Shatters Hopes Of Calmer Course At U. N.

By Francis W. Carpenter PARIS, Nov. 22 (AP) — Russia today put before the United Nations a charge that the United States Mutual Security Act is aimed at building up subversive activities against the Soviet Union and other Communist countries.

In a brief letter to Secretary-General Trygve Lie, Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky advised the U. N. Assembly Russia would press its charge. This shattered the faint hopes held by many delegates that the Russians might pursue a calmer course at this assembly.

The Russian move came just a day after the Soviet press published a note Russia handed to the U. S. Congress in Moscow charging the Security Act violates a 1933 agreement between the late President Roosevelt and Russia's Maxim Litvinoff.

The agreement was part of the deal by which the United States and the Soviet Union established diplomatic relations. Each country agreed not to interfere in domestic affairs of the other.

The Russian note charged the Security Act adopted by the last U. S. Congress provided funds for subversive activity against the Communist countries "by persons or armed groups."

The State Department tonight denied the act was intended as a weapon against the Soviet Union and said the Russian note came with "singular ill grace" from a country that has supported "subversive activity against the U. S. and other nations of the free world."

The Soviet communication to Lie now goes to the 14-member steering committee of the General Assembly. It has power only to recommend whether the assembly should consider it.

Vishinsky is due to speak to the 60-nation political committee Saturday on the Western power disarmament proposals.

The latest Russian tactical move came a few hours after Britain's Minister of State, Selwyn Lloyd, appealed to the Russians to accept in good faith the Western disarmament plans as an honest start toward arms limitation.

Commons Approves 5-Day Bank Week

LONDON, Nov. 22 (Reuters) — The average Briton eats nearly one pound of vegetables a day, Food Minister Gwilym Lloyd George disclosed in a parliamentary reply today. He said on an average each person consumed 242.2 pounds of potatoes and 109.3 of other vegetables during the year which ended last June 30.

Hint At New 'Bombshell' In Mystery Doctor

VANCOUVER, Nov. 22 (CP) — The Vancouver Daily Province says today in a front-page story that a new "bombshell mystery" may explode in the case of Ferdinand Waldo Demara Jr., the navy's pseudo-surgeon.

The possibility that Demara, discharged from the navy yesterday and now in custody of immigration authorities, was still withholding his "true" name from Canadian authorities was mentioned by the Province.

The newspaper said that doctors question the story that a non-medical man could have performed the feats of surgery credited to Demara while serving as a lieutenant-surgeon aboard the destroyer Cayuga in Korea.

Commons Approves 5-Day Bank Week

OTTAWA, Nov. 22 (CP) — The Commons today adopted a bill authorizing banks to operate only five days a week, leaving them free to remain closed Saturdays.

The measure now goes to the Senate for three readings.

Papal Acceptance Of Scientific Theory

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 22 (CP) — The Pope today accepted the "well-founded deduction" of modern science that the world was created about 5,000,000,000 years ago.

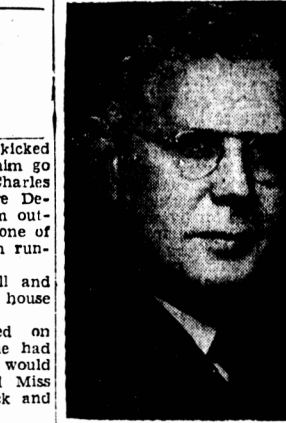
In what was believed to be one of the most scientifically-learned speeches ever delivered by a pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church, he declared that modern science had led to the conclusion that the world was created by God.

He addressed scientists attending an international conference. The Pope said the existence of God, "so essential to the life of every man," receives confirmation by "every deepening and progress in scientific knowledge."

Modern science, said the Pope, has followed the course and direction of cosmic developments in the past and future, pointing to their beginning in time some 5,000,000,000 years back.

The Pope said "creation took place in time. Therefore, there is a creator, therefore, God exists! Although it is neither explicit nor complete, this is the reply we were awaiting from science."

Is Re-elected



LINDSAY, Ont., Nov. 22 (CP) — Premier Frost (above) tonight thanked the voters of Ontario for returning his Progressive Conservative Government to office.

In a statement following the announcement of his party's victory in today's general election, Mr. Frost said: "The people have given the government a strong mandate to carry on. This carries with it the responsibility to do a good job, and to this we shall devote all our efforts."

"I thank the people of Ontario and particularly the people of my own riding." Mr. Frost was returned in Victoria riding, which he has held since 1937, with a heavy majority over Liberal candidate Edward Harding.

Many Injured In Toronto Blast

TORONTO, Nov. 22 (CP) — Between 50 and 100 persons were injured today when an explosion shattered a window as they watched firemen fight a blaze at Tilly's Dress Shop.

The injured suffered cuts. Three firemen and five others were taken to hospital with injuries as a result of the explosion, second of two blasts which rocked the store. Firemen said the explosions may have been caused by plastic materials in a cellar plastic-button plant.

Missing Plane Located; Two Men Reported Safe

HALIFAX, Nov. 22 (CP) — Two men have been sighted beside a civilian Norseman aircraft that made a forced landing on the northern coast of Quebec Sunday, the R. C. A. F. reported here tonight.

The Air Force said a Lancaster bomber dropped supplies to the pair today. It was planned to drop gasoline tomorrow, to enable the pair to fly the plane to Fort Chimo, destination of the plane on the shore of Ungava Bay, about 50 miles northwest of Goose Bay, Labrador.

Earlier, it was reported Pilot Len Grant of Roberval, Que., was the only occupant of the plane which failed Sunday to make its scheduled hop from North Ring Lake to Fort Chimo in bad weather.

There was no indication of the identity of the second man. Grant apparently put the plane down on an isolated lake far from Chimo when he found his fuel supplies running low.

The U. S. will be involved in war on the Chinese mainland. Frost Government Is Returned With Increased Majority

TORONTO, Nov. 22 (CP) — The Ontario Progressive Conservative Party today scored a general election victory of landslide proportions. The Liberal Party, with representation reduced from the last Legislature, will replace the C. C. F. as the official opposition.

The Socialist C. C. F., which held 21 seats in the last House, was almost wiped out. Its leader was defeated and indications were that the party would have a maximum of two seats.

This was a much more violent reverse than the party suffered in 1945 when eight members were returned. It won 34 seats in 1943 in its first serious bid for political power in Ontario.

In re-electing Premier Frost's Government, the voters rejected the strong bid of Walter C. Thomson, Liberal Party leader who suffered personal defeat in Ontario constituency.

The list of C.C.F. losses was lengthy: E. B. (Tel) Jolliffe, provincial leader for nine years, was defeated in York South. Agnes Macphail, C.C.F. stalwart, lost out in York East.

With one seat to come, the Progressive Conservatives had gained (Continued on Page 5 Col. 4)

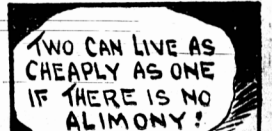
