"At this season of peace and goodwill, I would like to extend to all the people of this Province of Prince Edward Island my best wishes for many blessings.

"We have passed through a year of great historic significance. Widespread observances have been conducted under splendid organization to commemorate the Centennial Year. The meeting of the premiers of Canada at an historic session in September marked the 100th year of the meeting of Canadian leaders at Charlottetown in 1864 and added a dramatic incident to the year's program.

(Continued from page 1) the files and Chief Justice Dorton instructed Justice Deschênes, counsel for the federal government, to enter it as an exhibit when it is received.

However, J. E. Fortier, counsel for Mr. Lamontagne, suggested in questioning Mr. Tremblay that there isn't a letter dated before July 16. He served notice if one isn't produced he will have further questions for Mr. Tremblay.

While questioning Mr. Daoust earlier, Mr. Fortier said Mr. Daoust testified Tuesday he had met Mr. Tremblay here July 15.

Mr. Daoust replied he hadn't actually met the minister. He had intended to, he said, but Mr. Daoust and Mr. Rouleau met. The Bo-

namo case was discussed by Mr. Tremblay his plea by messenger the next day. Mr. Daoust informed him July 22 it had been rejected.

Mr. Daoust said Mr. Rouleau remained for part of the interview.

TALKED ABOUT CASE  
When Mr. Tremblay was on the stand he said the meeting took place in Mr. Rouleau's office but he didn't know whether Mr. Daoust was present. He said Mr. Denis reported verbally the talk was about all aspects of the Bonanno case. Mr. Denis gave Mr. Daoust no commitments.

Mr. Tremblay said there was no consideration given by the government to granting bail for Bonanno and Mr. Denis knew this.

He said he did not ask Mr. Denis on or before July 14 to get Mr. Lamontagne to the capital to discuss the Bonanno case. He didn't know whether Mr. Daoust asked for an interview with Mr. Denis.

He said it would be impossible if Mr. Daoust had said Mr. Rouleau requested a review of the Bonanno case. He would remember if it had been raised.

Mr. Fortier suggested once was when Mr. Daoust asked before July 15 asking for an interview. Mr. Tremblay said he would try to find out if such a letter did exist.

MAY BE TWO  
At another point, Mr. Tremblay said it is possible there are two letters in the files.

Mr. Fortier said everyone at the inquiry had been taking the letter existed. He said he had said Mr. Tremblay had agreed to do, he would have more questions for the minister.

Ross Drouin, counsel for the Progressive Conservative party, asked Mr. Tremblay the whereabouts of the original files in the Bonanno case.

## 2nd Accused Pleads Guilty in Beating Case

Lorne Vessey, charged with robbery with violence, changed his plea from not guilty to guilty yesterday in Magistrate's Court and was remanded until Monday, Dec. 28.

The charge arose out of the robbery and beating of Mrs. John Spencer Sr., West Royal, on Nov. 20 and the two men held by police in connection with the incident have both pleaded guilty to the charges against them.

On Dec. 9, Laurie William MacDonald, held on the same charge as Vessey, changed his plea from not guilty to guilty.

A special court will be held in a room in the P.E.I. Hospital Monday afternoon and a statement from the victim will be heard prior to the passing of the sentences for the pair.

The necessity of holding the court at the hospital came when Magistrate James B. Johnson, had asked that the victim be present. Crown Prosecutor Alan Seales informed the court that Mrs. Spencer's doctor advised against moving her from the hospital.

Mr. Seales then stated he would make arrangements with the hospital for a room in which the court could be held.
