ISLAND HORSES DOMINATE RACING PROGRAM

Royal Jim, Aaron L. And Millie Kalmuck Cheered To Victory By Huge Throng

"Southport Day" On The Track In Program Featuring Blanket Finishes And Thrilling Stretch Drives.

With Island horses, all from Southport, winning all three events on the card the second day's racing of the Prince Edward Island Exhibition passed into history yesterday. And once more blanket finishes and thrilling stretch drives were the features that an overflow crowd that jammed the centre grandstand and bleachers witnessed.

And the card was not without its upset. Royal Jim and Aaron L. came through as expected in the Four Year Old Futurity and 2:16 Trot and Pace respectively, but Millie Kalmuck upset the dope when she raced to victory in the 2:17 Trot over the highly favored Scotch Mist of Mills, Massachusetts, who after being setback to second position in the second heat for swerving in the stretch made a jump in the final heat that Millie Kalmuck won in a sensational stretch duel with June Evans.

Plenty of Speed

The track record wasn't broken but result of the card saw Aaron L. take a new record of 2:08 in the second heat of the 2:16 Trot and Pace, the former mark of 2:10 1/4 to 2:08 3/4 in the first heat and both Scotch Mist and Millie Kalmuck equal their marks in the first and third heats respectively of the 2:17 Trot. Then there was the taking down of two drivers, Joe O'Brien handling Aaron L., and Mr. Barnett, behind Calumet Coburn in the first heat of the 2:16 Trot & Pace. Warned by Starter Irvine for beating the pole horse the two drivers were unseated for the heat which was run in the next race after the warning had been issued. They were replaced by Well McNeill and Ollie Rudderham respectively and the latter had no trouble afterwards. Starter Irvine turned in another fine performance and showed clearly that he is always in full control of his fields.

These were but a few of the highlights that the big holiday crowd witnessed. Every heat raced saw the winners declared only after they had been urged to re-advance their stretch drives that had the crowd shouting madly as they pulled for their favorites to come through.

Today's Racing Card

The big Free-for-All Trot and Pace is scheduled for today and together with the 2:16 Trot and Pace and the 2:22 Pace and here is another card that promises to be even better, if that be possible, than has been seen the two glorious days of racing here where winners have already seen. They were expected to be good, but have gone far beyond expectations, and when the next two days are over racing fans will be able to look back on a meet that has had everything—fine weather, spectacular racing over a fast track and the most exciting horse racing in the province. It was 1-1-1 for Willard Kelly's Royal Jim in the Four Year Old Futurity as he beat off challenges of Power Bros., Joe Volo in the first two heats and then won by a neck from Ethel Bellini in the third heat. Aaron L. also had a 1-1-1 summary in winning the 2:16 Trot & Pace but not before the crowd had witnessed sensational stretch drives in every heat between the winner, Junior Bars, Billy and Volo Ray, Millie Kalmuck was 2-1-1 in the 2:17 Trot as she completed a clean sweep for the Island horses on the day's card.

Upper Canada Team Wins At Riverside

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Aug. 16.—(CP)—Burlly Ralph Guldehl of Madison, N. J., fresh from victory in the \$10,000 Dapper Dan Tournament at Pittsburgh, arrived today and immediately was made the favorite for the Canadian Open Golf Championship starting on Riverside Golf and Country Club tomorrow.

Guldehl didn't take long to support the confidence. Playing with Bill (Red) Francis, a young professional from Altoona, Pa., big Ralph went over the heavily wooded course in an approximate 69, one under par. That wasn't the best practice round of the day but it served to show his game was keen as ever.

An amateur four-ball match between teams representing New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island and "Upper Canada" created the interest around Riverside this afternoon. Ross (Sandy) Somerville of London, Ont., and Phil Farley of Toronto, two of the country's leading amateurs, whipped Pete Kelly of Charlottetown and Percy Streeter of Saint John easily, 4 and 3. The other game went to Henry Martell of Edmonton and Ray Gettifer of London, two up on Grant Campbell of St. Andrews, N. B., and Jimmy Gerrard of Saint John.

Somerville and Farley featured the matches with rounds of 70 and 69, respectively. They won the first three holes and held on easily as Kelly and Streeter failed to match their accuracy and bounded into trouble regularly. The Ontario pair finished with a best ball of 63.

Streeter had a 74 but Kelly, in the woods twice and falling with his iron, picked up on two holes and didn't even attempt to guess at his score. Martell saved the day against the other Maritime team, firing two birdies for wins on the last two holes after they reached the 17th all even. Martell, finalist in the Canadian Amateur and winner of the recent Ontario Open, finished with 71 against 78 for the other three.

Four favored Americans—Dick Metz, Denny Shute, Gene Sarazen and Jimmy Hines—had not arrived and all were doubtful starters in the open. There were about 82 golfers on hand, one of the smallest fields in years.

McDiarmid Leads Way Into Semi-finals As Tourney Advances On All Fronts

The men's singles event in the Prince Edward Island Open Tennis tournament smacked off international flavor yesterday as play narrowed down to the semi-finals. In the select group were two Upper Canadians, Don McDiarmid of Ottawa and Laird Watt of Montreal, and United States netman, Red Haire of Garden City, N. Y., and a Maritimer, Garnet Raper of Saint John, N. B.

McDiarmid, the defending champion, defeated Bevil Piers of Halifax, Watt upset Piers' doubles partner, Harry Roper, while Haire eliminated Ken Farmer of Montreal and Raper ousted Eric Woodworth of Halifax.

Ottawan Steady The tall and rangy Ottawan who covers the court with brilliant accuracy was too much for the quick-footed Piers. McDiarmid took five straight games before the Halifaxian could break into the scoring column. Piers applied more power to his service and frequently went to the net in the second set but McDiarmid finally ran it out at 6-3. The Halifax player was unable to cope with the champion's steadiness in the third and lost it without winning a game.

Meanwhile, Roper was on the next court trying to match Watt's line drives and smashing net placements. The former Davis Cup player ran out the first set without the loss of a game but was forced to the limit by Roper's well-placed service and sideline shots in the second. At one time the veteran Halifaxian held a 3-2 lead but Watt took four straight games to end the set. The Montrealer ran out the third, 6-2.

Lengthy Duel Raper and Woodworth provided the spectators with the longest match of the tournament.

The stocky and steady Saint John player breezed through the first set without the loss of a game as Woodworth made many errors. It was a different story in the second set as both players seemed content to settle down to long rallies.

Woodworth held a 6-5 lead and had set-point three times before the never-tiring Raper finally pulled through under a hot sun, 8-6. Raper scored frequently with corner shot to win the third, 6-2. Little Ken Farmer spent the better part of his match with the big Garden City player on the defensive. Farmer had to reach high for Haire's twisting and high-bouncing service and couldn't keep up with his sensational net playing. The scores were, 6-1, 6-3, 6-0.

With weather permitting the finalists probably will be decided tomorrow with Watt showing his warts against Haire and McDiarmid meeting Raper.
