WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials have indicated they would not object if Congolese Premier Moise Tshombe sends his former Katanga Information director, Michel Streulens, here as an adviser and personal representative.

The Congolese embassy had no official word of the move and the state department offered no immediate welcome to Streulens, who now is director-general of the International Institute for African Affairs at the University of Sherbrooke, in Sherbrooke, Que.

Streulens, 36, was reported on his way here from Leopoldville to confer with U.S. officials next week.

One year ago, the former Belgian civil servant left the United States voluntarily and moved to Canada after difficulties were raised on his visa to the United States. This raised a U.S. move to have him expelled from the country.

The U.S. attitude has changed since Tshombe became premier of the Congo.

State Secretary Dean Rusk has said that in occupying a key post in the central government of the Congo, Tshombe's purpose now is to keep his country unified and the United States is supporting him in that effort.

AGREEMENT NOT NEEDED

Inasmuch as Streulens would be serving in a personal capacity for the Congolese leader, there would be no outward questions of an agreement to his appointment here, such as is normally posed for new ambassadors. The Congolese embassy in Washington now is headed by Counsellor Joseph Pongo, serving as charge d'affaires.

State department officials confirm that Streulens saw McGeorge Bundy, special assistant to the president on national security affairs, and Averell Harriman, undersecretary of state for political affairs, here last July 21.

Streulens now has been given a multiple entry visa which permits him to enter or leave the United States at will.

As far as his role is concerned, state department officials said that it would be a responsibility of the Congolese government to decide whether he should serve as an adviser or special representative of Tshombe at the Congolese embassy or at the United Nations.

SEMINOLES IN FLORIDA WILL SLICE HUGE CAKE

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — The U.S. government has agreed to pay the Seminole Indians for most of Florida, where whites graded their lands more than a century ago. Millions of dollars may be involved.

But William McKinley Ocoala said he couldn't care less.

"All we want is to be left alone," said the 78-year-old patriarch of a Seminole faction called the Everglades Mikaski tribe.

Now receptive was Rev. Billy Ocoala, late president of William McKinley Ocoala and in effect chief of all Seminole.

"I only regret that it may be our money," said the 43-year-old Baptist minister who is chairman of the Seminole Tribal Council.

Involvement is a recent Indian claims commission ruling the Seminoles are entitled to reimbursement for \$2,000,000 acres of land taken from them "by military force." That includes all Florida's 50,000,000 acres except the northern extreme.

Effie Knowles, counsel for the Seminoles, said the next step will be for the government and the tribe to name appraisers to determine how much the Indians will get.

Should it be determined that the land was worth, say 50 cents an acre, when it was seized, a \$16,000,000 figure would emerge. This arithmetic indicates the government would give about \$3,000 to each Seminole. Sixteen in the award are 1,300 Seminoles in Florida and 1,500 in Oklahoma.

But in the Everglades Mikaski village, spokesmen said subtraction also figures in the mathematics.

"When a tribe, like Oklahoma, won a similar claim, each Indian got a check for eight cents after government deductions," said Howard Ocoala, co-chairman of the 150-member group's tribal council. He didn't know what tribe.

Poverty Of 35 Million Seen Great Challenge To U.S.A.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (Dem. Minn.) writes in a book to be published today that the United States faces one of its greatest challenges in lifting \$3,000,000 of its citizens out of poverty.

The book called War on Poverty bears the endorsement of President Johnson.

Humphrey writes:

"Why among the industrialized nations of the world does America, the richest nation in the world, have one of the highest rates of unemployment and the least security for its elderly?"

"How can we continue to keep \$3,000,000 of our fellows beyond the boundaries of even a minimum existence?"

Humphrey has several ideas for fighting poverty.

He proposes a domestic investment bank to set up operations on the same principles as the successful world bank and "more than half of its capital from the federal government."

This bank could make the kind of massive investment needed to rehabilitate the many depressed U.S. communities.

In order to meet the needs of persons entering the labor force and to reemploy those whose jobs might be eliminated by automation, it will be necessary to provide 300,000 additional jobs each month from now until 1970.

"The almost overwhelming task of finding jobs may well force us into solutions that tend to spread the available work around," he says.

"One of these is the 35-hour (or less) week."

Khrushchev Pledges Aid To Peace

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Soviet Premier Khrushchev has pledged himself to spare no effort to get rid of international tension and consolidate universal peace.

He said the conclusion of the Moscow partial nuclear test-ban treaty fostered the easing of international tension, but countries most not rest content with what has been achieved.

New steps to reduce tension should be possible because of the international confidence built up since the treaty was signed a year ago.

Agreements in "various international spheres" should be possible. He did not elaborate.

Khrushchev was answering questions from the Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda and the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia timed for the first anniversary of the test-ban treaty. The treaty was signed in Moscow Aug. 5, 1963.

The last year had "enriched international life with new experiences," and the confidence existing now should allow actions to move toward further relaxation of tension and to new agreements.

He called for the "peaceful normalization" of the German problem. Without this, it would be difficult to make a start at general and complete disarmament.

He also urged conclusion of an international agreement to outlaw the use of force in settling territorial and border disputes.

It is necessary to liquidate "hotbeds of tension" existing in the Caribbean, Southeast Asia, Cyprus and the Arabias Peninsula, he added.

Wheat Deal With Russia Nears Finish

MONTREAL (CP) — The final shipments competing Canada's big wheat deal with Russia have cleared the St. Lawrence River by the middle of this month.

Ray Corbett, general manager of the March Shipping Agency, said the gigantic operation to deliver 228,000,000 bushels of wheat to Russia now is well into the mopping-up stage.

Two of the last five shipments to arrive in the 26,000,000 wheat deal are waiting to be loaded at St. Lawrence River ports.

The Carleton is loading flour in Montreal and the Polymint is expected to clear the river taking on wheat in Quebec City within the next few days.

Due to arrive Wednesday at Sorel, 40 miles downstream from Montreal, is the charter train vessel Maxwell Hill. The Wellingham Hill is expected to enter the St. Lawrence Saturday with the Maple Hill and Opus for the last load a few days later.

Shipments to Russia started last September.
