Shocks of earthquake accompanied by a tidal wave have ravaged the northern part of Japan. The entire town of Kamatsubi has been destroyed and one thousand persons killed. During twenty hours there were 150 distinct shocks of earthquake.

THUNDER STORMS AND SURPRISES EXPECTED.

Sir,—Everything is up to fever heat here. The thermometer is 86° in the shade, whilst indications of thunder showers and political surprises are evident this p. m. Nomination day passed off quietly here, whilst in the city of Hull, just across the river, a general party fight characterized the proceedings. Police stations and lots of blood cooled matters after an hour's free indulgence in what sports term "the many art." We have a three-cornered contest in this city. The P. P. A. element, together with the McCarty anti-temoral faction, who party their Protestantism as being above and better than the old kind, seek to injure the Government candidates, but little is feared from such an union.

A desperate struggle marks every hour's doings in Wright county and city of Hull, P. Q., where Mr. McDougall is fighting against Mr. Devlin. Matters, too, are unusually exciting in the counties of Carleton, Russell and Pre-cott, where unexpected surprises may be looked for on next Tuesday.

Just now a very forcible canvass is being indulged in here by Hon. Senator Scott and others, who charge that P. E. Island has been openly bribed with branch railways, tunnels, &c. So fine and fixed is this charge that the senator has undertaken to inform the Ottawa citizens the particular sum they will be called on to contribute to the Island undertakings.

There is much speculation here as to what the majority will be for the Government. Some have it 20, more say 30, while others claim 40 above all comers.

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THE POLITICAL CAMPAIGN.

EAST PRINCE

The electors of Emyvale and vicinity assembled last night in the schoolhouse, which was packed to the doors, in order to hear the political issues discussed. The meeting, however, was entirely one-sided, as none of the Opposition orators appeared to find Protestants in their colleagues.

The chair was ably filled by D. McDonald, Esq.

Mr. P. McCourt, who represented Mr. Hunt, was the first speaker, and dealt with the political issues of the campaign, scoring Mr. Davies and his colleagues for their obstruction to all measures advanced by the Government in the interests of P. E. Island.

Mr. Alex. Shaw was the next speaker, and delivered one of the best speeches which has been heard in the county during the campaign. He referred to the Manitoba school question at length, and appealed to the Protestants in the audience to support the action of the Government on this question. He was cheered to the echo.

Mr. John Bradley delivered an excellent speech, and referred to the trade policy of the Government and Opposition, and to the branch railways. He said there never was an occasion since Confederation in which the people of the Island should stand more closely than at the present time—should be more united in the interests of the Province.

Donald E. Campbell, Esq., made a most vigorous speech, in the course of which he stated that it did not lie in the mouth of Mr. David Laird to go about the country denouncing separate schools, when he himself established separate schools in the Northwest. He was well received.

Mr. J. J. Johnston, in behalf of Dr. Jenkins, said a few words respecting the prospects of the Conservative Party throughout the Island and the Dominion.

Mr. J. J. Bradley followed in a fine speech, referring to Sir Richard Wright's radical opinions on the trade policy, and also dealt with the Manitoba School question.

The chairman asked if there were any liberals among the audience who would wish to say anything, but there was no response. The grits were evidently afraid to meet the electors.
