

Banks Threat Is Analyzed

OTTAWA (CP)—S. J. Smith, president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers (CLC), said Tuesday that he is analyzing the threat to lead his Seafarers' International Union out of the Canadian Labor Congress only because he knows it is going to get fired on.

He was commenting on a statement at Montreal Monday by Banks, who said S.I.U. members have authorized the walkout unless difficulties with the brotherhood are settled.

"The statement that the S.I.U. may quit the congress because of alleged pressure from the brotherhood," Mr. Smith said, "can be taken as an indication that he does not intend to comply with the CLC directive that he hand back members raided from the National Association of Marine Engineers (CLC) within 60 days, or stand suspended. 'CAN'T FIRE ME'."

"He is really saying: 'You can't fire me. I quit.'"

Mr. Smith is a member of the CLC executive council, which issued the ultimatum last month at a closed meeting here. His statement was the first official confirmation of published reports of the action.

Smith added: "His charge that the brotherhood has raided the S.I.U. is completely without foundation—a smoke screen to hide the fact that he and his union stand convicted by the CLC of raiding an affiliate. It is true that in recent years our brotherhood has clashed with the S.I.U. in the organization of unorganized seamen, chiefly on the Atlantic coast. It is significant that in every such instance the workers involved have chosen the brotherhood in preference of the seafarers."

Cancer Research Speedup Is Seen

HALIFAX (CP)—Federal health department researcher Dr. J. F. Morgan of Ottawa said Tuesday Canadian projects on tissue culture could lead to speedups in certain phases of cancer research.

Dr. Morgan presented a paper to the 42nd annual conference of the Canadian Institute of Chemistry which entered its second day Tuesday. It winds up today.

Dr. Morgan, who heads a health department laboratory, said tissue culture—the study of growth of body cells outside the body—could be used as a method of screening cell poisons in evaluating possible anti-cancer drugs.

Mrs. B. Doyle invited the members for next meeting. The president closed the meeting with prayer, after which lunch was served.

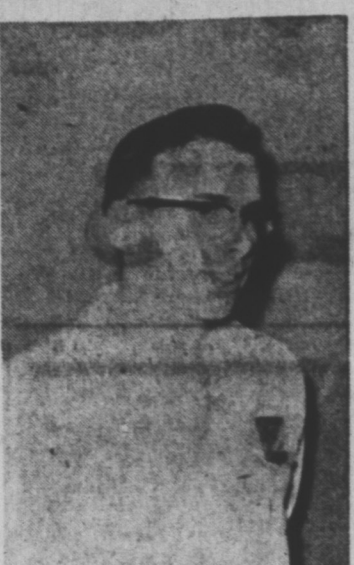
WEST COVEHEAD W.I.
