Abner The Great, Peter Clegg Double Dash Winners

Abner The Great and Peter Clegg were double dash winners at the Charlottetown Driving Park before a small crowd of fans yesterday. Abner The Great, owned by James Heffel and driven by B. Whelan was an easy winner in the second and sixth dashes. He paced fine miles on both occasions with his first mile of 2:13 1/5 being the best time of the night. Peter Clegg made a fine comeback to win both dashes of the feature race. Remed by Colin Burt, the Clegg horse led all the way in the first mile and practically all the way in the second mile. Esso moved up along the rail to finish second in the first dash while Prince Budlong nosed out Esso for second place honors in the final dash. O'Meara drove Real Fingo to a win in the Irish dash on the card and Col D. A. MacKinnon drove a great mile with Pet Hanover to win the fifth dash by two lengths over his second place Bud's Belle. Ranay MacDonald took Belle Budlong up from third place in the stretch to pass Yankee Joan and win the third dash. Bob Clegg, driven by Cyril Smith, came up from sixth place at the three-quarter mark to win the seventh race. The daily double on Abner The Great and Peter Clegg paid \$148.35. U. S. Retains Top Spot In Tuna Tournament

The United States remained in the lead at the international tuna tournament here Thursday although they didn't share in the five fish caught during the second day of the three-day match. Argentina and Cuba, both luckless on Wednesday, boated fish Thursday. Venezuela, Mexico and the British Empire were the other lucky teams. France is the only one of the seven teams—representing 11 countries—that hasn't caught a bluelin. The United States, on the basis of two fish caught Wednesday, have 1,669 2.3 points. Mexico is second with 1,458 2.3 points and Venezuela third with 1,248 2.3. The British Empire team was knocked out of fourth place by Argentina, which collected 837 points on one fish, the largest of the day. The British Empire has 724 points and Cuba 260. The tuskier river estuary gave up three of Thursday's catch although one caught there Wednesday. Twelve fish have been caught in match play so far this year. Only four were caught in the three days in 1953. Carlos Ortiz Basualdo of Avda, Argentina, caught the largest fish of the day and won for his team the extra 200 bonus points. Basualdo jerked in a 397-pounder in 29 minutes. Basualdo's fish still is well below the 783-pounder landed by Joe Gale of New York Wednesday. A 200-point bonus also goes to the team boating the largest fish of the meet. Gale's fish was the largest caught so far this season. Mexico's team captain, Roberto Cantu Arreola from Monterrey landed the smallest fish, a 114-pounder. E. T. (Joe) Lindley of Bermuda was the lucky member of the British Empire team when he hauled in a 382-pounder in 29 minutes flat on Soldier's Rip. Dr. Guillermo Machado of Caracas was first to catch a fish Thursday. He had his strike just 21 m-

Chick MacLeod Winner Of S'side Men's Golf Title

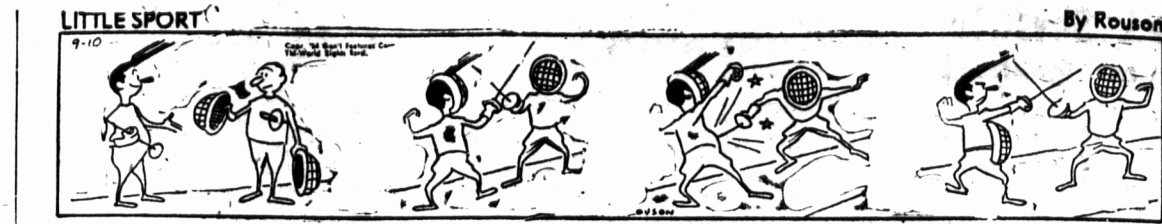
"Chick" MacLeod won the men's golf championship of the Summerside Golf and Country Club on Wednesday afternoon by defeating Derwin Huestis in the 36-hole final match 6 and 5. Huestis was the club champion in 1951, 1952 and 1953 with MacLeod winning in 1949 and 1950. Both golfers were in fine form during the match with MacLeod being a bit steadier on the greens. On the first 18 holes in the morning MacLeod shot a sparkling 74 with Huestis close behind him with a 77 and MacLeod took a three-hole lead going into the afternoon round. Both boys kept close to par in the final holes of the match which ended on the 31st green. The following is a short summary of the last few holes of the match: 26th hole. On this 300-yard hole MacLeod had a lead of 4. MacLeod drove 210 yards, was short on his second, chipped on the green and 2 putted for a 9 bogey. Huestis drove 220 up the middle, approached on the green in 2 and went down for a par 4 to cut MacLeod's lead to 3 holes. 27th hole. Huestis drove 200 yards to the left in the rough and as he tried to play his second shot of the brook, was too strong and he landed in the water for a stroke penalty. He chipped on the green and 2 putted for a double bogey 6. MacLeod drove 220 yards, approached to the near edge of the green and 2 putted for a par 4 to go 4 up on the match. MacLeod drove 200 yards up the middle, used a three iron to reach the left side of the green, chipped to 6 feet off the hole and missed the putt for a bogey 5. Huestis drove 220 yards and went over the back of the green, chipped on and 2 putt to halve the hole with a 5. 28th hole. MacLeod landed on top of the green with an 8 iron on this short 124 yard hole. Rimmed the cup on a nice putt to get an easy par 3. Huestis was short on his tee shot, took 2 approaches to get on the green and putted for a double bogey 5 and MacLeod takes a lead of 5 holes. 30th hole. 518 yards against the wind, MacLeod hits his tee shot 200 yards on the left side of the fairway, used his 3 wood for his second shot and was short on his approach. His fourth shot landed 6 feet from the pin but he missed the putt for a bogey 6. Huestis got in the edge of the woods to his left on his drive, made the green on his 4th shot, 2 putted for a bogey 6 to tie the hole. 31st hole. Both golfers landed parallel to the green but to the left. Huestis chipped to within 3 feet of the cup but missed his putt for a bogey 4. MacLeod chipped his approach to within 2 feet of the hole and sank for a par 3 to go 6 holes up on his opponent to win the match and the Harold Gaudet trophy for 1954. Indians Move Five And One-Half Games Ahead Of Yanks

The Cleveland Indians strengthened their iron grip on the American League pennant Thursday, moving 5 1/2 games in front of the New York Yankees who needed a lucky bounce to escape being victims of a no-hitter in Baltimore. The Indians were given a 5-4 triumph over Philadelphia when Burtchy walked in the winning run in the 11th inning. Enos Slaughter's routine ground-er which took a sudden bounce over the head of second baseman Bobby Young in the eighth inning was the only blemish on Joe Coleman's bid for a no-hitter. The Yankees lost 1-0. The New York Giants, given a chance to add a full game to their margin over the idle Milwaukee Braves, wasted the opportunity by splitting a twin bill with the lowly Chicago Cubs. The Giants squeaked through in the opener, 7-6 on Hank Thompson's bases-loaded squeeze bunt with two out in the ninth. But they bowed 3-0 in the nightcap before the combined talents of Bob Rush, Jim Davis and Hal Jeffcoat. The Brooklyn Dodgers broke out of a three-game slump with a 10-1 rout of the St. Louis Cardinals and pulled within 5 1/2 games of the Giants. The Dodgers piled up a 10-run edge before the Cards finally came through with their

Announces CAHA Rule Change

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Thursday announced a rule change designed to prevent wholesale jumping of players to United States teams. Bill Hanley, spokesman for the association, said the rule requires the transfer of any junior or senior "A" players to be approved by the club president and secretary and by W. A. Hewitt, registrar-treasurer of the CAHA. Before, one player of a team could transfer to the United States without obtaining a release. The new rule applies only to junior and senior "A" players.
