

# Richard Is Only Scorer As Canadiens Shut Out New York Rangers 3-0

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (CP) — Maurice (the Rocket) Richard scored all the goals tonight as Montreal Canadiens blanked New York Rangers 3-0 before 8,374 National Hockey League fans. It was Montreal goalie Gerry McNeil's fifth shutout of the season. The tallies increased the Rocket's goal total for the season to 24 and extended his point total to 34—third highest in the league. His goal total tops the circuit.

The Montreal victory sent the Canadiens into a third-place tie with Boston Bruins, each with 34 points, one better than the Rangers.

McNeil worked hard for his shutout. He stopped 32 shots against only 24 for Chuck Rayner in the New York nets.

Richard scored his first goal at 9:52 of the first period after taking a pass from defenceman Doug Harvey. His other two goals came within a minute during the third period. Bert Olmstead and Elmer Lach set up his second marker at 17:38 with Olmstead again in on the third goal 28 seconds later.

## Charles Looks Ready For Friday's Bout

 NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (AP) — Ezzard Charles looked sharp and ready today as he boxed four rounds in his final heavy drill for Friday's heavyweight title defence against Lee Oma.

The lean champion from Cincinnati, a 6-to-1 favorite, will weigh about 184 for the 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden.

While Charles boxed, Oma was breaking camp at Greenwood Lake, N.Y. He finished work Monday. He'll come in around 192.

Interest appeared to be picking up with ringside seats in demand at the International Boxing Club. Some 12,000 fans and \$66,000 are expected by IBC officials. The bout, scheduled for 10 P. M. E.S.T., will receive full radio and television network treatment.

Charles, making his sixth defence, refused to predict a knockout. But the unofficial talk was about 2 to 1 against Oma going the limit.

It was obvious from the final drill that Charles can be expected to drum heavily at the body of the 34-year-old contender. It's no secret that he hopes to wear down his stuffing foe before Oma's stop-and-go tactics become too annoying.

Charles boxed 10 days at the up-down gym for the Oma fight, coming scarcely a month after his defence against Nick Barone at Cincinnati, Dec. 5. Eazy stopped Freddie Besore and Barone and out-pointed a bewildered Joe Louis in his three 1950 starts.

Oma, idle since he whipped Bob Satterfield Sept. 25 at Buffalo, his adopted home, said he was ready for the fight of his life.

Tex Sullivan, Lee's manager, revealed their strategy would be to start fast and hope to pile up a wide early lead in 10 rounds. They expect a strong finish by Charles in the last five rounds. Sullivan says Oma will do less walking away with hands down in his old style and more punching from his flat-footed stance.

Despite his in-and-out record, Oma ranks No. 4 among the heavyweight contenders. He has won 53 of 81 since 1935, while Charles, five years younger at 29, has won 69 of 75.

One can't help wondering what our hockey friends across the water will be thinking and saying today after the "lawless" Islanders rang up their 13-2 basketball score against the Moncton Hawks here on Tuesday night in a regular Maritime Senior Hockey League fixture. There was no "battering" or "twisting of arms" to do it either. In fact, if it had been a contest that produced less in the way of bumps and rough play than the minimum that actually took place, it would have been so completely dull and uninteresting that it is unlikely fans would have stuck it out to the end. Many left as it was at the end of the second period when the score read 7-1 for Islanders.

It was "all hockey" every inch of the way, and if you don't believe it, ask some of the Moncton players who were in that game. There was so much smooth passing, fast skating and high geared power plays that Hawks' attempt to cope with it was completely inadequate. They tried at first, but in the end gave up in despair and bewilderment, and for the most part local fans became almost sympathetic towards the Hub City hockeyists and the ever game Les Colvin in the Moncton cage. Bearing the brunt of his team's inability to keep the Islanders in check, Colvin handled more rubber than the employees of a tire company, and although he never stopped working, nothing short of boarding up the net would have stopped the avalanche of pucks thrown at him.

With centreman Wes "Bucko" Trainor, Hub Beaudry and Frank Bathgate all having a free night from competition, Bruno "Red" Savoie, Mac Beaton and Marcel Clements took over the pivot positions for the night and made mighty fine jobs of it too. Keeping their wingers on the "hump" all night, including big defenceman Larry Travis who moved up to a right wing position, the boys came up with some of the most perfectly "timed" passing attacks and power plays that local fans have had the pleasure of witnessing this season. There was just no stopping them as they stormed into Hawks' defensive zone with an invasion of high-power attacks that had Moncton completely disorganized.

Even when playing short handed, the Lamoureux-coached locals held the upper hand. While "Gentleman Phil" Vhale was sitting out a double minor in the first frame, Islanders pounded home two goals in the space of one minute and 55 seconds and added two more in the next three minutes and 43 seconds of play. Those were their markers that ran their count to five for the frame.

The most closely contested part of the game was in the sandwich session. At the start of that frame the Hawks made a really determined comeback in an effort to cut down Islanders' big lead. In the first five minutes or more of play they really carried the attack and goalie Hal Gordon had to look good to bar the door. It was a wide-open period of play with both teams having plenty of opportunities, and the shots on goal were high and very even. Colvin handled 14 on the frame and Gordon 13 with most of Gordon's stops being made in the first half of the period and Colvin's in the latter stages.

Goals still came off the sticks of hard pressing Island forwards however. Mac Beaton clinched the first at 4:25 and Danny Horeck tallied the second at 9:08 for the lowest period effort of the night. Fred Denny of Moncton wiped out Gordon's chances for a shut-out with only 12 seconds left in the frame. Denny had gone in on a break to fire a hard, high shot at Gordon that bounced off his right shoulder into the corner where Rod McKenzie centred it back out in front to Denny who potted it from close range while Gordon was down in an attempt to clear.

McKenzie got Moncton's only other marker also in the closing minutes, this time at the end of the third and final session. 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## Optimistic Report On Islanders Club Finances

President T. B. Rogers of the P.E. Islanders Hockey Club drove a wedge into current rumors concerning the shaky status of the Club's financial condition at a special meeting of shareholders held at City Hall last evening when he stated, "We have \$2,400 credited to our account right now, and by the end of the week we'll have approximately \$2,000 with all bills and expenses paid, including the week's salaries etc."

Presiding over the meeting, which was largely attended by enthusiastic hockey fans, Major Rogers explained that the meeting was called to offset current rumors regarding the Club's financial standing and to discuss other matters relating to the Club's affairs, such as ways and means of raising extra financial backing against possible slack periods in the future, and as he put it "something in the kitty for next season."

Summing up the situation President Rogers stated "we are a whole lot better off than probably any other team in the Maritimes, with the exception of maybe Halifax."

Referring to exhibition games with Sydney, Major Rogers said that the Millionaires will play against Islanders here on Thursday of next week, January 18th, and that the regular home game against Saint John Beavers on the following night, will be played at Amherst. The game will be sponsored by the Amherst Klansmen Club and

that the financial arrangement will be on a 75-25 basis, the same as if played in Charlottetown. President Rogers stated that the reason for the home game with Beavers being played in Amherst was because it was felt here that the hockey public can't afford more than two games a week. The other home game for that week will be on Tuesday with Halifax Saint Mary's as the visiting team.

As the result of wide discussion and many helpful suggestions being made by many shareholders at the meeting, a seven-man Ways and Means Committee was set up to work in conjunction with the Executive to inquire into the possibilities of the various suggestions, and if practical to set them in motion.

The committee, which was nominated from the floor and will elect its own chairman, is as follows:— Vernon L. McDonald, Charles MacArthur, Eddie Carroll, John Richard, Preston Hillier, Walter Lawlor and Bill DeCoste.

In answer to the question of Islanders playing in Boston, President Rogers stated that at the present time the only open date that Olympics have at the present time would not be suitable to the local club, but that the negotiations are still open for any possible change in open playing dates.

He stated however, that the exhibition game with Sydney Millionaires for the opening of the new New Glasgow rink will take place there on January 29th, as plans stand at the moment.
