Will Seek Proclamation Of Tunisia As Republic

TUNIS, Tunisia (Reuters)—Political observers here agreed unanimously today that Prime Minister Habib Bourguiba will ask the country's constituent assembly next Thursday to proclaim Tunisia a republic. Their prediction followed Bourguiba's announcement Monday night that the assembly would meet Thursday to discuss "the form of the Tunisian state."

Bourguiba made his announcement after a five-hour meeting of the political committee of the Neo-Destour party, which won Tunisia its independence from France. The meeting was held to discuss the fate of the 76-year-old bey of Tunis, Sidi Mohammed Lar'ne, whose family has ruled Tunis for 250 years and who will be deposed if Tunisia declares itself a republic.

Bourguiba himself is expected to become president, with greater powers than he now holds as premier. (In commenting on the news today, the right-wing Paris newspaper Aurore says "it is certain that the new regime imposed on Tunisia will be closely related with those authoritarian republics of the Middle East—Egypt and Syria—whose intransigence towards the Western democracies, and whose excessive ambitions concerning their mission as leaders of the Moslem world, are well known.")

PRINCE CHARGED The crisis between the palace and the party came to a head last Saturday when the youngest of the bey's three sons, Prince Salaheddin, was arrested on charges of trying to knock down a palace police inspector with his car. The young prince was later formally charged with the attempted murder of the police officer.

In a broadcast last week, Bourguiba said the government was prepared to seize all ill-gotten gains acquired through abuse of power. He remarked that the bey's family would not be exempt from any cleanup campaign. In point-of-fact, the bey's influence on his country's politics has been insignificant in recent years. But his throne and family have periodically been under fire by Neo-Destour leaders. The country has a population of 3,600,000, only 240,000 of whom are European.

She was fortified by the last rites of the Catholic Church of which she was always a true and faithful member. The funeral was held from the Charlottetown Funeral Home to Kelly's Cross Church where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Reverend James Smith. Present in the Sanctuary were: Reverend Martin Monaghan, Reverend Bernard Gillis, Reverend Charles McCarthy, Reverend Louis Callaghan, Reverend Eugene Murray, Reverend Leo Herrell and Reverend John Kelly. Burial was in Kelly's Cross cemetery. The pall bearers were: Louis McPherson, Morrison McLean, John McDonald, William Coady, William Cullen and Cyril Egan.

All that was mortal was then laid to rest in the place buried, overlooking the shining waters of Victoria Harbour, Crapaud Cemetery.

Expansion Pace Seen Slowing

MONTREAL (CP)—The forces which created the Canadian boom of the last two years have diminished, the Bank of Montreal says, but are still felt as the economy enters the second half of the year. The bank says in its July business review it is becoming evident the pace of expansion is much less rapid than a year ago. In some industries sales continue to have leveled out. In others they tilted downwards.

This, coupled with higher unemployment, would "command close attention in the months ahead." Expansion continues, however, and the biggest factor remains the "huge and still rising" volume of money invested in new plants, equipment and housing.

The bank says the total value of work put in place this year may reach \$8,775,000,000, topping official February estimates by \$245,000,000 and last year's spending by \$78,000,000.

INFLATION EVIDENT The inflation which characterized the volume of investment is still evident, it says. Thus, the Bank of Canada has maintained its tight money policy. Consumers pay 3.2 per cent more for goods and services than they did a year ago in "impressive evidence" of inflation. The consumer price index stood at 121.6 at the beginning of June. Prices of 1948, the base year, equal 100.

Further evidence of inflationary pressure was to be found in Canada's trade balance. Home demand for materials and equipment raised the level of imports while exports rose only slightly.

The deficit was largely offset by the influx of foreign capital into Canada, said the bank. Foreign money continued to pour in, especially from the United States, because of high Canadian interest rates.

Output and employment were significantly higher than a year ago and 1957 would probably be a record-breaking year in nearly every major sector of the economy, the Bank said.
