 3/4 cup cider vinegar, with small quantity of sweet milk added, 1 heaping tsp. dry mustard, 1 tsp. butter, Mix sugar, flour, mustard and salt together. Add vinegar and milk, and beaten egg yolks, and cook in double boiler until mixture thickens. Before using dress, thin with a small amount of cream or milk.

Indian carpets, like Persian carpets, are woven by hand in the same fashion as in ancient centuries.

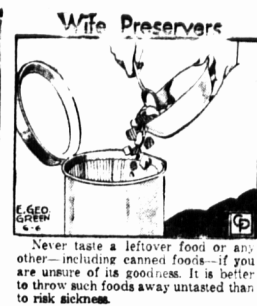

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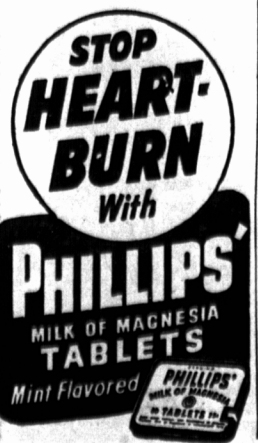
