

Arabi and the Mahdi. EUROPEANS FAIL TO COMPREHEND THE POWER OF MOHAMMEDANISM.

The Constantinople Correspondent of the Morning Post has had an opportunity of talking with a gentleman who recently arrived from Ceylon, and who, during the last few months, had many and continuous opportunities of seeing and conferring with Arabi Pacha. This gentleman said:—"The victory of the Mahdi would cause no surprise whatever to Arabi Pacha, who over and over again repeated to me that his influence was very great, and that England should be prepared to see him march some day or another on Cairo, Arabi Pacha said that nothing had struck him so much as the complete ignorance of Europeans as to the power of Mohammedanism. What Europeans were pleased to call fanaticism was a spirit of self-sacrifice and devotion, combined with courage and organization, which must make Europe tremble. It was that sentiment, and not his personal ambition, which had made him in the space of a few weeks master of the situation in Egypt. His name had become popular all over the Mohammedan world, and as a proof of this, Arabi Pacha showed piles of volumes which during his exile in Ceylon had been filled by the most influential personages in India, who still continue going to Ceylon, as on a pilgrimage, to confer with the promoter of the Egyptian rebellion and write their names and words expressing hope in a speedy triumph in books, which are purposely kept in the house of Arabi. Ever since his arrival in Ceylon, Arabi Pacha expressed the opinion that the Mahdi would triumph, as he knew better than Europeans appear to do the spirit of the populations, whose dread of being overpowered by Christian nations is indescribable.

The Russian Czar. REMARKABLE MYSTERY SURROUNDING THE MONARCH.

"At one time," says the New Free Press, of Vienna, speaking of the Russian Czar, "when Alexander resided as heir-apparent in the Anitchkoff Palace, he sought for popularity with youthful zeal; but all that seems to be past. The burden of the crown keeps down his energies, and the fear of a revolution banishes him from society. Nobody knows what he wants, and perhaps he does not know it himself. Two years and a half he has now held the sceptre; six months ago he was crowned; and yet, speaking of Russia we might almost be persuaded to imitate the Emperor Nicholas when he spoke about France. As if there were no King at Paris, Nicholas never mentioned Louis Philippe, but spoke only of his Ministers. Since the coronation nothing has changed, the remembrance of it gives rise to the thoughts of no reform, and no higher will has attempted to bring light into Russia's situation among the European Powers. The Emperor went to Copenhagen, and optimists accompanied the journey with the hope that at the Court of his father-in-law he would learn to know that a constitutional monarch lives happier and safer than an absolute ruler whose people vehemently demand reform. The heart of optimism is large as the world, but his brains are small as a nutshell. Alexander III. is a mystic figure to the Russian people—a masked form which now and then appears for one short moment, then again disappears in the darkness of a remote residence difficult of access, and invisible to the outside world."
