Mr. Donald McPhee Lee, who established the Bermuda Royal Gazette died at Hamilton on the 11th of February last. He was a native of Charlottetown. The Gazette of March 27, publishes a lengthy account of his adventurous voyage from Halifax to Bermuda in the year 1827-28, in the schooner "Sally Ann," which voyage extended over eleven weeks. It also has the following memoir:— Donald McPhee Lee was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, February 11th, 1814, where his father, Commissary General Robert Lee, was then serving in the Commissariat. The family afterwards removed to St. John's, Newfoundland, where Mr. Lee's father was stationed previous to his serving in Bermuda. In St. John's Mr. Lee's father acquired a thorough knowledge of printing, and on his arrival in Bermuda was appointed Queen's Printer, which office he filled up the time of his death February 11th, 1883, when the Royal Gazette, which he had established and conducted, had entered on the fifty-sixth year of its existence. The Royal Gazette was published in Front Street, near Yacht Club House, in the building now occupied by Miss Amery as the Sea View Hotel, up to 1831, when the office was removed to Queen Street adjoining Par-la-Ville, in the premises now occupied by Mr. O. L. Dickinson, tailor. In 1832 the office was removed to the present stand corner Reid and Barnaby Streets. In connection with the Gazette, Mr. Lee published annually from 1844 the Bermuda Almanac which has become a standard publication. In 1844 contained 36 pages, in 1850 it was increased to 72 pages, and gradually enlarged till in 1881 it extended to 244 pages affording complete information on the Bermudas. For the long period of fifty-five years, with the exception of an occasional holiday term in New York, Halifax, and England, which his health demanded and a business tour to Turkestan, the entire management of the Royal Gazette devolved on Mr. Lee. We can recall no regular instance of a life so continuously employed in the active work of the printer's press. Mr. Lee was appointed Vice-Counsel for Prince Edward Island, 1855, and Vice-Counsel for the 14th Jan., 1863, which consults he held at the period of his demise.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Budget. OTTAWA, April 6. Mr. Charlton continued the Budget Debate yesterday. He attacked the National Policy strongly, but said, that were Mr. Blake at the head of the Government, he would have regard for the industries which have grown up under protection.

Steam Communication. Pilot Fitzlyson was examined before the committee appointed to enquire into the best means of communication between P. E. Island and the mainland. He said the "Northern Light" was hardly suitable for the service. He thought a large ship built on the scale of a Newfoundland sealer would be much better. There is always a portion of the winter, he said, when it is impossible to cross the straits.

Nihilist Mine. St. PETERSBURG, April 6. A Nihilist mine has been discovered under the Kremlin, Moscow.

Dynamite. LONDON, April 6. The Birmingham Police have discovered and seized a Fenian nitro glycerine factory in Birmingham. A man was arrested here yesterday with a quantity of dynamite concealed on his person.

Telegraph Notes.

A robbery of the office of B. Treat, publisher, New York, of \$50,000 in bonds and securities is reported. Baron Wertheim, one of the wealthiest manufacturers of Austria and the celebrated fabricant of iron safes, is dead. The failure is announced of G. C. Deveau & Co., Merchants, King William Street, London. Liabilities \$4,000,000 dollars. Germany and Spain have come to a final agreement in regard to the conclusion of the treaty of commerce each power having made concessions. Returns for the year ending March 31st, show that the revenue of Great Britain was £89,004,000, and the expenditure, £89,086,000. The steamship "India" on the 2nd took the first batch of emigrants forwarded free by the British Government to America. The party numbered seventy-five. The Queen has not recovered complete health and still finds discomfort from her recent accident. She is not, however, confined to the palace and drives out regularly. A Lordsburg, California, despatch says: "No news has been received from Capt. Black and his company, and it is generally believed they have been ambushed and annihilated." Denial comes from official Government sources of the statement that defensive triple alliance has been entered into with Italy, Germany and Austria on one side, against France on the other. A laborer named Morgan was arrested in London, on the 2nd, on a charge of conspiracy. An important document and a quantity of compound used in making dynamite was found on his person. Five of the French Socialists who signed placards calling a public meeting for the last of this month, and urging the resistance in the event of interference by police, were to-day sentenced to 3 years imprisonment each. The trial of the prisoners charged with the Phoenix Park murders and other crimes, which was expected to begin on Tuesday, has been postponed for a few days, as sufficient funds have not been raised for the defence. Late reports from Coomassie, Upper Guinea, say that the King of Ashantee had relinquished his throne, and that the entire coast of West Africa is in a state of confusion. No details of the circumstances attending the abdication are at hand. Telegrams were received by various members of the Reichstag, on the 4th, from Kiel announcing that Herr Vollmar, a member of the Socialist body, was arrested there. Herr Vollmar was on his return from a Socialist congress at Copenhagen, at which resolutions strongly denunciatory of Prince Bismarck had been passed. Advice from Hermosillo, Arizona, to the Star says it is officially stated that there is not a single Apache in Sonora, the last, a party of about 200 strong, having been driven across the Arizona River on Saturday. Generals Crook and Carbo have been in consultation by telegraph for four hours. It is thought that Mexican troops will co-operate with those of the United States in Arizona. In the British House of Commons on the 3rd, Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice, Under Foreign Secretary, in reply to Kennard, who questioned him with regard to certain structures which appeared recently in a New York newspaper on the manner in which the United States had dealt with the sum awarded by the Geneva Congress for compensation of sufferers by the depredations of Confederate cruisers, said it was contrary to usage and inconsistent with the dignity of the House to base a discussion on what was said in a foreign destitute of official character, and only representing the opinions of its own writers. Lord Randolph Churchill's letter to the London Times, advocating the claims of Lord Salisbury to the sole leadership of the Tory party, has created strong indignation among the general body of the Tory party. Measures are in progress intended to satisfy Sir Stafford Northcote that he may be sure of the unwavering support of his followers in the Commons, on the 3rd, Sir Stafford Northcote rose to ask a question, when he was greeted with prolonged cheers from the Tory side. This is regarded as a strong demonstration that the letter of Sir Ran-

dolph Churchill is not approved of by the Conservatives.

The story of a triple defensive alliance of Germany, Austria and Italy against France, which is now generally looked upon as a feeler, has been made the occasion by the press of Italy for many anti-French articles. The "Liberta" has an editorial setting forth that if the French republic assumes arrogant airs in her dealings with the other countries of Europe she will find herself confronted with the unpleasant spectacle of several Powers united for mutual defence. The "Journal de Rome," a clerical paper, goes still further and uses significantly vigorous language. It says from the Baltic to the Island of Sicily the French republic has none but enemies. If she but moves a finger she is at the mercy of her enemies.

The reason given why retirement of Gen. Thiebautin from the French Bureau of Minister of War may be expected, is that M. Waldeck Rousseau, Minister of the Interior, refused to have published in the official journal, a note, the effect of which would have been to deprive General De Gallitot of the command of the cavalry. Ramifications and manoeuvres of this dispute are important, as showing the aversion which extreme Republicans have to General De Gallitot and other leaders, who took an active hand in the suppression of the Commune. Rumors that cabinet changes are imminent continue to be circulated. "La France" says Prime Minister Ferry has telegraphed to Tirard, Minister of Finance, who is at present in Algeria, to curtail his visit and return to France. A cabinet meeting was held on the 3rd which is reported to have been very stormy. Gen. Thiebautin has declared that rather than change his decision in regard to Gen. De Gallitot he would resign his portfolio.

Weather Bulletin. Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the Maritime Provinces.

TORONTO, April 6—10 a. m. Southeast to southwest winds, cloudy mild weather with occasional rains.

Peter Cooper, died at the ripe old age of 92 years. He was engaged in a number of different business enterprises, but finally he entered into the manufacture of glue and isinglass, which he carried on for half a century, and by which he acquired a large fortune. About 1830 his attention was called to the importance of the iron manufacture, for which he erected large works near Baltimore. Disposing of these, he subsequently erected a rolling and wire mill in New York, in which he was the first to successfully use anthracite coal in the puddling of iron. He built the first locomotive engine constructed in America, from designs of his own. He invested a large capital in the development of the electric telegraph. The celebrated croton aqueduct, from which New York receives its principal water supply, was due in a large measure to his earnest advocacy while a member of the Common Council of that city. He took a deep interest in all educational matters, more especially in technological education. He erected the building known as the "Cooper Institute," at a cost of more than \$550,000 and subsequently added a cash endowment of \$150,000. Though somewhat retiring in disposition, he was a very popular gentleman, and his death will be heard with regret by hosts of persons who had made his acquaintance.
