# Prince County Game Ass'n Supplying Food For Huns

Concern continues for the welfare of partridge and other upland game, Norman F. MacLeod, secretary of the Prince County Fish and Game Association said last evening in announcing that the association is endeavoring to supply mixed feed and grit to anyone in the county who will make it available to these birds.

The association has decided against an earlier plan of dropping food from the air, as it is thought the food might be lost beneath the crust of snow, or might even fall in places where it might not be found by the birds. They decided that better results would be achieved by making it available to persons who were interested in helping the birds survive, and who might have flocks in their areas.

The feed being supplied by the Fish and Game Association is a mixture of government inspected wheat, barley and oats, and to this, grit has been added. The inclusion of grit is just as important as feed because the partridge must have grit in order to digest the food, and Mr. MacLeod suggested that persons who observe birds in the area might make grit, sand, or even ashes available.

During the course of the evening a spiritual bouquet was presented to Father Warren by the President, Mrs. Frank Williams from the ladies of the parish and then the President called on F/L Chappell, chairman of the R. C. chapel committee to add a few words of welcome.

## RECORD BUDGET

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)—Governor Averell Harriman Tuesday sent a record-breaking \$1,345,200,000 budget to the New York state legislature, and demanded tax increases totaling \$195,000,000. He called for state tax boosts of 31 per cent on personal incomes, two cents a gallon on gasoline and three cents on diesel fuel, 26 1-8 per cent on unincorporated business earnings and nine per cent on corporation profits.

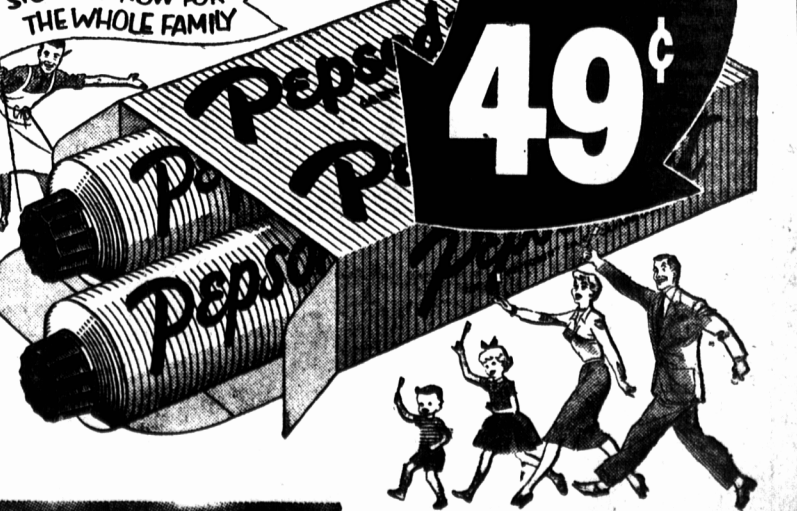
