Million Dollar Loss As Jasper Park Lodge Burns; Most Guests Remain

JASPER, Alta., July 16—(CP)—No large-scale exodus of tourists developed today in the wake of last night's fire which destroyed the luxurious Jasper Park Lodge near this Rocky Mountain resort 225 miles west of Edmonton.

Officials of Canadian National Railways, operators of the lodge, reported to be the world's largest log building, said they expected an extra sleeping car would accommodate the few wishing to leave. They had enough sleeping cars available here to move more than 200 persons aboard special trains.

Although the three-storey lodge, covering about one acre in area, was burned to the ground, all but a handful of the guests were housed in an adjacent village of 54 cabins.

The only person seriously injured in the blaze was Alfred Peters, 44, of Ottawa, secretary to the hotel manager. He was badly burned about the face, hands, arms and knees when caught in a flame-filled corridor after making a last-minute check of the burning building.

Meanwhile, as guards blocked off the ruins of the 30-year-old lodge until C. N. R. investigators could determine the cause of the big fire, the great majority of some 540 guests continued their holiday rounds of golfing, horseback riding and hiking.

Company officials in Montreal estimated the fire loss at \$1,000,000. Previously, unofficial estimates had ranged from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000.

A carload of foodstuffs arrived from Edmonton by passenger train in mid-afternoon to avert any possibility of a food shortage.

With the lodge's big dining room lost, guests were served cafeteria-style meals in the staff mess hall today and they accepted the change in a holiday mood. Normal services to the cabins were not interrupted. Guests who had occupied the lodge's eighty bedrooms were put up in vacant cabins.

A spokesman said the company hopes to be able to continue operation of the lodge through provision of temporary kitchen and dining room facilities. Definite decision on this, expected shortly would determine whether many guests would leave the mountain playgrounds.

All that remained of the lodge after the fire was the towering 40-foot stone chimney and fireplace, marking the centre of what was the lodge, two blackened lampposts and a stone patio.

About 300 people were in the lodge when the spectacular fire broke out about 9:45 p.m. in or near the check-room in the administration wing of the sprawling building. About half were in the ballroom dancing and the remainder were in the lounge.

The first warning most guests had was when the fire alarm was touched off by the automatic sprinkler system. Some thought it was only a practice alarm—there had been one about six hours earlier.

Orchestra leader Len Hopkins said he saw a huge sheet of flames through the window. He immediately took the microphone and called out, "clear the ballroom."

There was no panic among people in the main building but some guests of threatened cabins 30 feet away feared that the flames would spread and they packed bags and trudge out in housecoats and light attire.

Some people were reported to have asked for canoes to seek safety in the middle of Lac Beauvert, about 150 yards from the lodge.

The fire was fought by about 500 staff employees, along with 25 firemen from the town of Jasper, 4 1/2 miles away. R.C.M.P. and members of the Federal Parks staff.

There was one unconfirmed report that \$60,000 in cash and \$4,000 in stamps were destroyed in the lodge office.

Among the fire spectators were Robert Somerville of Ottawa general manager of the C. N. R. hotel system. He had arrived yesterday on an inspection tour.

Another was Lady Rose Alexander, daughter of the former Governor-General, who has been employed in the lodge's main office.
