A wage increase of 7 1/2 percent, retroactive to July 1, 1953, recommended by an arbitration board to be paid to telephone craft employees comprising Union Local No. 181 in this Province, has been confirmed by the Public Utilities Commission in a lengthy decision released yesterday.

Mayor J. David Stewart was re-elected for another term when he won from former Councillor M. Alban Farmer by a majority of over 200 votes. Three newcomers to the Council were elected and five members of the last Council were re-elected.

The Water Commissioners elected were H. Roy Bevan, re-elected; W. L. MacKenzie and E. E. Clawson.

Alan MacDonald and Ian Gillies of Saint Dunstan's University won the unanimous decision of the Judges in a debate with a team from Dalhousie University in Halifax last night.

The resolution, "Resolved that Communistic activities in Canada be made a criminal offence" was supported by the Saint Dunstan's team. This win means that should no other college in the Maritimes have three wins to their credit at the end of the debating year, Saint Dunstan's will be declared the Maritime debating champions for 1954.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. J. J. MacGILLIVRAY

The death occurred unexpectedly at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Montreal on Dec. 14, of Mrs. Annie MacGillivray, widow of the late J. J. MacGillivray of Blooming Point, in her 72nd year.

Mrs. MacGillivray was born at Allisay, P.E.I., the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alexander MacDonald. She married Mr. J. J. MacGillivray and settled in Blooming Point, where she resided until several years ago when she moved to Montreal to be with her son, Victor, who was severely wounded in France during the second world war.

Although she had been in failing health for some time and was under the doctor's care, her condition was not considered serious until shortly before her death. She was rushed to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, but despite all that medical science and loving care could do, she weakened rapidly and on Dec. 14, fortified by the last rites of the Catholic Church she passed peacefully away.

She leaves to mourn the loss of a loving and devoted mother three sons: Donald in Charlottetown, Vincent in Ottawa, and Victor in Montreal; also two daughters: Mary, Mrs. Joseph Baldwin, Baldwin's Road, P.E.I., and Rita, Mrs. H. Connolly, Montreal. Also surviving are: one sister, Mrs. Joseph Barrett, Mount Stewart and one brother John MacDonalld, Allisay.

The funeral, largely attended was held Dec. 19, to St. Bonaventure's church, Tracadie Cross, P.E.I., where requiem mass was celebrated by the Pastor Rev. Kenneth MacMillan. The services at the grave were conducted by Rev. Edwin Steele. Interment was in the family plot beside her husband who predeceased her 18 years ago.
