All British Final For Davis Cup Play

Tigers Win Doubleheader To Go Into Third Place; Yanks Beaten By Browns

NEW YORK, July 21.—(AP)—Al Thomas hantouted New York Yankee slugers with a half dozen hits today while his St. Louis Browns mates came from behind to score a 5-4 victory over the league-leaders. Johnny Brown, a three-run lead to which the Yanks had staked him in the first inning, and gave the Browns' their winning margin in the eighth, when Roy Bell's single brought two tallies across the plate. White Sox Halted At Chicago Washington Senators, vanquished three straight times by Chicago last week, bounced back for a 6-5 victory to halt the White Sox winning streak at eight straight. Washington ganged on Italo Cehlini, young Sox southpaw, for four hits and four runs in the first inning, and after Chicago had pounded Jimmy Deshong for six hits and five runs in three innings to take a 5-4 lead, tied it up on Carl Reynolds' home run in the fourth. Indians Scalp Boston Cleveland Indians playing at home, quelled a Boston uprising in the ninth inning to defeat the Red Sox 6-5 in the series opener. Mel Harder held the Red Sox in check until the final inning when Oral Hildebrand was sent to his rescue after three runs had crossed the plate. Hal Trosky's 25th home run of the season in the third inning proved the margin of victory. Harder was credited with the win, his 14th this season. Tigers Win Doubleheader At Detroit, Tigers defeated Philadelphia Athletics twice, coming from behind to take the second game of a doubleheader 9-8 after Tommy Bridges had pitched shut-out ball to take the opener 8-0. The Tigers rallied in the eighth to overcome an 8-7 lead and win the second game on daring base-running by Gerald Walker. Goslin walked in the Tiger eighth and Walker singled. Fox beat out a bunt filling the bases. Goslin scored. Walker following him to third and noticing that first baseman Dean was napping with the ball, broke for the plate and scored the winning run. The twin victories hoisted the Tigers to third place in the league standings as Boston lost to Cleveland.

HALIFAX NET STARS ADVANCE

TORONTO, July 21.—(CP)—Bounding Bevil Piers of Halifax continued today to swing a potent racket in the Ontario tennis championships, advancing into the third round of men's singles with most other favored stars. Another Halifaxian, Mrs. F. V. Woodbury, kept pace by flashing through a second round women's singles without dropping a game. But a third player from the Nova Scotia capital, Don Sanderson, was put out of men's singles play in the second round. Stacked up against young Bruce Hall of Toronto, Piers had to dig deeply into his bag of tricks before the youngster went down. The Halifaxian dropped the first set but came back to take the next pair, 4-6, 6-0, 6-2. Mrs. Woodbury coasted through two love-sets against Miss H. Haines of Toronto. Sanderson, meeting the strong Ed Connolly of Ottawa, lost in straight sets, 6-1, 6-2. Mrs. Woodbury, paired with Miss Yvette Sawyer of Montreal, got through the opening round of women's singles. The eastern pair defeated Mrs. A. Griffin and Miss H. Hendry of Toronto, 6-2, 6-1. Marcel Rainville, diminutive Montrealer, easily won two matches; George Leclerc, Ottawa, Ross Wilson, Toronto, Jack O'Hara, Ed Murphy, Ottawa, Bill Pigott, Hamilton, and Gordon Robinson, St. Catharines, moved through the day's play in impressive fashion.

McGrath In Hero Role As Aussies Win Way Into Finals Against England

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 21.—An all-British final for the historic Davis Cup was assured today when a fighting Australian team defeated Germany by four matches to one in the inter-zone final and prepared to challenge Great Britain's three-year hold on the trophy. Vivian McGrath clinched the series for the Anzacs with a 6-3, 5-7, 6-4, 6-4 victory over Heiner Henkel in the first singles game today to emerge the hero of the series. The lad with the two-fisted backhand, injected when Adrian Quist twisted an ankle, proved an invaluable partner to Crawford in winning Monday's doubles and, except for a lapse in the second set, had his singles match well in hand at all times. The veteran Jack Crawford then took the measure of a substitute German player, H. Denker, 6-3, 6-1, 6-4 to make the Australian margin 4-1. Denker played in place of Baron Von Cramm who suffered a recurrence of a leg injury. Von Cramm was the only winner for Germany. He defeated Quist in Saturday's singles, the match that cost Australia Quist's services, but the defeat was quickly equalized when Henker defaulted to Crawford after losing two sets. The German suffered from a cold and minor injury from which he appeared recovered today. The Australian team, conquerors of the United States in the American zone final and with a power reminiscent of the great days of Paterson, Wilding and Brooks, enter the challenge round for the first time since 1924 when they lost five matches to none to the United States. The last occasion the Davis Cup final was an all-British affair was in 1919 when Australia defeated Great Britain at Sydney, four matches to one. To repeat that victory in the final next Saturday they have to defeat Perry, and Bunny Austin, a task none has succeeded in since Britain won the cup in 1928. McGrath started slowly today in the match that was to make the series sure. He dropped the first three games but came back to win six in a row and run out the first set at 6-3. He took the fourth and sixth games at love on Henke's service. The second set was close with Henkel showing better control and finding the adlines and corners unerringly. He led McGrath at 5-2, but the Australian again came from behind to five all. Henkel then rallied and ran out at 7-5. This was the only time at which Henkel held the upper hand and in the next two sets McGrath showed definite superiority. With the series already won there was no need for Crawford to exert himself against Denker. He gave a fine exhibition of tennis in a match delayed by heavy rain. Officials at first announced it as an exhibition but changed their ruling after tennis experts declared this showed "deplorable lack" knowledge of Davis Cup rules.

German Challenges Braddock; Baer Is Garden's Nominee

Max Schmeling formally challenger James J. Braddock for the world's championship and through promoter Mike Jacobs posted a \$5,000 cheque with the New York State Athletic Commission as a guarantee of good faith. Earlier in the day, Jimmy Johnston, Garden promoter, said he had approached Baer with a proposal to fight Braddock again, that the Californian is willing and has agreed to the challenger's end, or 12 1/2 per cent of the gate. "We don't know anything about that," said Chairman Phelan, "but Schmeling is the challenger. Haven't we approved him?" "But General, suppose the two promoters can't get together? One controls Schmeling and the other the gate. How about a Baer fight then?" he was asked. "The first promoter to come in here with both fighters signed, gets the fight," Phelan replied.

Giants Win From \$410 Colt Dean In Tenth Smashes Two Marks

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 21.—Dizzy Dean served one home run ball too many to New York Giants today, and St. Louis Cardinals lost a 10 inning 2-1 decision in the opener of their current eastern tour. Dick Bartell, one of Dean's clean to the left field stands in the last of the 10 to break up a pitchers duel and give Carl Hubbell the decision over Dizzy for the Giant Ace's 13th victory. Cubs Hard-pressed to Win Chicago Cubs opened their current eastern invasion at Brooklyn with a 5-3 decision over the Dodgers, but only after two of their pitching aces had been rushed in to quell a ninth inning rally. For seven innng, Lon Warneke shut out the Dodgers with a total of four hits. Pirates Hammer Phillies At Philadelphia, the Pirates hammered four Philadelphia pitchers for hits and a 17-6 triumph to break their five game losing streak. Trailing by the score of 5-0 at the start of the fourth inning the Pirates went on a batting rampage, knocked Jorgens out of the box and scored nine runs on eight hits and three bases on balls. Frey Wins Hurling Duel Rightlander Denny Frey nosed out Ben Cantwell in an old fashioned pitching duel to give Cincinnati Reds a 3-2 victory over the hustling Bees at Boston. Both hurlers held the opposition to six hits and each had two strikeouts. Cantwell, however, paved the way for the Bees' winning run, pounded in by Bill Myers in the ninth, when he hit Scarsella with a pitched ball with one out.
