Similarities Of Problems Pointed Out By Speaker

"Life's length is not really measured by its hours and days, but by that which we have done for our country and its peoples. We may do much in a few years and we may do nothing in a lifetime," said Gordon Bennett, Registrar of Prince of Wales College, in his address at the graduation ceremonies of the Charlottetown Hospital School of Nursing and X-Ray Technology last night.

Mr. Bennett dealt with the similarities between problems in the nursing and teaching professions, developing trends in health promotion and disease treatment, and the best choices of alternatives in spending one's time.

"Shall our nursing program be a two or three-year program?"

Shall it be hospital-centred or university-centred? Does the lag in the social and economic status of nurses discourage people from entering the field and remaining active in it? How can an increased number of capable people be recruited for the profession? Precisely the same questions... could be placed before the members of the education profession."

SOME TRENDS

The speaker noted some trends which will affect nursing practices in the future. Among these is medicare and its ramifications, care for the aged and the war on poverty; the tremendous number of emotionally disturbed young people is another disturbing trend. Nurses must be given encouragement to meet the challenge of changing situations.

Mr. Bennett continued, "Every passing moment is a juncture of many roads open to our choice. Shall we do this or that; go this way or that? Choosing between alternatives in the use of time is evidence of one of the highest attributes of humanity; freedom of will."

Mr. Bennett briefly discussed some ways in which the graduates might most profitably spend their time, and listed first the practice and development of their own profession. "As nurses," he said, "you have chosen the noblest profession a woman could choose, excepting none." A nurse must be dedicated, and always willing to do a little more than her duty. This is the mark of the top people in any profession. And finally, the nurse must find time for herself, for the development of her own unique personality.

Penitentiary Term Is Given Accused

Leonard Larkin, Armdale, was sentenced to Dorchester Penitentiary for a term of 14 years six months when he appeared before Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., in Charlottetown yesterday.

Larkin, who was charged with theft of an automobile, was remanded to Riverside Hospital for psychiatric observation for 30 days. The accused, along with James Reginald Bruce, Armdale, escaped from Riverside and was re-arrested two days later and charged.

Yesterday he faced seven charges arising out of this incident along with the original charge of car theft.

The charges were as follows: escaping custody, a second charge of theft, five separate charges of break, entry and theft, two of which involved entering a dwelling house—an offense carrying a life imprisonment sentence.

Through Counsel D. Frank Sigsworth, Larkin pleaded guilty and was sentenced to a total of 14 years and six months in Dorchester. These terms involve seven two-year sentences all to run concurrently together with one six-month sentence. Larkin will therefore serve two years and six months in Dorchester. File Closed On Air Crash

ST. JEROME, Que. (CP)—The file on an air crash in which 118 persons died, was finally closed Thursday when a coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death concerning two Toronto police officers.

The coroner's inquiry opened Dec. 3, 1963, three days after an Air Canada jet airliner crashed at nearby Ste. Therese on a flight from Montreal to Toronto.

The inquiry was adjourned Sept. 28, 1964, to await a report by an investigating commission headed by Mr. Justice Charles Chailles of Quebec Superior Court. The commission reported that the aircraft crashed as the result of a mechanical failure. It takes 72 facial muscles to frown but only 14 to smile.
