The Temperance Resolution.

An adjourned caucus of members of parliament favorable to Prohibition is to be held to-morrow morning at 10.30 o'clock, immediately after which it is expected the Prohibition resolution will be placed on the order book.

When the question comes up to be voted on we trust that it will be remembered in the proper quarters that the Maritime Provinces expect their every man to do his duty.

It will be remembered that Messrs. Davies and Welsh expressed their intention of supporting a resolution ordering a plebiscite to ascertain the people's wishes in the matter.

Opium in Canada.

Very few are aware that opium is manufactured in this country. According to Harper's Bazaar, however, it is at Victoria and Vancouver, British Columbia.

The difference when the raw material is worked into a finished product is therefore very great, and the temptation to smuggle is in direct proportion to the profit.

TORONTO, May 7.—The paint manufacturers of Canada are organizing a combine it is already agreeing to terms to include several of Toronto and Montreal, and one at Halifax.

International Postal Convention.

OTTAWA, May 7.—The international postal convention opens at Vienna on the 29th inst. Some weeks ago a special invitation was sent the Dominion government that Canada be represented at the convention and acting upon this Sir Chas. Tupper has been designated to attend and take part for the Dominion.

To Take a Trip.

The steamer Arbutus has been engaged by the authorities of Acadia College, W. Riville, for a week, beginning May 20th. The College closes at that time, and it is the intention to take a class of about twenty students, under the control of some of the professors, for a trip along the coast in different directions.

A Child of Fortune.

Young Mr. Hazen, of St. John, is a child of fortune. He started out on his own merits, got himself made mayor of Fredericton, moved to St. John a year and a half ago, was elected M. P. for that city, and had the honor of voting the address. He is, moreover, handsome, and not long ago an old man, a mame-sake, left his fortune equally between the young M. P. and a lady. The latter thought she well of her condition she insisted on his taking the whole of the fortune and its management with a yearly allowance to herself, and thus does good fortune pursue the young man—World.

I Am Master!

DUSSELDORF, May 7.—At a banquet in his honor last evening, Emperor William made a significant speech, in which, after alluding to his desire for peace and for the protection of the rights of labor, and expressing satisfaction at the conduct of the commercial treaty with Austria, he said: "As to the home policy which is becoming established, I shall not deviate a hair's breadth from the course I have adopted. I alone am master in this country, and nobody else. His emphatic language in regard to the treaty with Austria, which Prince Bismarck opposes and so in regard to home affairs, was evidently directed at Prince Bismarck.

Expulsion of Jews Suddenly Cease.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 6.—The authorities have suddenly suspended the expulsion of Jews from Moscow. It is reported that there were disorders at Warsaw, on Sunday, which were suppressed by the troops. The agitation among the Russian Poles is spreading. Official circles here put the blame upon the conciliatory policy adopted by the Germans in Prussian Poland and believe that Germany's object is to arouse envy and discontent among the Russian Poles.

Death of Sir John Ross' Niece.

The Halifax Herald deeply regrets to have to announce the death of Miss Forey Buchanan, niece of General Sir John Ross, whose serious illness was announced in Tuesday's issue. The sad end was rather sudden owing to failure of the heart, though but little hopes were entertained of her recovery from the first, owing to heart and other troubles in addition to inflammation of the lungs. Her end was most peaceful, though she retained complete consciousness until a few minutes before her death. Miss Buchanan arrived here only a few days ago from England. She stopped at New York en route, where she was attacked by a gripple. She had not completely recovered before starting for Halifax. Sir John Ross will have the deep sympathy of very many citizens.

Ottawa Notes.

A large number of M. P.'s and Senators are laid up with la grippe, which appears to be quite epidemic in the Capital owing to the hotly weather here for the past three weeks. It snowed quite hard here on the 6th May and a good deal of frost since.

Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, though still painfully afflicted with paralysis, takes great interest in Parliament and attends regularly. The Equal Rights adherents in the House do not propose to take an aggressive part this session unless something unusual occurs. They will not challenge a vote unless the government re-introduces and presses the Northwest Territories Bill with the objectionable clauses relating to the dual language to which exception was taken last year.

Baptized with Rose-Water.

An American woman, an artist, who was lately married in Italy to an Italian Radical, who is also a Roman Catholic, writes to a friend at home: "At first, I did not have to be married in a Catholic church. I should not have liked it. You see, I am not sure that I have been baptized. My father and mother were Protestants, but perhaps they did not have me baptized, for we were out West; and, anyhow, I cannot get the documents to show that I was. When the priest who thought he had the responsibility of performing the marriage ceremony for an outsider came to see me about it, he begged me to tell him what words were said over me when I was baptized, and he solemnly assured me that if I had been baptized in rose water, he feared that he could not be the one to perform the ceremony. Imagine what he thought when I told him that perhaps I had never been baptized at all. I managed to keep my face straight when he talked of the rose-water, for it is generally supposed here that American Protestants baptize their children in rose-water."—Boston Transcript.

A Polished Scoundrel!

Youthful Preacher in Amherst in Disgrace.

AMHERST, May 6.—A very painful scandal has developed here which has caused much grief to a large number of citizens, especially the religious portion of the community and the congregation of the Amherst Baptist church. It seems that a young man belonging to Colchester named Staples though unordained, who had been Rev. D. A. Steele's assistant in the ministrations of the church during the past eight months, has completely broken down morally and is guilty of grossly immoral and deceitful conduct and has incurred in disgrace, besides leaving numerous debts unpaid. Up to within a short time ago he was shown a great deal of ability and devotion to duty and was much liked by all. He was known to be engaged to one lady here, but it turns out that he has been distributing matrimonial intentions in various other quarters and acting dishonorably and immorally. He became engaged to another and younger lady, who resides over the border line, who it seems he was in honor and duty bound to marry. The pastor and some prominent members of the church yesterday insisted emphatically that he should marry "number two." He resisted a long time, but finally consented. A license was procured and the marriage was to have taken place this morning. Matters were explained to the first lady, who immediately gave him up and said he was free to marry the other. When the time for the ceremony arrived it was found that he had taken the early morning train and left for parts unknown. His breaking down was not so sudden as was the denouement. The pastor and church grieve that a young man so full of promise should have brought to an end his term of service under such disgraceful circumstances, and destroyed brilliant prospects for the future. The church authorities intend taking action at once to prevent other communities from suffering from similar conduct on the part of this scoundrel.

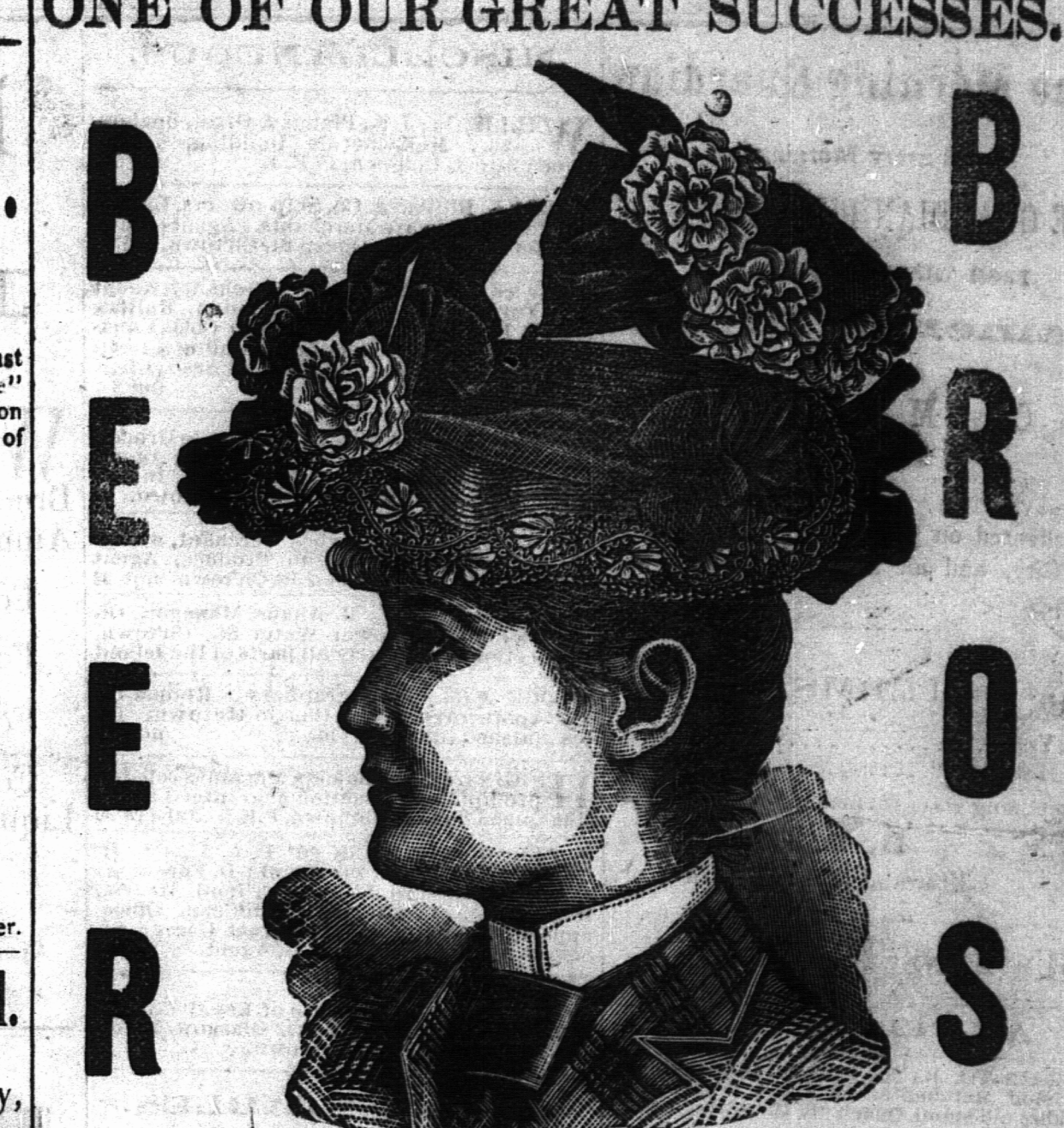

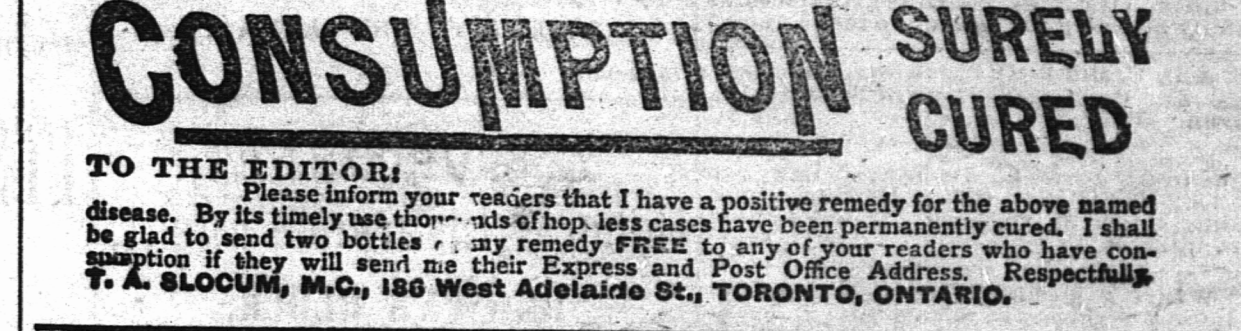
