—Henry Clews says that “the anxiety about gold shipments is now entirely removed owing to the plethoric condition of the money market. If the Bank of England should want our gold now and will pay high enough for it, we can very readily part with \$20,000,000 or more without any discomfort.”

—The Americans, ever on the alert for new outlets for their energies, have determined to “carry coals to Newcastle” by supplying the European market with black diamonds in competition with the British, the Belgians, and the Germans. A steamship has just left Philadelphia for Genoa. This constitutes the first shipment of coal from America to Italy. But it will not be the last.

—A bill before the Legislature of Colorado interdicts marriage without a medical certificate from a state board of physicians, that the man is not less than twenty-five years old, the woman not less than twenty-two, and that both are free from dipsomania, organic or true insanity, hereditary insanity, tuberculosis of the lungs or other vital organs, hereditary asthma, scrofula or epilepsy. It is probable that the bill will pass.

For the sake of one of our young women, the gallant little power was prepared alone to fight the oppressor whom the concerted powers would not undertake to coerce when he was deluging Armenia with blood. Mr. Richard Power erected a handsome dwelling house during the past summer.

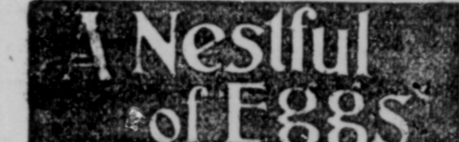
The farmers here are contemplating the erection of a cheese factory.

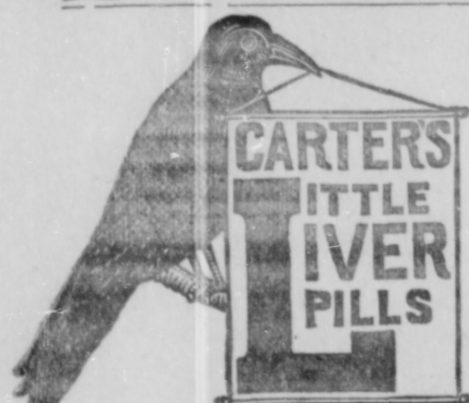

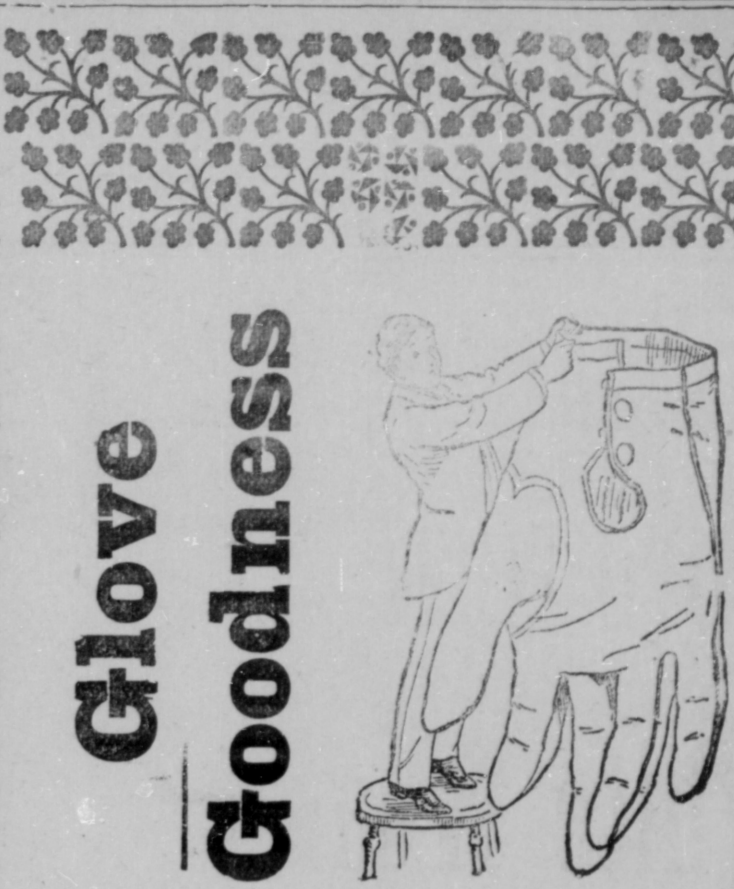

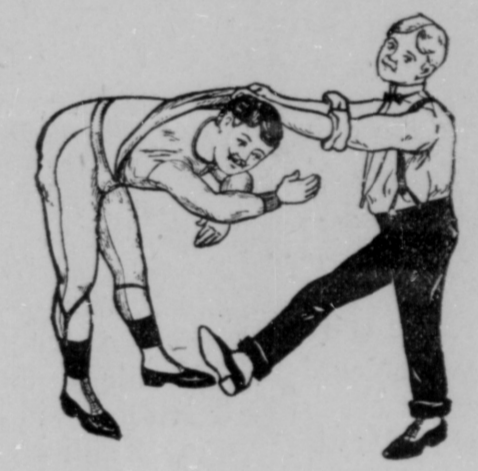
