

Noted Rifle Shot Breaks Leg in Fall

One of Canada's leading female rifle shots and a retired teacher of West Kent School, Mrs. Mary MacLennan Lea, the wife of C. L. Murray Harbar, is a patient in the Prince Edward Island Hospital, recovering from a broken leg.

Mrs. Lea sustained the injury in a fall at the MacLennan home, Alexandria early Saturday afternoon.

Enroute to the Squaw Point ranges, she slipped at the homestead, now operated by her brother, Vernon, to deliver some papers. Finding no help, she was in the act of returning to her car when she apparently stepped into a hole or rut and in falling broke her leg.

With nobody around, Mrs. Lea dragged herself several yards back to her car, and managed to reach the home before. After some considerable time, a neighbor arrived on the scene to check on the horn blowing.

Finding the injured woman, an ambulance was summoned from Charlottetown, and she was transported to hospital. Reports from her family indicated that Mrs. Lea was resting comfortably yesterday evening.

Holiday Traffic On Ferries Heavy

Reports on the weekend traffic using the Borden-Tormentine ferry service, indicated that early Saturday morning traffic flow was very heavy.

Throughout the holiday, the MV Abegweit, SS Prince Edward Island and the MV Cornwallis operated without any delays in schedules and full capacity.

Complete figures for Saturday and Sunday, showed that on the former 633 vehicles were moved from Borden to Tormentine and 328 from Tormentine to Borden.

On Sunday the heavy flow of traffic began to reverse itself as the weekend holiday makers and vacationers started their back home. On that day 72 vehicles were moved to Tormentine while the number coming to the island dropped to 645.

As on Monday the heavy flow of traffic to the island, in both directions for that day were not available at a late hour last night. It was expected that it would go well over 800 going to the mainland with a lesser number in the opposite direction.

On several of the trips yesterday, despite the fact that the three boats filled every bit of available space, some cars were left sitting on the wharf, waiting for the next crossing.

No figures were available for the Wood Islands-Caribou route but rumors originating from Wood Island indicated that traffic was also very heavy in both directions.

Sometime today the Prince Edward Island is due to leave for Halifax and it is expected that she will undergo her annual refit on Wednesday the Abegweit and Confederation will swing into their fall schedule.
