He sees the recent nine-power agreement as the greatest step forward as yet for the protection of Christian nations. He closed with the observation that the United Church of Canada, comprising approximately one fifth of the people of Canada, bears a tremendous responsibility in the furtherance of world fellowship, and that the degree of responsibility we take indicates the measure of our interest in our own country. Mr. Tom Renton moved a vote of thanks to the speaker for his very interesting address. Mr. Patterson also expressed his appreciation. Mr. Roy Cudmore, a past president of Trinity Men's Association, observed that St. David's Association is fortunate in having a "live-wire" president, Mr. Harry Yorston, to give the need impetus to their projects and activities. MAJOR TOPIC

The American food plan was the major topic of discussions in parliamentary corridors Thursday. Finance Minister Harris said Western countries are gratified that the U.S. has given assurances it will not disrupt normal trade and help Asian countries are of a similar view. Lord Reading told reporters the American plan is a new aspect of American aid and that he would not comment until he had heard the complete details from Harold Stassen, chief of the U.S. foreign operations administration. Mr. Stassen, on arrival from Washington, said his country will make sure that the surplus foods would be channelled in such a way that Canadian exports and those of other countries will not suffer. He will speak before the Colombo plan ministerial meeting today. Later, apparently to add to these assurances, the U.S. Colombo plan delegation made public an address by Samuel Waugh, assistant U.S. state secretary in which he told the ministers: "We wish to avoid disrupting normal markets or depressing world prices. We believe that two of the truly constructive uses to which these surplus commodities can be put is to increase consumption and to promote economic development."
