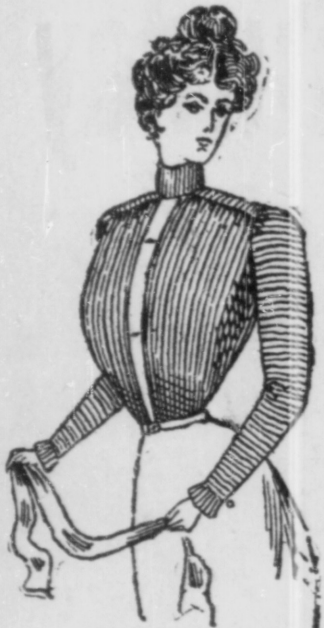

## DETAILS OF THE PEKIN MASSACRE

### The Story Told by a Chinaman

#### SAW WOMEN STRIPPED AND HACKED TO PIECES.

#### The Russians Hard Pressed Around Nin Chawang.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, July 20.—The Washington idea of sending Mr. Rockhill to China, says the Standard editorially, is an excellent one and might advantageously be imitated by the British and other governments.

The Standard then proceeds to comment upon the great ignorance, in Europe, not only of recent events, but of Chinese affairs generally.

A cabinet council convened by Lord Salisbury, yesterday, came a day earlier than usual and it is expected that it will be followed by a statement in parliament throwing light upon the situation.

The Chinese assertions that the members of the Foreign Legations are still safe have been so often repeated that they are again beginning to raise hopes in some quarters. According to the Daily Telegraph's St. Peter-burg correspondent, however, the Russian Government is already in possession of definite news that all the foreigners in Pekin were massacred July 6th.

M. Delcassé's circular only goes to prove that so far the Powers have failed to arrive at any concerted plan of action. Very little further news is available this morning.

The Yokohama correspondent of the Daily Mail, who repeats his statements regarding the jealousy felt among the allies on the subject of a Japanese commander-in-chief and the general lack of unity among them, adds:

"Japanese correspondents charge Russian soldiers with appalling barbarities towards the Chinese. They declare that the Peiho is full of corpses of women and children and that the Russians loaded 300 bodies on a junk and burned them."

LONDON, July 20.—The Express publishes the following from Che Foo, dated yesterday:

Russians are hard pressed around Nin Chawang and have been expelled from Tien Sawang Tai—the scene of the great fight during the China-Japanese war—where they have sustained great losses.

They have also been compelled to abandon Tashi Chin by a large body of Boxers and armed peasants. Here again the Russians lost heavily; but it is reported that they succeeded in killing 700 of their assailants.

LONDON, July 20.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Express says: Intense indignation is felt here at the honors which the British in Hong Kong have accorded Li Hung Chang, who is looked upon in Shanghai as the originator of the whole fencible anti-foreign plot.

A Chinese merchant who has just arrived from Pekin gives horrible details of the massacre. He says he saw European women hauled into the street by Boxers who stripped them and hacked them to pieces. Their dismembered limbs were tossed to the crowd and carried off with howls of triumph. Some were already dead, having been shot by foreign civilians. He says he saw Chinese soldiers carrying the bodies of white children aloft on their spears while their companions shot at the bodies. He gives other details too horrible to be particularized here.

### THE CAPTAIN DEAD.

Ulunda Arrives With Body of Captain Campbell.

HALIFAX, July 20.—The S. S. Ulunda arrived from London last night, having on board the dead body of her commander, Captain Campbell, who died on Tuesday, of Bright's Disease.

### BATTLE OF TIEN TSIN.

Depression of the Europeans—Some of the Casualties.

TIEN TSIN, July 13, 7 p. m., via Che Foo, July 16, and Shanghai, July 18.—The battle which begun with the attack by 7,000 of the allied forces upon the walls of the native city at 2 o'clock this afternoon, continued all day, two battalions of the Ninth Infantry participating. It reported that 215 of this command were killed or wounded, including ten or fifteen officers. Col. E. H. Liscum was killed, and Major Jesse M. Lee and James Reagan, Captains Charles K. Noyes, Andrew Brewster and Edwin V Naylor, Louis B Lawton, Harold Hammond and Ira C Waidron, were wounded.

Among the United States marines, the casualties numbered forty. Capt Austin R Davis was killed and Capt Wm B Lemly and First Lieut Henry Leonard and Smedley B Butler were wounded. The American contingent, after lying in shallow, hastily dug trenches, full of water, facing the south wall of the city and suffering for want of water and food, besides short of ammunition, were ordered by Gen Dorward to retire under cover of darkness.

The Russians were outside the east wall, while the Japanese, British and French were close to the west wall, with the Chinese trying to flank them.

The walls were sadly battered by shells. The attack will be renewed in the morning.

The total losses of the allied forces are estimated at 800. A messenger has arrived here who left Pekin July 1. The foreigners at that time were all in the British legation. Chinese troops were beginning to bombard the legations from the streets. The legations had been under rifle fire for a week previously, and in that time four foreigners had been killed and thirteen wounded. The marines had unsuccessfully attempted to capture a gun on a wall commanding the legations. The foreigners were supplied with abundance of provisions.

### MINISTERIAL MOVEMENTS.

Tarte in Europe - Laurier in Ottawa.

MONTREAL, July 20.—La Patrie announces that Mr. Tarte will leave Paris on Friday (today) and spend a few days with Lord Aberdeen in Scotland. Learning that Sir Louis Davies and Messrs. Fielding and Blair were going to France, Tarte decided to await their arrival.

The same organ says that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will not absent himself from the capital on vacation. He and Mr. Mulock and Mr. Bernier will direct the affairs of State. The Premier will attend to the Railways and Canals department and Bernier will be acting Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

On the 15th of August Sir Wilfrid Laurier will attend the French-Canadian Convention to be held at Arichat and immediately afterwards will address two or three special meetings in Nova Scotia.

### VICE-REGAL TRIP.

A Splendid Trip Arranged.

OTTAWA, July 19.—Their excellencies left on their western trip yesterday. An itinerary has been arranged which will give them a splendid opportunity for seeing the western country. They go straight through to Rat Portage, where they will arrive on Saturday afternoon, and Winnipeg Saturday evening, Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday will be spent in the prairie capital. Leaving Winnipeg, the run will be to Banff. From Thursday, 26th to Sunday 29th, will be spent in the National Park. Vancouver will be reached 1 p. m., Monday, 30th, and Victoria, Tuesday evening. August 1st to 4th will be spent in Victoria, and on the latter date the viceregal party will proceed on the Government steamer Quadra to Skagway.

Dawson will be reached on Wednesday, August 15th, and after a stay of five days the return trip will be commenced on the 20th, reaching Victoria on the 30th. Friday, the 31st, will be spent there, Saturday, Sunday and Monday in Vancouver and New Westminster; Rosland September 4th to 5th, thence to Lethbridge September 8th. Visits will be paid to the cattle ranges, irrigation works, and the Indian reserves. Calgary September 11th to 13th, Edmonton, 14th and 15th, Regina 18th to 20th, Prince Albert 21st. From the 23rd to the 30th will be spent on the prairies visiting Duck Lake, Batoche, and by the old cart trail to Qu'Appelle; October 1st to 15th in Brandon and vicinity, enjoying shooting on the prairie; thence to Ottawa.

### The Pope's Solicitude.

ROME, July 18.—Pope Leo has addressed a letter to the Vicar Cardinal, in the course of which he says that sorrowful events in China, besides filling his soul with sadness on account of the spilling of so much Christian blood, inspire him with the deepest fear as to the situation of the Apostolic Vicars and the dangers to which Christians and missionaries are exposed in serious trials, as well as sacrifice of lives. His Holiness therefore asks that all communicants pray ardently that God inspire thoughts of concord and peace, and that He will end the destruction and massacres.

### Yukon Gold Crop.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 18.—The Str Cutch arrived today from Skagway, bringing the largest gold shipments received in Vancouver this season from the north. A large amount in drafts and \$300,000 in dust was on board. A majority of the sixty passengers brought large packages of gold, some of greater weight than one could carry off the boat until aided.

### A BIG STRIKE.

ROTTERDAM, July 19.—The strike here is extending and over 12,000 men are now involved. There are 170 vessels in the Maas river awaiting discharge.
