Irish Emigration to Canada.

(From the Toronto Mail.)

By means of certain clauses in the Irish Land Bill, a strong effort is made to relieve the overcrowded districts of the Green Isle; first, by furnishing machinery for the reclamation of waste lands, thereby increasing the habitable area; and second, by initiating a scheme of national emigration.

The proposal of the Minister of Agriculture is to the effect that a national emigration association, with an adequate organization, should be formed both in the United Kingdom and Canada, to promote systematic emigration from Ireland to this country, where settlers will be provided with free grants of 100 acres of land, subject only to a patent fee of £2 sterling.

The task of giving practical effect to the emigration clause, and of supplementing Government aid by public contributions in urgent cases, has been patriotically undertaken by Mr. Arthur Kavanagh, M. P., an eminent authority on Irish questions.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. THE CENSUS.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, July 30.

The population of the Dominion of Canada, according to the second Canadian Census, is as follows:

Prince Edward Island, one hundred and seven thousand seven hundred and eighty-one (107,781). Nova Scotia, four hundred and forty thousand five hundred and eighty-five (440,585). New Brunswick, three hundred and twenty-one thousand one hundred and twenty-nine (321,129).

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, July 28.

The French Catholic Bishop of Massua and four missionaries who were on a tour of inspection of the Catholic missionary stations in Abyssinia, were captured by the natives, who pillaged and burned the church and mission house, robbed the prisoners of their clothes and sent them into the interior.

LONDON, July 28.

A Tdnia despatch reports the French have occupied Djerba.

LAHORE, July 28.

Sixteen hundred men, under a son of the Khan of Lalpoor, are marching to the Ameer's aid. Ayoub Khan, left Karachi Safeed, 20 miles from Girishek, suddenly on the 20th inst.

LONDON, July 28.

The English resident at Kourak denies, on the authority of the governor of that province, that 119 men and girls were shut in a barn for refusing to work and were burned to death by a mob.

The committee report on the Land Bill was finished and the third reading fixed for Friday.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs that the Ameer of Afghanistan has been totally defeated at Karez, Atia. All his baggage and 18 guns were taken. A Khatel regiment and his Candahar horse deserted to Ayoub Khan. The Ameer's general fled towards Cabul. Sirdar Shamsuddin is still at Candahar with 400 Cabules and some police.

In the House of Commons to-night Mr. Gladstone read a telegram confirming the report of the defeat of the Ameer.

The Telegraph says: "The defeat of the Ameer of Afghanistan implies the complete overthrow of the only remaining representative of British influence in Afghanistan."

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, July 28.

The State Department has telegraphed Minister White to use every effort to have Wm. Brick, of South Manchester, Conn., discharged from the custody of German officials, and it is believed that by this time he has been released.

Secretary Windom has instructed the chiefs of Divisions of the Treasury Department to hunt up the laws bearing on the shipment of explosives, etc., and the Collector of Customs at Boston, whence the infernal machines and combustibles are said to have been taken, will be instructed to examine the manifests of the cargoes of the two vessels that carried to Liverpool the dangerous materials referred to. It is believed that by an examination of the manifests of the two vessels a clue may be obtained that will lead to the apprehension and punishment of the guilty persons.

NEW YORK, July 28.

A new torpedo boat, which successfully works under water, has been built here by an inventor named Holland, who is believed to be a Fenian. The boat is thirty-one feet long, six feet in diameter, cigar-shaped, driven by a propeller, and makes six miles an hour under water. She was built by the Delamater Iron Works, and is now at Bergen's wharf, Jersey City. Everything in connection with her has been kept secret, but it has been ascertained that two wealthy Irishmen of Philadelphia are the owners.

ST. PAUL, July 28.

A contractor named Goodall has been arrested and confined for threatening to assassinate Gov. Pillsbury in Minneapolis. He is insane.

A By-Law to Encourage New Industries in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. All applications for exemption of new industries from taxation shall be made by petition to the Mayor and Council, such petition to be signed by the person, company or corporation presenting the same, and to contain full particulars of the new industry sought to be exempted, the amount of capital proposed to be invested therein, and the amount to be paid yearly for wages, and the tax or taxes from which exemption is sought.

2. Every such petition shall be accompanied by proper proofs that the advertisements required by law have been duly inserted, and no application shall be considered by the Council until after the expiration of fourteen days from the date of the last publication of such advertisements.

3. The Council on such application may exempt such new industries from taxation or from any particular species of taxation.

4. In case such application is contested, the Council may adjourn the hearing thereof from time to time, should they think fit but not more than one application by any new industry shall be made within the fiscal year.

5. No exemption will be granted to any new industry which does not propose to expend yearly at least the sum of five thousand dollars in wages.

6. Any false statement or suppression of facts contained in any petition so to be presented as aforesaid shall absolutely annul any exemption and the tax shall be collected as if the same had never been made.
