Branch President Addresses Committee

SUMMERSIDE — Charles Linkletter, president of the Summerside Red Cross branch stated last night at the conclusion of the weekly meeting of the newly established Red Cross blood donor committee for Summerside that last minute details are being ironed out in connection with full-scale preparations for the two days of blood donor clinics to be held at the George R. Peakes Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion in Summerside on Monday and Tuesday, June 6th and 7th.

Edgar Moose, who represents the Summerside Junior Chamber of Commerce, is the chairman of the Summerside blood donor committee which is composed of appointees from the Rotary, Y's Men's, and Lions Clubs as well as of the J.C.'s. These clubs will alternate in providing the leadership for this committee as they do for the annual Lobster Carnival at Summerside.

A morning clinic on Tuesday, June 7th from 9 to 10 will be an added feature of the two days of clinics at Summerside for which the total objective is at least 600 donors. As in former years, there will be afternoon and evening clinics on Monday and Tuesday, June 6th and 7th, between 2 and 4 and 7 and 9, as well as the extra clinic on Tuesday morning from 9 to 10. The early morning hour was chosen for the convenience of bankers and other employees of business firms, homemakers and farmers, who might find it easier to report at that hour than later in the day.

Edgar Moose, the chairman, explained that the full complement of 60 donors per hour at the morning and both afternoon clinics, as well as 75 per hour for both evening clinics, must be maintained in order that Summerside and the surrounding area meet its quota of 600 donors and insure that a sufficient supply of blood will be on hand to meet the day to day demands of patients in this province's hospitals during the next ten days. The Red Cross blood program in both provinces is a co-operative one with Nova Scotians providing the blood throughout the year for all but the five weeks during which clinics are held in this province when Prince Edward Islanders make blood available for Nova Scotians.

Country, Western Show Set For Here Thursday

Country and Western music fans on Prince Edward Island will be treated to their third personal appearance show within a period of a month when Kitty Wells, Wilf Carter and company come to the Coliseum in Charlottetown Thursday night, June 2 at 8:30. The company includes recording stars Johnny Wright and his Tennessee Mountain Boys, Ruby Wright and Bill Phillips.

Highlighting the evening performance will be the "Queen of Country Music" since 1952 Kitty Wells and the "Dean of Country Music" Wilf Carter. Wilf Carter, a Canadian, was born in Guysborough, Nova Scotia.

Kitty Wells started on her career at the age of 15 and her first engagements were made on the Johnny and Jack Show. From there she went into recording her big hit "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels." This recording carried her to the top of the field and in the same year she joined the world famous Grand Ole Opry.

Appearing with her will be her husband Johnny Wright, the Johnny of Johnny and Jack, and her daughter Ruby Wright.

Also appearing in the show will be Bill Phillips a native of Canton, North Carolina. Mr. Phillips, a singer and composer, has appeared on television, sung on radio, made recordings and has appeared on Johnny Wright and Kitty Wells Shows. His first big composition, "The Ball of the Coward," was recorded as "Falling Back to You," recorded by Webb Pierce. Other well known songs recorded by him include "Sawmill," "Georgia Town Blues" and "The Blues Are Settlin' In."

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Ontario's Premier Supports Direct Foreign Investment

NORTH BAY, Ont. (CP)—Premier Robarts of Ontario supported Tuesday night more direct foreign investment in Canada.

In a speech to the Ontario Chamber of Commerce, he spoke of the contribution of foreign direct investment in Canada.

The premier's speech appeared to be a rebuttal to the campaign of Walter Gordon, former Liberal finance minister, to curb foreign control of the Canadian economy.

Mr. Gordon was not mentioned by name, but Mr. Robarts, a Progressive Conservative, referred to the "great debate" about foreign investment.

The premier said the accomplishment of social objectives depends on economic strength, and Canadians have to face up to the fact of a highly competitive world.

WARNING GIVEN

"Any attempt to shut out foreign competition or to violate the laws of international competition can result only in large numbers of our people becoming dissatisfied with their economic circumstances. This is the reason why so many of our best professional and skilled people have emigrated to the United States in the past."

Confidence in the Canadian economy could not be generated by "emotional or chauvinistic appeals to nationalism," he added.

Mr. Robarts said it is a "false goal" to attempt to shape economic policy for the purpose of reducing the country's current account deficit. The "true objective" was the maximum increase in jobs and real income levels.

Five Resolutions Passed At Special Council Meeting

A total of five resolutions were passed at a special town council meeting here last evening which Mayor George Key Jr. felt could not be held off until the next regular meeting.

One of the resolutions approved the amount of \$28,054.09 as capital expenditures for water and sewerage extensions for the year.

A capital budget of \$69,908.75 for street paving covering the three wards in the town was also approved.

Approval of the F. Everett Cameron tender of \$581.18 for the supplying of 100 gallons of traffic paint was given. The Cameron tender was the lowest of six bids entered.

It was resolved that the industrial expansion and development committee be authorized to appoint a commission known as the "Industrial development commission".

The role of this commission, consisting of 12 members, would be to carry out matters relating to the industrial park or other locations within a reasonable radius suitable to industrial development and expansion in accordance with the recent legislation as laid down by the government of the province.

Mayor Key stated that it is the council's hope that not only residents of the town will be involved as members of the commission but also residents of Wilmot and St. Eleanor's.

Meetings have already been held with residents of these districts, he said, and they have declared a willingness to participate.

The final resolution approved and authorized the issue and sale of debentures to finance the capital cost of a new woven wire security fence surrounding the electric light and public works lots.

The town has received approval from the Municipal Development and Loan Board, Ottawa, for financial assistance in this already completed project, the meeting was told.

Most of the work was done under the winter works plan and the council was told that this fence was definitely an asset to the town.

LEAVING

Mayor Key told the council he was leaving for British Columbia today to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Federation of Mayors. He stated he would be away ten days and with the approval of other members of the council, appointed Councillor Frances Perry as deputy mayor, in his absence.

His reasons for not appointing a permanent deputy mayor was that with the number of qualified and experienced members on the council, he felt each member should take a turn acting in this role as the opportunities arise.

The council was also told that Keith Lapp's term as town representative on the Summerside school board and Mayor Key felt a replacement should be selected as soon as possible.

It was suggested that Mr. Lapp be appointed to serve another term and this was approved by the council. Mayor Key said Mr. Lapp has been much involved in the Summerside school expansion and "I would like to see him continue on the board if he wishes."

Blaze Destroys Home

Mr. and Mrs. Herman MacDonald and their seven children, ranging in ages from two to 17, were "left homeless after a fire of unknown origin destroyed their two-story house at De Gris Marsh early Sunday morning.

De Gris Marsh is approximately eight miles from Cardigan.

Mr. MacDonald said that their two-year-old son David warned them of the fire. He said that his wife noticed the smoke after being awakened by the crying of the baby. He added that they immediately vacated the house.

It was reported by Mr. MacDonald that the fire seemed to have started in the ceiling and by the time that they were warned the fire "was well on its way." They managed to save their downstairs furniture Mr. MacDonald said.

The Cardigan Fire Department was called to the scene. Before the fire department arrived neighbors poured water onto the blaze.

The MacDonalds are staying with Mr. and Mrs. Joe Reardon a neighbor. He said that he had no immediate plans but did want to build another house.

No injuries were reported.

Island Fox, Mink Breeders Plan Show For November

Prince Edward Island fox and mink breeders will hold a show here Nov. 8 to 11 and will hold a field day, likely in October, it was decided at the annual meeting held here last evening. Clayton Mill, Kensington, RR presided in his capacity as president.

The fur breeders have reason for enthusiasm. Every report heard at the meeting was tinged with optimism and Mr. Mill, the energetic president, last night was seeking names of people his association may be able to interest in planned expansion of the industry here.

Mr. Mills received warm praise last night for the work he has done for the association during his term as president. Lloyd Lockerby, Hamilton, termed it "excellent."

REPORTING ON marketing trends Mr. Lockerby told of heavy clearings, and substantial price advances in mink skins, and of the highest prices for fox pelts for some years.

The Hudson Bay Company sale in March handled Island ranches-fox pelts and the top price of \$75 — two lots brought that price and the top listings included P.E.I. skins — the best for some years. It represents a considerable advance over the improved prices of 1965, and it compares with prices of \$10 and "considerably lower received for pelts only a few years ago.

The prices for the whole HBC consignment ran \$42 to \$75, with most of the ranch skins in the \$55 to \$65 range Mr. Lockerby said.

Louell Hancock, Summerside, spoke with the benefit of his knowledge and experience as president of Canada Mink Breeders Association — he returned recently from a protracted European trip. He is also optimistic over future development of Canada Mink.

Mr. Hancock told of marked improvement in Canadian marketing arrangements, with a view to earning and gaining the confidence of the people who buy them as being sure of getting a high quality product.

The CMB has several hundred of Canada's top fur houses working under an arrangement whereby worthy mink pelts are stamped with the "Canada Mink" label. The label really means quality, Mr. Hancock explained, because CMB inspectors are sent into the establishments before the sales, to make sure the furs being offered really measure up to that standard, it was explained.

STILL WORKING

The nation-wide Canada Mink Breeders' organization is still working on a more effective method for grading skins so it can compete with the Scandinavian countries.

"Canada has the best mink skins in the world — we were told that on our recent trip to Europe — our coloring is better," Mr. Hancock explained. Up to the present the Scandinavians do a better overall job of grading their skins in lots — they size them more uniformly, he explained.

We need group grading on our Canadian skins, so we can get the volume of furs to really do a top grading and sizing job," the Summerside man explained.

"So long as ranchers insist on marketing their own skins separately, we lack the volume to do a most effective grading and sizing job," Mr. Hancock said.

Mr. Hancock, E.T. Mill, Kensington RR and Th. Kok, of the P.E.I. Fur Farms, Morell were named directors of the association.

Three of four new fox breeders listed last night are Murdo Brown, Southport; Doug Mayne and Ken Thompson of Charlottetown.

AUDITOR NAMED

W.W. Brown, North River and Irving Thompson, Dunstonsfage were named as auditors for the association.

DAVEN CASE OF SUMMERSIDE

was the choice of the meeting as judge at the fox show in November, if he is available.

The Hudson Bay Company will be asked to send a mink judge and an assistant. The company has always co-operated in furnishing men to judge this part of the show, an association spokesman explained.

Clayton Mill was re-elected as president. The vice-president is Mr. Kok of Morell. Claude Paynter, of Charlottetown is the secretary. L.K. Lockerby is also a member of the executive.

Accused Persons Are Remanded

SUMMERSIDE — A total of six persons appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court yesterday morning on various offences involving motor vehicles and all six were remanded in custody to future dates, either for trial or for sentencing.

Three accused, Francis Champion, Wilmot; Roy Stephen Gallant, Summerside, and Carl Brenton Jackson, Glovers Shore, pleaded guilty to similar charges of unlawfully taking a vehicle from Corney Bros. Used Car Lot without consent of the owners with intent to drive. They were remanded in custody to June 6th for sentencing.

Ronald Edward Enman, Summerside, entered a guilty plea to a charge of taking a car without the owner's consent and he was remanded in custody also to June 6th for sentencing.

On a second charge laid in Charlottetown of taking a car from Irishwoman without the consent of the owner, jurisdiction was waived and the accused was also remanded to June 6 on this charge.

A resident of Vernon, John Joseph Thomas, entered a plea of guilty to an impaired driving charge and was fined \$75 and costs. He pleaded not guilty to two other charges — theft of a vehicle, and theft of a wallet. He was remanded in custody for trial to June 6th.

A Lennox Island man, Ivan Joseph Bernard, pleaded guilty to charges of stealing a motor vehicle and taking a truck without the owner's consent and was remanded in custody for sentencing to June 6.

Henry Allen Crozier, 17, Summerside, pleaded guilty to charges of failing to stop when signalled to do so by a police officer and driving in a manner dangerous to the public. St. Eleanor's Constable W. Maxwell told the court that after the accused had failed to stop when signalled to do so, he had made chase, sometimes at speeds of up to 90 miles per hour before finally stopping him in Sherbrooke.

On the first charge Crozier was fined \$10 and costs while on the second charge he was fined \$50 and costs. Magistrate MacDonald also told the accused that he would lose his license on the second charge.

A resident of MacNeill's Mills, Hugh Benjamin Pye, was fined \$75 on a charge of impaired driving, while a Tynes Valley man, Frederick Waldo MacDougall, charged with a similar offence, had his case adjourned without plea to June 15.

David Lloyd MacDonald, Bordentown, pleaded not guilty to an impaired driving charge and his case was adjourned to June 13.
