

NHL Regulars, Hopefuls Start Battle For Berths

By the end of this week, National Hockey League regulars and hopefuls will all be battling for their jobs.

Toronto Maple Leafs, the cup champions, stepped into their Peterborough training site last week with some 60 veterans and rookies. By the time the season gets under way next month, less than a third of them will have convinced manager-coach Punch Imlach they belong in the big league.

There is not likely to be much change in the team they wound up in second place last season and went on to take the cup. A replacement has to be found for left winger Bert Olinstead, picked up in the draft by New York Rangers; and there is speculation that Kent Douglas, a defenceman from Springfield Indians of the American Hockey League, will gain a spot on the rearguard corps.

Chicago Black Hawks and Boston Bruins opened camp Monday. As usual, the Hawks are training in St. Catharines, but the Bruins have shifted from Niagara Falls, Ont., to Boston. 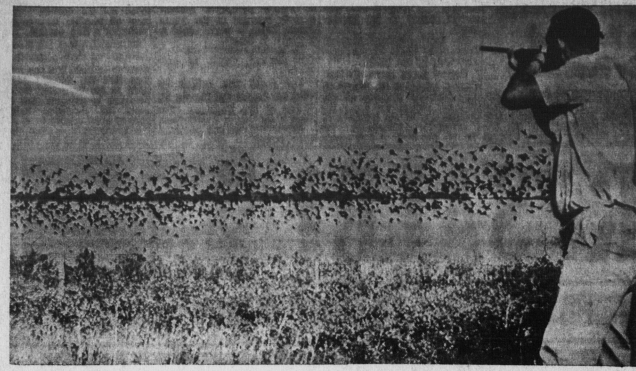
But there could be a number of shifts in last season's Bruins which except for the occasional spurt, looked like a last-place club—and that's how they finished.

Gov't May Stress More Jobs In New Session's Opening

OTTAWA (CP)—The government may stress special incentives to stimulate production and employment at an early date in the parliamentary session opening Sept. 27.

Informants indicated Tuesday that the government has a choice of two courses, and may adopt both of them, with the double purpose of economic stimulus and a bid for support against the Liberal opposition's threat of a motion of non-confidence.

Outnumbered 148 to 116 by the combined Liberal, Social Credit and New Democratic Party opposition, the government evidently feels it must make a positive appeal at least for temporary voting support in the house with a concrete plan for the economy.

A possible course would be to write the business incentives now being considered into the throne speech in the hope that they will appeal to Social Credit. That party's leader, Robert Thompson, has called for incentives to combat the country's current financial and economic difficulties.

Another step may be to postpone debate on the throne speech for early presentation of a baby budget to give effect to economic measures now approved before Parliament was dissolved last spring for the June 18 general election.

In his Budget April 10, Finance Minister Fleming, now justice minister, proposed a number of economic incentives to stimulate production and employment.

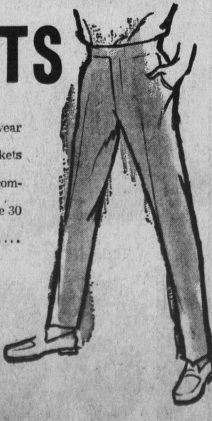
