

# Frank W. Shepherd Grabs Governor-General's Medal

CONNAUGHT RANGES, Ont. (CP)—Crack rifle shot Frank W. Shepherd of Ottawa, who had been gunning for the Governor-General's Medal since he was 15, finally made it at 67. The medal is the highest prize of the week-long Dominion of Canada Rifle Association annual matches which ended here Saturday.

The retired regular army major won the hard won, outshooting three of Canada's best shots in a tie-breaking shoot-off after four rifle men had scored 239 points of a possible 250 in the fourth Governor-General's Match.

The match was fired over a three-day period at these big ranges near Ottawa. Some 600 of the country's best shots entered an elimination match Thursday. The top 300 scorers were allowed to shoot 15 rounds on each of the 300- and 600-yard ranges Friday and 20 rounds at 900 yards Saturday.

Maj. Shepherd received \$200 and a gold watch for his win.

**WINS SECOND CROWN**  
Maj. R. W. (Dick) Hampton, 46, of the Royal Canadian School of Infantry, Camp Borden, Ont., won the Canadian Army service rifle championship for a second time.

He fired a total 1,420 points of a possible 1,515 in the matches on which the championships are based. He took the same title in 1957.

Names were announced Saturday of the 18 riflemen who will be invited to shoot next summer as members of the Canadian Bisley team at the National Rifle Association matches at Bisley, England. They were the top 18 scorers in the Bisley aggregate, based on total points in seven main matches.

Top man on the list was Gerry Ouellette, 24, of Deep River, Ont., a design draftsman at the Atomic Energy of Canada Limited plant at Deep River.

Another crack shot, Edson L. Warner of Lennoxville, Que., Saturday won the first match fired with the army's new 7.62mm. FN rifle at an annual DORA meet.

Competitors at the meet here included regular and reserve army, RCAF and RCMP personnel, cadets, civilians and a score of women.

Also highly regarded are Gail Mustard, young sharpshooter from Charlottetown, Mrs. Fred Cannon and Mrs. W. E. Cotton, both of whom are former Island champs.

Today the qualifying round will be played — rain or shine — and the top 16 golfers will comprise the championship division.

For the next three days the entrants will engage in match play — one golfer pitted against another — until the competitors are reduced to the two finalists who will meet Thursday morning and afternoon for the crown.

Also to be decided at Belvedere during the next four days are the Maritime senior and junior championships.

The junior title will go to the junior golfer with the lowest gross after the qualifying round and there will be prizes both for the champion and the golfer getting low net.

The senior competition — ladies over 45 — will play a foursome the first day and medal play for the next two. In addition to the glory winner will be awarded the Mary Gordon trophy.

With the greens and fairway of Belvedere in perfect shape, officials of the tourney are looking forward to one of the most successful Maritime tourneys in years.

The Chicago Cubs inflicted the third defeat upon San Francisco Sunday in a four-game series but the Giants maintained their 2 1/2 game National League lead on the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Chicago's American League leading White Sox also lost, dropping a 7-2 decision to Kansas City and saw their first place margin reduced to three games over Cleveland.

The St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Dodgers 5-3 to prevent Los Angeles from picking up ground on the Giants who were beaten 5-4 by the Cubs. Milwaukee's third place Braves defeated Pittsburgh 5-2 after the Pirates had won their third straight from the Braves, winning the opener 3-1. Philadelphia swept both ends of a double-header from Cincinnati 8-5 and 6-0.

The Indians missed a glorious chance to pick up even more ground on the White Sox. They scored five runs against Detroit in the first inning then watched disconsolately as a violent rainstorm hit Briggs Stadium in the second inning and prevented any further play.

**HALT LOSS STREAK**  
Washington whipped Baltimore 6-1 and the New York Yankees split with Boston. The Red Sox won the opener 6-5 to hand the defending champions their fifth straight loss but New York won the nightcap 4-2.

The Giants outthit the Cubs, 5-5 but two of Chicago's hits were home runs by Ernie Banks and Lee Walls. Banks, who hit his 36th, got it with one on. Walls homer came with two on. Both were hit off 16 — game winner Johnny Antonelli, who suffered his seventh loss.

Bill White and rookie Gene Oliver drove in all St. Louis' runs to give Larry Jackson his 10th victory against 11 defeats. While got two hits including his 11th homer. Roger Craig was the loser for the Dodgers. The entire game was played in the rain.

Southpaw Warren Spahn salvaged the finale of the four-game series for Milwaukee. He hurled an eight-hitter for his 16th triumph. The split left the third place Braves 3 1/2 games behind the Giants.
