MR. MORRIS says he follows Mr. Davies now because he followed him in 1876. But the reason he gave for following Mr. Davies in 1876 is now removed.

A TELEGRAM from Allerton announces that all the small-pox patients at that place are recovering, and that there are no new cases or fear of the further spread of the infection.

At Stayner, Ont., on the 11th, a cow belonging to Mrs. Holmes gave birth to calf having two distinct heads, joined together just above the eyes. The calf has four eyes and two mouths, but only two ears. It takes food equally well with either mouth.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Albert Paquet was fined \$2 and costs for fighting with George Foster on Pownall street. The latter appeared and was discharged. Hector McLean, drunk and incapable, was fined \$2 and costs or 8 days.

MR. DAVIES spoke loudly in the Market Hall last evening; but his actions during the past two and a half years were louder than his words. They declared, in trumpet tones, that Mr. Davies is not the man in whom may safely be committed the destinies of this Province.

HON. MR. DAVIES -- unintentionally, no doubt, -- left the impression upon the minds of many who attended his meeting last night -- that the country members had taken a full session's pay for their enforced attendance during the protracted dying struggle of the late Government. The members of the Legislature got enough to pay their expenses while in the city -- no more. They were paid about half the usual allowance per day.

MR. DAVIES said last night that on the 31st December, 1874, the Province had in the Treasury \$268,000, "and in addition," said he, "we drew an enormous revenue from Ottawa." Mr. Davies knows right well that the \$268,000 was very largely made up by means of the revenue we drew from Ottawa. In fact \$209,000 of the amount named by Mr. Davies were drawn from Ottawa as revenue. Mr. Davies should cultivate accurate forms of expression.

A LARGE number of citizens listened with attention to the dulcet tones of the ex-Premier, as he held forth in the Market Hall last evening. The electors are evincing great interest in the issues of the day; and they do well to hear both sides before deciding which they will take. The result of Mr. Davies' eloquence last evening was, that Mr. Thomas Morris was nominated by J. W. Pickard and seconded by Patrick Foley. A vain and impotent conclusion.

THE LETELLIER MATTER.

THE BUDGET SPEECH.

Special Despatch to Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 14.

The House sat till five o'clock this morning, and a vote was taken on the Letellier matter at 4.50. This was the first vote of the session, and the Government majority was eighty-five -- with Mr. Tilley and Mr. McDougall out of the House, and four members paled off.

Mr. Brecken spoke. Mr. Anglin made a long speech raising a religious cry. Mr. Costigan replied with a crushing effect, and was loudly applauded. Mr. Costigan's was considered the best speech of the debate.

Mr. Tilley will deliver the Budget Speech this afternoon.

OTTAWA, March 13.

Hon. Mr. Pope, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, has laid before the House a copy of the petition of Messrs. Ross and others, of Quebec, proprietors and builders of ships and steamships, in relation to the registration in Canada of American vessels. The petition has upwards of one hundred signatures, and represents that the British navigation laws which admit American-built vessels to British registry in Canada have long been an intolerable injustice to the petitioners and to all who are interested in the welfare and prosperity of the Dominion. There is now a large number of steamers and other vessels of United States build, which have been admitted to registry in Canada, and which have not contributed one cent to the revenue, while Canadian built vessels, and more particularly steamers, have been obliged to pay duties on nearly everything entering into their construction, such as iron, brass, copper, boilerplate, rivets, tools, cutlery, crockery, lamps, and one hundred other things required in their equipment.

LONDON, March 13.

The Pall Mall Gazette's correspondent at Rome says that the confidential agent of Prince Bismarck has arrived at the Vatican, and has instructions to reject any proposal involving the modification of May laws.

It is stated that the Pope waives all other points except those strictly involving Papal principles and dignity.
