### Defected Red Suicide Leaves Note

NEW YORK (AP)—A "final document" which criticized United States foreign policy was found in the room of Victor Kravchenko, former Russian Army captain who shot and killed himself, the medical examiner's office said Saturday.

The assistant medical examiner, Dr. John F. Devlin, said the note was "an intellectual treatise on the international situation."

Kravchenko, who defected to the United States during the Second World War, was found dead Friday.

Devlin said the note was "a sort of final document" in which Kravchenko criticized U.S. foreign policy. Asked whether Kravchenko referred to the Viet Nam situation, Devlin said it was mentioned, but not emphasized.

He declined to disclose the text of the note.

The medical examiner's office said Kravchenko, 61, died in his apartment of a self-inflicted gunshot wound of the head and brain.

Kravchenko wrote an autobiography called I Chose Freedom after his defection. Kravchenko said in 1949 that Soviet agents had tried four times that year to kill him.

DEATH REPORTED  
PITTSBURGH (AP)—Joseph Becker, 78, German-born authority and developer of by-product coke ovens, died Saturday. Becker, who was granted several patents in connection with chemical recovery coke ovens and affiliated equipment, developed in the 1920s the widely-used coke oven which still bears his name, the Koppers-Becker oven.

## Youngest Senator's Honors Shared With 10-Year-Old Son

OTTAWA (CP)—Keith Davey became Canada's youngest senator Thursday at age 39—but in his own family he had to share the plaudits with his 10-year-old son, Douglas, who also figured in an appointment.

The eldest of Mr. Davey's three children was promoted to a "second" second man in his six-boy cub pack—about the same time that Prime Minister Pearson was appointing Mr. Davey to the Senate.

Fresh from his job of national organizer of the Liberal party, in which he was one of the key architects of his party's surge back to power in 1965, Keith Davey is happy that the new appointment affords a chance to prove himself in the legislative side of politics.

"I am naturally delighted," he said in an interview. "One of the great weaknesses of my political career so far is that it has been spent almost totally in organization."

"I've always been interested in the legislative side. I am delighted at the chance to prove myself in a legislative sense."

WON'T BE PRESUMPTUOUS  
But other than speaking in generalities, he feels it would be presumptuous of him as a new senator, and a young one, to say what he thinks of the upper house and to indicate how he plans to conduct himself there.

But he is forthright in wanting to be identified as among "the new guard in politics."

"There are some things I believe about the country and the party, and I'm not ashamed to say I am a left-winger."

He doesn't expect to continue in organization work in the party, contrary to some speculation. (But he intends to work at another career besides being a senator, which will bring him \$15,000 annually.)

He is considering a number of offers, mainly in the communications business, and he expects to set up residence again in Toronto in June.

Mr. Davey left his job as advertising salesman for Foster Hewitt's Toronto radio station CKFH to move into Liberal party headquarters in Ottawa as national organizer in May, 1961, at the personal behest of Mr. Pearson.

ASKED TO KEEP JOB  
He resigned from the party job after the Nov. 8 federal general election, in which the Liberals failed to achieve the Com-

mon majority it expected, but Mr. Pearson asked him to stay on for a while. He did so until the end of January.

In the organizational job, he worked up to 18 hours a day at a hectic pace through the campaigns for the general elections of 1962, 1963 and 1965. He brought a youthful flair to the job and was soon stamped as one of the leading political strategists in the country.

He said he would have liked to have been a candidate for the Commons in the last election. But he was needed in the organizational role.

He is no stranger of many of the veteran senators, particularly Senator John Connolly of Ottawa, government leader in the upper house. For four of Mr. Davey's years as national organizer, Senator Connolly worked closely with him in his job as president of the national Liberal federation.

Mr. Davey and his wife, Isabel, have two other children, Ian, 8, and Catherine, 2.

"I'll bet I'm the only senator with a two-year-old," he said with a laugh.

MONITORING  
Soviet scientists hope to uncover some of the secrets of Venus this week as two of their spacecraft hurtle past the planet, transmitting information back to earth.

The two automatic stations, Venus II and III, are due to pass on either side of the cloud-shrouded planet.

They may take television pictures, as the American Mariner IV did of Mars, but there are many things scientists could learn without these.

If they follow the same time-

table as the American Mariner II, Venus II will approach the planet today and Venus III Friday.

The Mariner II swept past Venus in December, 1962, after hurtling 24,000,000 miles through space in 109 days. The Soviet Venus rockets were launched last November.

No details of their instruments were made public.

Indonesian Students May Wage War

SINGAPORE (AP)—Anti-Communist students in Indonesia appear ready to go underground and wage guerrilla war in an effort to topple President Sukarno, informants here said today. They added that military forces loyal to Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution, Indonesia's ousted defence minister, may throw their support to the students.

The informants, watching developments in Indonesia from Singapore, said they gathered this from a students' statement broadcast by a clandestine Indonesian radio and from what they called "more confidential information" received directly from Jakarta.
