Montague Shipping.

The Sudbury Nickel Belt.

A correspondent of the Scientific American describes the deposits at Sudbury as follows:

'The Sudbury Nickel Belt, as it is called, was discovered about six years ago, during the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway through the district. But for two or three years afterwards very little development work was done, as it was supposed at first that the ore deposits were copper. The range so far as explored is over fifty miles long, and from three to ten miles wide, running from Lake Wabigoon to the Spanish River, in a northeast and southwest course.

The Birchall Case.

At the execution, Birchall would not wear a starched collar because he said it might interfere with the placing of the rope. Thomas Radcliffe, Birchall's executioner, is steward of Sunnyside Boating Club, Toronto, and has already officiated at nine executions in Canada, and will officiate at the hanging of Arthur Day, Remi Lamontagne, and P. H. Morin, at Welland, Sherbrook and Montmagny, respectively. He is applicant for the position of official hangman in Canada. He has been offered \$10 per foot for the rope used to hang Birchall, and has received an offer from a big museum in London for the dead man's clothes, which according to law become the property of the hangman.
