

# Intermediates Tangle With Juniors In Series Deciding Game Tonight

The local baseball game of the 1952 season, pitting the Intermediate Abbies against the youthful Junior Abbies in the deciding game of the City championship will be played this evening at Memorial Field.

The big battle, that is expected to draw one of the year's largest baseball crowds, will get underway at 5:30 and will continue until the nine innings have been completed or the umpire calls the game on account of darkness.

Donnie MacLean, brilliant young pitcher, will start for the Juniors, announced coach Ev. MacNeill last night.

Coach Fred MacCabe of the Intermediates last night had not decided which of his three hurlers, Charlie Ryan, Merlin MacKenzie or Ev. Beagan would get the starting assignment.

The winner of this evening's game will have the right to meet the Summerside champion in the finals of the Island Baseball League. The Curran and Briggs Juniors lead that series three games to two over the R. C. A. F.

In their last round-robin series meeting the Juniors defeated the Intermediates 7-4 to keep their play-off chances alive. Since then both teams have defeated M. C. A. to eliminate the latter team and set the stage for this evening's decider.

Brian Lewis will be playing centrefield for the Juniors and Charlie Kennedy at second base. The only undecided spot in the Juniors' lineup is left field.

The Intermediates lineup will be the same as that of last Sunday if Charlie Ryan starts on the mound. If MacKenzie or Beagan start there will probably be one or two changes.

IN THIS CORNER

Visions of strong-armed Charlie Ryan, Merline MacKenzie and Ev Beagan's were dancing through Freddy MacCabe's head last night and will probably continue to do so today as the Intermediate Abbies coach debates whom he will send out on the mound tonight after the City baseball championship. One sports writer has already suggested the use of Ryan but coach MacCabe knowing that Charlie had worked nine full innings Sunday and that Merline "The Red Fox" is as tough to hit as anybody in the Province when he is right, has quite a problem to decide before this evening's game with the Junior Abbies gets underway.

Coach Ev MacNeill had no pitching question on his mind last night. Ev is going with his ace hurler, Donnie "No-Hit" MacLean, and MacNeill is secretly hoping that MacLean is as hot as he was the night he hurled his no-hitter early this season. Should the Intermediates get to MacLean then coach MacNeill will probably call on his relief artist Johnny Squarebriggs. The latter won the game for the Juniors with his relief pitching against M.C.A. last Friday evening. Sunday he pitched six and one third innings of relief ball in Dartmouth against the Juvenile Lions.

And so on the eve of this great baseball battle between the two Abbie teams for the City crown only about one thing can be said for certain about the pitching. It is going to be a battle of righthanders. Whether it will be the capable Charlie Ryan, who has only turned pitcher in the twilight of his career, the crafty MacKenzie, the unperturbable Beagan, the fireballing MacLean or the fuzzy-cheeked Squarebriggs who will emerge the pitching hero can only be decided on Aug. 1.

Since the first day of June the City teams have been looking forward to this day when a winner would be decided. In the first game of the season the Juniors defeated the Intermediates by an 8-7 score. 24 days later the Intermediates revenge this defeat by shading the Juniors 3-2. Last Monday evening the Juniors with their backs to the wall came up with three unearned runs to down their older brethren 7-4 to lead two-one in games.

This evening's game has all the color and intrigue that anyone connected with baseball could wish for. A seasoned performer like "Buck" Whitlock, who broke many a pitcher's heart, could again don the hero's mantle. A speedster like Wally Shephard could bring home the bacon with his base running. A 15-year-old youngster like Donnie MacLeod may hit with the bases loaded in the last inning and the score tied or a chatter-box like "Cuke" Pineau may pull off the fielding play that saves the game.

It will be a battle mostly of veteran performers with their power and cunning against the hard-driving, hell-for-leather Juniors. The Juniors were out on the field yesterday evening before the rain storm interrupted their work-out. # Cpl. Beatty And Cadet MacDonald Share Honors At Shoot Yesterday

Corporal W. M. Beatty of the R. C. M. P. and a 16-year-old Saint Dunstan's University Cadet Corps Officer, William MacDonald, shared the spotlight yesterday in the second day's shooting of the 89th Annual Prince Edward Island Rifle Association Prize Meet.

Corporal Beatty won his third match in two days yesterday morning by scoring a 96 in the City of Charlottetown Match. In this match 10 rounds were fired at each of the 500 and 600 yard ranges.

Nine marksmen tied for second place honors in this match with scores of 93.

Young MacDonald won the Rogers Hardware Co. Match in the afternoon by posting a score of 73 out of a possible 75. Lt. B. B. Jones and Capt. W. H. Hawkins placed second with scores of 71 in the match in which 15 rounds were fired at the 600 yard range.

Corporal Beatty still leads in the aggregate with a total of 362 points out of a possible 375. His nearest competitor is Sgt. T. J. Landrigan with 359.

This morning, as the match enters its third day on the Squaw Point range the MacDonald Tobacco Co. Match will be fired, seven shots at the 200, 500 and 600 yard ranges.

In the afternoon the W. K. Rogers Memorial Match (15 shots at 300 yards) will be held along with the third and fourth practices of the United Services Officers' Club matches. The third practise will be 10 rounds rapid fire (40 secs) at 300 yards and the fourth practise will be 10 rounds of snap shooting, three second exposure target from the 300 yard range.

should put up a struggle which baseball fans can't afford to miss.

Billy Harris, the New Brunswick baseball sensation, picked up his 17th league win in the Class B Florida League last week with a 1-0 triumph over the Havana Cubans. According to an article in the Miami Herald by Sports Editor Jimmy Burns, Harris is on his way to the major leagues and he may be up there within two or three years. So far this year Harris has pitched 204 1/3 innings and has allowed only 16 earned runs for an ERA of 0.73. In addition no team has ever scored four runs off him. Only one team touched him for three runs.

The Miami sports writer reports that Harris might have jumped to class A ball this year but his present coach talked the Brooklyn manager out of it. His trainer says that Harris is one of the best pitching prospects ever to come into the league and that his only visit to the training room is to pose for pictures. His catcher, Ed Little, who caught Bob Porterfield with Norfolk in 1946 thinks Harris is ahead of Porterfield when the latter was a rookie.

# Cincinnati Suffers Two Defeats As Luke Sewell Says Farewell

 Cincinnati Reds bid a baseball farewell to Luke Sewell tonight with two more defeats.

Sewell was the manager's helm for the last time and watched his lowly National Leaguers go down to a 4-3 and 6-1 defeats at the hands of Philadelphia Phillies. Sewell threw in the sponge Sunday and said he didn't want to stay with a club if he couldn't win ball games. The Reds were in there never a serious threat.

In other National League games St. Louis Cardinals beat Boston Braves 6-5, Chicago Cubs belted New York Giants 4-2 and Pittsburgh Pirates defeated Brooklyn Dodgers 7-1.

At Philadelphia, lefthander Curt Simmons turned in a nifty seventh pitching performance to win the first game 6-1. In the nightcap, Johnny Wyrostek blasted a ninth-inning single with the bases loaded and two out to drive in the winning run.

Young rookie righthander Steve Riddick fell short of winning the second game as he limited the Reds to three base blows in the first eight innings and appeared headed toward a 2-0 shutout.

Ted Kluszewski walked and Hank Edwards dropped a looping single into center field. With Eddie Pellagrini running for Edwards, Andy Semnick hit a homer into the upper leftfield deck to put the Red in front 3-2.

The Phillies—who had picked up one run in the fourth and added another in the fifth on Richie Ashburn's inside-the-park home run—tied it up in the ninth and then clinched the victory.

The Reds got a 1-0 lead over Simmons in the first inning but the Phillies went ahead in the second inning and finished strong.

Sewell left the field right after the game. Rogers Hornsby was named over the Cincinnati helm.

# Four Swimming Records Broken At Olympic Games

 HELSINKI, July 29 —(CP)— The epidemic of record-breaking broke out at the Olympic pool today and four swimming standards were washed out.

Canada now has a total of 30 points, compared with 35 at the 1948 games in London.

The United States sliced Russia's lead in the point standing by only three points today. Russia led with 514 1-2 against 440 for the United States.

The basketball round-robin tournament produced no upsets, the undefeated United States and Argentina winning handily. Russia, with only one defeat in the tournament, also won.

Scores of boxers won or lost as the big fields in each weight classification narrowed down.

Charlie Chase of Montreal won a decision over Andre Cuelite of France in the light-welterweight division. Len Walters of Winnipeg, opening-round winner yesterday in the heavyweight class, was defeated tonight on points by Giacomo Di Segni of Italy.

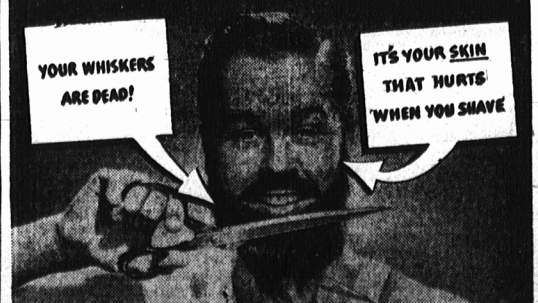
