Flower Show To Last Two Days

Besides the two trophies, the Tray and the Rose Bowl, which are up each year for competition, it was decided to award a first prize in each of the 136 classes of the show.

\$30,050 Federal Grant For New O'Leary Hospital

The Federal Government Wednesday announced a national health grant of \$30,050 toward the costs of erecting the new 27 bed Community Hospital at O'Leary. This amount represents approximately one third of the estimated cost of the new building which is being constructed by Island labour.

The hospital will have the dimensions of 144 by 49 by 40 feet, the excavation is now completed and work of preparing the forms for the foundation is progressing.
