Reid is 100 per cent complete and will open at a meeting in the Armouries on Monday evening June 18, at 5:15 p. m. Brig. Reid has a committee of 110 men with 40 women organized by Mrs. George Buntain, president of the 5r. Ladies Aid and Mrs. Ian Burt, President of the Jr. Ladies Aid.

The greatest part of the Campaign solicitation work will be done by Brig. Reid's group and when solicitation by this group has begun the final full scale-operation of the campaign will be under way."
