The wrapper is a single film of leaf wrapped around the plug and is never good smoking tobacco. It is costly only because of its fine color. In the "Myrtle Navy" brand the chief attention is paid to the "filler," that is, the inside of the plug. It is this which determines the smoking quality of any tobacco. Tobacco can be made to look as well as the "Myrtle Navy" without much trouble or expense, but it may at the same time be a very inferior article.

THE MIRAMICHI.—The steamer Miramichi arrived here on her first trip this season this morning at five o'clock, with a large cargo of general merchandise. On the trip down, as already stated, the shaft broke when off Gaspe and she was towed into that place. From there she was towed to Summerside and thence to this port by the tug boat St. Lawrence. Her passengers were landed at Gaspe and came on by train. The Miramichi will leave here this afternoon for Pictou where her shaft will be repaired.

FIRE AT HALIFAX.—A fire occurred at Halifax on Monday night in the three-story brick building on Hollis Street, owned by the Queen Hotel Company. The fire started in the workroom of Ruggles' tailoring shop, and to extinguish it the building had to be drenched with water. Ruggles had his stock insured to cover damage. Cahill's hair-dressing parlors were flooded with water. Loss also covered by insurance. The building is not much damaged, except by water.

THE COBAN.—The steamer Coban arrived here this forenoon, with a large general cargo and a goodly number of passengers. The same captain and officers as last year are in charge. She will leave for St. John's via Sydney this evening about six o'clock, with a good cargo of general merchandise, and 14 horses, 50 head of cattle and 30 sheep on deck. The horses were shipped by Allen McPhee, John Wheatley, Long Bros. and Geo. G. Crosby; the sheep and cattle by Barrett Henderson. Messrs. W. D. LeBoutellier and Allen Parsons go as passengers to Sydney and Mr. Geo. G. Crosby goes to St. John.

POLICE COURT.—This morning a lad named Weatherbie, eleven years of age, was given twenty days imprisonment for assault and battery on an old woman named Cann, living on Chestnut Street, and another young lad, ten years old, for being implicated in the transaction was fined fifty cents and costs.
