

S'side Pumper, Volunteers Extinguish Fire In Woods

A forest fire which broke out Tuesday in a large woodland tract on the farm of Alphonse MacLellan, Arlington, and was thought to have been extinguished late Tuesday after burning over approximately an acre of spruce and fir, came to life again yesterday morning, when sparks, fanned by a stiff breeze, jumped the fire-break. However the flames were prevented from spreading when the pumper from the Summerside Fire Department manned by Capt. Albert Leard and Windsor Corney responded quickly to a call around 7:30 a.m. and with the aid of about 20 firefighters from Char-

lottetown and a number of local residents brought the blaze under control. A bulldozer owned by Curran and Briggs Ltd. also was taken to the scene of the outbreak, where it prepared a new firebreak around the smouldering area. Provincial Fire Marshal Earl T. MacLeod of Charlottetown was on hand to direct firefighting operations, as was Frank Gaudet, Chief Forester, Wendall Proffitt, his assistant and members of the Summerside Detachment RCMP. The fire was extremely stubborn due to the mossy ground, pine needles and a strong breeze and

kept firemen busy pouring water where a somewhat subterranean fire made it difficult to know when the sparks were completely extinguished. The blaze is thought to have been originated by sparks from a pile of debris that was being bugged on plowed ground near the large tract of woodland estimated to be between 1,100 and 1,500 acres which is situated about one-half mile from the main highway. Access to the fire was slightly difficult for the Summerside pumper due to marshy ground in the area.

Eight Cases On Alberton Docket

There were eight cases on the docket at the Alberton Court House yesterday with Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., presiding. For unlawful possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor a resident of Tignish was fined \$25.00 and costs. A party from Fortune Cove, charged with unlawfully exposing liquor (extracts) for sale, had the case adjourned until June 18th at Summerside. A resident of O'Leary was fined three dollars and costs for driving a vehicle not properly equipped. A Tignish youth was fined \$15.00 and costs and bound over to keep the peace for twelve months for causing a disturbance in a public place. A party from Miminegash pleaded guilty to possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than a residence in which he resided and was fined \$20.00 and costs. Four minor violations of the Highway Traffic Act were disposed of.

Daring Break Last Night At Men's Wear Store In S'side

Thirty-nine dollars in cash together with some navy blue sport shirts, and possibly other articles of men's clothing which could not be determined last night, were stolen in a daring break at Maurice Hill Men's Wear on Water Street in Summerside last evening. The money taken in the break was the property of the Summerside Kinette Club, and was the prize offered by this club in a drawing from which the proceeds were intended for community work by this fine service club whose efforts, among other worthwhile projects, has provided playground equipment for all three of Summerside's public play grounds for children. The money was taken from a doll displayed in the show window of the store, and only one dollar of the forty dollars in cash which adorned the doll, was missed by the thief or thieves.

The break followed an attempted break at this store the previous evening, and a more difficult approach was made last evening as entry to the store was made by climbing onto a pitched roof at the back of the Fox Breeders' Association building, separated from the clothing store by a narrow alley about two feet in width. From this position a rough heavy wrecking bar was used to smash through the boards which closed in the window area, and the glass in the window frame, permitting entry to a locked store room at the back of the store. Using an axe, an effort was made to chop through a wall into the main part of the store, and the blade apparently separated from the handle and was found lodged in the wall. Wooden matches were apparently used as a light source in the store room because several burned out matches were found lying on the floor in this area. Using the wrecking bar, a frontal assault was made on the door separating the store room from the store, and after gaining entry to the store the doll on which the money was pined was carried to the seclusion offered at the back of the store and stripped of the money, the doll was found lying on the floor. From this thief or thieves having departed by the same way in which they had entered the building. Several boxes and storage racks indicated that a hurried search had been made through some of the stock, and among the sports shirts some were observed to be missing, while other items will have to be checked today before it can be determined what other items of clothing were taken. The break was discovered by Raeborn Doyle, an employee at the store, who called in at the store shortly before 11 p.m. on the routine check being made as a result of the attempt that had been made to enter the premises on the previous night.
