SUMMERSIDE — One of the adjudicators at the Prince County section of the annual Music Festival, Lloyd G. Queen, stated, after hearing various classes in group and individual singing performances, that this was the best singing he had heard this spring in the festivals he has attended.

Mr. Queen awarded the highest mark to date in the festival to a girl's choir from Kinkora for its rendition of "I Know A Bank" by Martin Shaw. The class was a two-part girls chorus for 16 years and under.

The mark awarded this group was 89.

(Continued from page one) The island at such places as Murray Harbor, Morell, North Rustico and Tignish indicated, for example, that the catches are running from three-quarters of a pound to one-half pound per trap. And, it was explained, there are considerably more boats reporting catches of less than one half pound per trap, than there are with catches of more than three-quarters of a pound.

Mr. Sangster said he and Mr. Gillis have checked the situation in Montreal and Toronto as well as along the Eastern American seaboard and in no case did they find a concentration of holdover lobster meat that would warrant a poor market outlook.

MONCTON — Canadian National is operating a late-night sailing from Borden, P.E.I., to Cape Tormentine, N.B. in addition to its regular ferry schedule to speed lobster shipments on their way to market.

J.G. Davis, manager of CN's Maritime area, announced Tuesday that an extra scheduled sailing would leave Borden at 11:00 p.m. During the lobster season to ensure that no trucks loaded during the day have to spend the night on the island, under the regular schedule the last sailing from Borden is at 9:30 p.m.

She was taken to the hospital by an ambulance from Bowness Funeral Home. She was reported not in serious condition last night.

### Both Bodies Identified

HALIFAX (CP) — The bodies of two young men found floating 70 miles apart in Northumberland Strait Sunday have now been positively identified as those of St. Mary's University students — Raymond Wong and Frank Chan.

Wong and Chan, both 21, disappeared during the Christmas vacation period shortly after they set out to visit friends attending St. Dunstan's University in Charlottetown.

Wong's body was found floating off Cape Tormentine, N.B., a relative made positive identification Monday.

RCMP said that clothing found on a second body found off Picou Island, N.S., led to the identification of Chan. Both students were from Hong Kong.

## Island Airman Dies In Crash

Flt. Lt. George Russell Jenkins, 36, of Vernon, who was serving with the Royal Canadian Air Force on an exchange basis was killed Tuesday when the Canberra jet bomber he was navigating crashed on approach to the air base at Walton, Norfolk. He was due to return to Canada this month after serving two years in Britain.

Flt. Lt. Jenkins was found to be dead on arrival at the RAF hospital at Ealy, Cambridgeshire. The Canberra's pilot, Flt. Lt. Robert Jackson, 32, of London, was killed outright in the crash. The third member of the crew, F0 Thomas Topas, 32, also of London, is reported seriously ill in hospital.

A student of Prince of Wales College, Mr. Jenkins enlisted in the RCAF in 1950 and received his commission at the RCAF station in Summerside. He was selected for training in electronic warfare with the United States Air Force and was stationed with a fighter squadron at North Bay, Ont. He had served with squadrons of the Maritime Air Command in Nova Scotia and British Columbia and also a navigation instructor at Winnipeg, Man.

Flt. Lt. Jenkins was the son of Major W. Lawson and Mrs. Jenkins of Vernon. Also surviving are his wife and four

children, residing at Norfolk. His wife is the former Rosemary Burns of Markham, Ont. Sons names are David, Danny, Paul and Philip.

Also surviving are two sisters and a brother. His sisters are Beth, Mrs. Brian Cudmore, Charlottetown; and Olga, Mrs. Boyce Carter, Hudson, N.Y. His brother, Stanton is residing in Truro, Nova Scotia.
