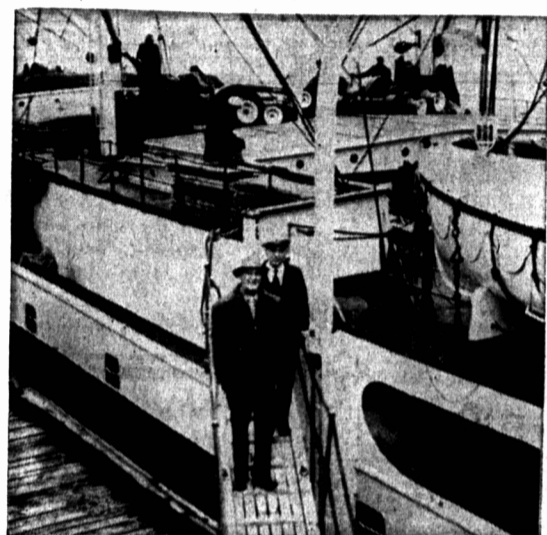




LOADS AT GEORGETOWN FOR FLORIDA
