# Crowds At Selkirk Park Join In Scottish Games

A crowd estimated as well over 1,000 persons turned out yesterday at Lord Selkirk Park in Edmonton for the annual "gathering of the clans," sponsored by the Caledonia Club of Prince Edward Island.

Fine weather—with the exception of a brief wind and a few cloudy periods—prevailed throughout the day which saw skilled lads and lassies vie for honors in the highland dancing and piping events.

For the sports-minded spectators, a full afternoon of highland games was held, including races, high jumping and tossing the caber.

A big crowd pleaser during the day's events was the performance of the Balmoral Girls' Pipe Band from St. John's, N.S.

While this province produces many fine highland dancers, the open senior and open junior highland dancing championships went to dancers from outside the province. Winner of the senior championship trophy donated by Mrs. Douglas McGowan, Montague, was Diane Buckley, a 20-year-old blonde from St. Catharines, Ont. Fourteen-year-old Diane Pottie, Sydney, N.S., was awarded the open junior highland dancing trophy, donated by Queen's County M.P.'s Heath MacQuarrie and Hon. Angus MacLean.

The traditional "100,000 welcomes" was given by Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, resident in kilt, who officially declared the day's festivities open.

In the opening ceremony, which was brief, and which was presided over by Caledonia Club President Philip Barlow, Dr. Dewar welcomed everyone to Lord Selkirk Park in the name of the Caledonia Club, which has done so much to provide this entertainment in the Scottish tradition.

Dr. Dewar said Selkirk Park is a "fitting memorial to those brave pioneers who settled the area and developed it."

Platform guests included Queens County M.P.'s Heath MacQuarrie and Hon. Angus MacLean and the honorary chairman of the Caledonia Club, Dugald MacKinnon, Mount Buchanan.
