OTTAWA NOTES

Parliament Meets Feb. 25th.

AN EXPLANATION.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—The meeting of Parliament has been fixed for February the 25th.

It transpires that two of the tenders received for the fast Atlantic service are from the Allans and the Furness Line.

The Grit papers are making a characteristic howl because a cheque has been issued to the contractors for the Kingston Graving Dock for \$32,000, despite a former decision of the Government to withhold the accounts due until the pending matters were settled.

The facts are that the Government some months ago decided to withhold the amounts then due, and are still doing so. The cheque just issued is for work performed since that time and is in accordance with a promise given by the Hon. Frank Smith, acting Minister of Public Works, at the date of the guarantee, as an inducement to carry on the work to completion, and thus avoid the delay which at that time seemed inevitable.

A Foolish Man Robbed.

HALIFAX, Jan. 23.—George Scott, who states that he belongs to Charlottetown, was robbed of twenty dollars in a house in Brunswick Street last night.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—In a billiard contest between Slosson and Schaefer last night, for the championship of the world and a one thousand dollar stake, Schaefer won by 800 to 592.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Col. A. North has been appointed assistant adjutant General of Canada, in succession to Col. Goldie.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—Hyman, grit, who was unseated here yesterday, will again contest the constituency. The costs in the case which the unseated candidate will have to pay amount to \$1,125.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 21.—The Carew's famous committee, in order to enable the farmers to continue their work, has decided to purchase ten thousand horses in Siberia to place the farmers' horses killed on account of the famine.

CAIRO, Jan. 21.—After official notice of the accession of Abbas Pasha has been given to the powers, the Khedive will make a tour abroad, visiting Constantinople, Odessa, St. Petersburg, Vienna and Paris.

PARIS, January 21.—M. Laur, who was struck by M. Constant, Minister of Interior, in the Chamber of Deputies on Tuesday, sent a challenge last night to the minister to fight a duel. The latter refused to accept the challenge and M. Laur has written to M. Constant repeating the insulting language which he used toward him in the chamber.

CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—The city is threatened with a water famine this morning. The lake crib at the end of the tunnel main, the source of the city's water supply, is choked up with ice and is frozen solid for the first time since the tunnel was built. All manufacturing in the city were unable to start up this morning and hotels and residences could not secure even enough water for cooking purposes. In case of a serious fire, the fire department would be almost helpless.

MONTREAL, Jan. 21.—The session of the royal commission which opens here on the 28th inst., is looked forward to with much interest. John P. Whelan, whose name has been so much connected with the boiling transactions at Mercier's victim, will be one of the first to give evidence. The interesting part of his evidence will relate to the first amount of money he claims to have paid Mercier. The amount was \$4,000 and was paid the premier in a little room off the office of one of the leading hotels here in the presence of the land lord who will be called on to confirm the story. Another amount likewise paid Mercier in the same place, under the same circumstances was \$6,000.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The funeral of Cardinal Manning took place to-day from the Oratory at Brompton. Nearly all the best families in England, including all the Roman Catholic nobility, were represented in the Oratory, many members of the House of Commons and House of Lords being present. The funeral procession was one of the most solemnly magnificent ever witnessed. It was headed by 500 priests in full canonical robes; after them came 14 bishops in the most elaborate ecclesiastical robes. Behind the bishops were a number of canons in rich mourning vestments and behind them a host of chorists. The bishop of Clifton (Hon. Wm. Clifford) officiated at the Requiem Mass, Rev. John C. Hedley, bishop of Newport and Menevia, preached the sermon.

MADE HIM INSANE.—In their house on a lonely road leading from Palmer, Mass., to Ware, a few nights ago, Herbert C. Gates, the 31 year old son of Josiah Gates, became violently insane while suffering from the grip, and after struggling for an hour with his mother for the possession of a shot gun, secured the weapon and rushing out into the yard fatally shot himself. The father is dangerously ill.

THE EREMA HERE.—The steamer Northumberland called at Georgetown yesterday evening on her way from Pictou and took the barkentine Erema in tow. This morning about six o'clock she left the Erema near the Black Buoy and came in with the mails. Subsequently the tug W. H. Atkeson went out to the Erema and towed her in.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—The marriage of Mr. Fred Herman Sawyer and Miss Julia E. Smith was solemnized at the residence of the bride, Gloucester, Mass., on Tuesday last, January 19th. Mr. Sawyer is well and favorably known to almost every person in Charlottetown, having been engaged as purser on the Boston steamers for about twenty years. Last year he acted as purser on the Carroll. THE EXAMINER extends congratulations.

BOARD OF HEALTH.—A meeting of the Board of Health was called for this forenoon to consider the applications for license to operate slaughter-houses within the city limits received from Saunders & Campbell, Ebenezer W. Heatley and William Sellar. After giving the matter some attention the meeting adjourned until Tuesday evening next for a fuller attendance of members of the Board. The applications for license were referred to the Health Officer, Dr. Johnson, to report upon on Tuesday night.
