Truman-Pleven End Conference

WASHINGTON, JAN. 31 — (AP) — President Truman and French Premier Rene Pleven Tuesday ended their two-day conference in agreement on French-American strategy in Western Europe and the Far East.

At the close of their third and final meeting, the White House said a joint French-American communique is being drafted and probably will be made public late tonight.

Pleven told reporters: "I am very pleased and I hope everybody else is too."
After a conference earlier in the day, the two heads of state had been reported "in complete accord" on North Atlantic problems.
Pleven said earlier that "democratic Germany" will be allowed to arm one division for every five Atlantic Pact divisions to help defend Western Europe.
