To Cut Wages Of C.N.R. Stenographers

TORONTO, May 27. In reply to a rumor that has been circulated to the effect that the stenographers and office help of the Canadian National Railway office are to receive a cut in wages, as well as being asked to work longer hours, A. J. Hill, assistant president, has made the following statement: "Stenographers are not being singled out for special treatment," he said, "the condition for clerical forces of the C. N. R., have been discussed by a committee representing the employees. The question of their rights is under consideration at present, except in a few cases, for which an adjustment is being considered. These are on dates that became effective in July last year. But, in the aggregate, there is no increase or reduction on amount of reductions which were made effective by the application of the United States Labor Board award in Canada."

Dr. Cutten Not Notified

YARMOUTH, N. S., May 29.—Dr. G. B. Cutten, who was in Rochester, (N. Y.) lecturing at the closing of the Baptist Theological Seminary in that city, was in Yarmouth today en route to Wolfville. Dr. Cutten was asked concerning his reported retirement from the presidency of Acadia University to accept that of Colgate University of New York. Dr. Cutten said that the newspapers appeared to be better informed as to his future than he was himself, as he had not yet received notice of his appointment to Colgate College. For the present, at least, he was returning to Acadia.

Judge Gary Is Optimistic

NEW YORK, May 29.—Elbet H. Gary, in his annual address at President of the American Iron and Steel Institute, in session at the Hotel Commodore today, advocated that Congress take the tariff out of politics; that it play no favorites in its tendency to regulate things; that it substitute a sales tax for the income taxes, and that it force the soldier bonus until the nation is less severely burdened financially. As for the business future of the United States, Mr. Gary described himself as "still an optimist" in the iron and steel industry, he said, "the profits are not satisfactory, but few, if any, ought to be doing business at a loss."

THE HENRY FORD IS NEARLY READY

GLOUCESTER, Mass., May 29.—The new schooner Henry Ford, a candidate for the international fishermen's cup, is nearly ready for sea and Captain Clayton Morrissey expects to get away for the Banks in a few days. The sails have been bent and most of the fittings installed, all remaining to take aboard being the salt and provisions. Apparently the vessel is none the worse for her misadventure on the Essex strand.
