AGRICULTURAL NEWS

P.E.I. Department of Agriculture ALBERTON EXHIBITION The gates of the Alberton Ex-hibition are swinging open this morning to officially start the 1959 show. The early indications are that the Livestock Classes will be larger than in former years. This Western Prince Coun-ty Agricultural Exhibition has shown a marked increase each year. The two day show displays some of the Island's leading pro-ducers. SWINE DISEASES Swine diseases will be featured in a display put on by the Ve-terinary Division of the P.E.I. De-partment of Agriculture. In this exhibit it is forcibly brought to the attention of the viewers that in the losses of young pigs that occur every five per cent of them occur before weaning. Why not visit this exhibit and learn how you can prevent the loss of many dollars. LAB SERVICE If you are experiencing losses in your flock or herd why not send specimens to your Provincial Agricultural Laboratory. This service is maintained free of charge for the livestock owners of the province. The material submitted to the Laboratory must be fresh so that a satisfactory examination can be conducted. The Laboratory is lo-cated at 188 Prince Street in the Heath Centre, Charlottetown. Sterile bottles are supplied free of charge to take milk samples so that they can be tested to determine whether or not there is any infection in the sow's quarters. LIVESTOCK Farm cash income from live-stock was greater in 1958, then either in 1957 or in 1956. While cash income from each class of livestock product rose in 1958, greatly increased returns to pro-ducers from sales of cattle and calves were the most important factor in the large increase in income. Western producers shared in this increase to a much greater degree than did those in eastern Canada. Cash farm income from live-stock was 34 per cent of total cash farm income (excluding sup-plementary payments) in 1958, compared with 30 per cent in 1957. This was the highest por-tion since 1951 when cash in-come from livestock was 37 per cent of the total. HOGS Hog marketings began to de-cline seasonally early in May but it was not until June that pork production approached a balance with domestic and export de-mand. As a result, the Agri-cultural Stabilization Board contin-ued to purchase primal cuts and canned pork, in order to prevent hog prices from falling below support levels. Total cold storage stocks at the end of May mounted to 90 million pounds, compared with an average of 25 million pounds during 1956-58, and stocks of canned pork in its previous years. Prices of grade A hogs across Canada remained at support lev-els, or very little higher, until June. At this time prices showed some tendency to rise in re-sponse to the seasonal decline in marketings. At Toronto, during June, the weekly average price rose from \$25.25 to \$25.55 per 100 pounds, dressed. The quarterly forecast of hog marketings for the July-September period of 1959 indicates that gradings will average about 132 thousand hogs per week. If this should prove to be close to actual gradings, then some net-out-of-cowage movement may be cur during these three months of seasonally low marketings. In the United States, spring farrowings have been occur-ring progressively earlier in re-cent years. This year, the spring crop is expected to begin arriv-ing on the market in July and prices in the U.S. are likely to decline seasonally until November. Choice gilts and barrows, 200 to 220 pounds, dressed equivalent, at Chicago, sold at prices between \$21.00 and \$22.00. (Canadian) during the April-June period. Fall marketings are expected to be 12 per cent greater than in 1958, and marketings in the first half of 1960 may be nine per cent greater than a year earlier. How-ever, in spite of this expected in-crease, prices are not expected to fall as low as in 1956-58 when the lowest monthly average price was \$15.35 per 100 pounds, dressed equivalent. CATTLE Both net marketings of cattle and domestic disappearance of beef during March-May 1959 are considerably lower than a year earlier. Although retail prices of beef declined during this period, prices in May of some beef pro-ducts were still up to six per cent higher than in May 1958. BEEF CATTLE TEST Approximately 25 states and four provinces were represented at the fourth annual conven-tion of Performance Registry Inter-national. The convention, attended by about 300 people, was held on June 15th and 16th at Miles City in Montana. Indicative of the in-terest in this work in Canada was the presence of about 60 Cana-dians. Performance Registry Inter-national is an organization of pure bred and commercial cattle pro-ducers with headquarters at Can-yon, Texas. Its main objective is to promote the testing of beef
