

Says Buildings On Stilts Would Assist In Traffic

QUEBEC (CP) — Construction of downtown city buildings "on stilts" Wednesday was suggested to highway specialists to help solve some of the "immense and staggering" transportation problems expected in Canada during the next 25 years.

The buildings "on stilts," a conception of the internationally-known architect Le Corbusier, was among several suggestions made in an address by George S. Mooney of Montreal, executive director of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities. He spoke at the annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association.

"The anticipated growth of urban population, coupled with the expected unparalleled increase in motor-vehicle usage will create transportation problems of immense and staggering proportions during the next 25 years," he said.

Daytime population density of downtown districts might be lowered in order to diminish the peak demand for transportation services.

"Following one of Le Corbusier's ideas, buildings in central areas could be constructed on stilts," he said. "Almost all of the space at ground level would thus be available for transportation and circulation."

"Alternatively, a greater proportion of transport routes could be located underground... or be extended upwards by being placed at different levels, one on top of the other."

For years we have been bombarded with predictions that Canada is drying up, and future drought threatening to turn the great west into a desert. Now with the swing of the climate the ancient floods return, and Canada is a well-watered land again.

NOT YET READY

It is too true that we are not yet prepared to control our streams and make them serve areas which now they damage, but is not the responsibility for this our own? The present losses are grievous, but in the long look-out the benefits will outweigh the injury.

Apart from these losses—and we cannot belittle them—this is a time of abounding prosperity for Canada. The times are good. Unemployment is down and employment is yielding richer rewards than ever.

Resources undreamed of 20 years ago are being developed to the enrichment of our nation and the benefit of mankind. Enterprise and industry are, in the main, reaping rich returns.

Again the warning of the author of the book of Deuteronomy comes home to us. Beware of saying My own hand has gained this wealth and of forgetting the Lord your God who gave you this rich land and the power to get wealth.

From this nation, more than from any other, anthems of praise and thankfulness should rise to God, the Giver of all.

We thank God for peace. Causes of misunderstanding and conflict are now arising between the nations that would have precipitated them into war a generation ago, but now the general will of all nations to bear on local issues and demands their settlement by reason and mutual concession.

WAR WORSE

No matter how wide the disagreements, war would be worse than any losses that their causes may bring.

The churches of Christendom are united now in their attitude toward international relationships; their belief is being brought to bear on governments and national policies; and the prayers and efforts of God's people everywhere should be concentrated on this single aim that justice, good will and love may bring about a new unity and mutual helpfulness among the peoples of the world.

One fact should be heavily on the conscience of Canada—our prosperity has brought a tragic increase of self-indulgence and crime.

Down the pages of history we read one story in varied forms: wealth led to luxury, and luxury to national decay. That tendency appearing among our own people.

One of its worst features is the blindness it brings, and the ardent refusal to look at the causes of the evils we suffer and to deal courageously with them. We hear often about a new seriousness among our people and their longing for spiritual revival.

It should lead first to a call to repentance for wanton defiance of the laws of national health and safety, which are the laws of God. Thanksgiving should lead to consecration: it is nothing but mockery until it does.

ARREST STRIKERS

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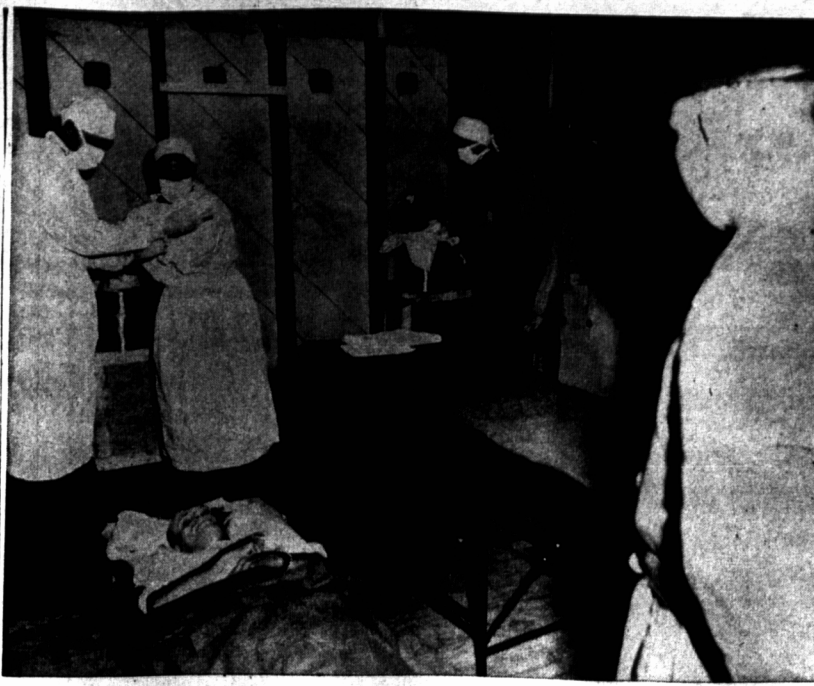
