CURRENCIES
MONTREAL (CP) - The U.S. dollar closed Thursday at a discount of 3/4 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, up 1-32. Pound sterling \$2.71 5/16, up 1/8.

MONTREAL
MONTREAL (CP) - Prices were generally higher in quiet trading Thursday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.

The pipelines were strong. Interprovincial was up 1 at 46, Trans-Canada advanced 1/4 at 28 and Trans Mountain gained 1/2 at 11.
Up 1/2 in the banks were Toronto-Dominion at 5 1/4 and Commerce at 5 1/2. Montreal lost 1/2 at 52 1/2.
In the base metals Asbestos gained 1/4 at 35 1/4, Hudson Bay was off 1/4 at 58 1/4 and Noranda was up a point at 52.

Up 1/2 in the papers were Ablett at 37, Great Lakes at 38 and Howard Smith at 37 1/2. In the utilities Brazil lost 1/2 at 6 1/2 and Bell gained 1/2 at 42.
Up 1/4 in the steels were Argus at 27 1/2, Dominion Foundries at 38 1/2 and Stelco at 68.
The construction issues were higher with Canada Cement up 1 at 13 1/2, the mines and oils were irregularly higher.
The closing averages show banks up .17 at 57.47, utilities up .1 at 149.2, industrials up 1.6 at 292.4, combined up 1.2 at 244.7, papers up 3.2 at 454.3 and gold unchanged at 79.90.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) - The stock market moved ahead Thursday with the exception of golds, for the second straight session.
The market, however, missed the leadership of New York, closed for the Thanksgiving holiday.
On index base metals and western oils were ahead almost three-quarters but golds were off a decimal point.
Senior mines were generally quiet among base metals. Noranda added 1/4 at 51 1/2 and Hudson Bay was ahead 1/4 at 58 1/2. In the golds Kerr-Addison gained 1/4 at 19 1/2 and Hollinger, 1/4 at 28 1/2. The section lost several issues dipped to 15 cents.
Western oils moved up as 1/4 gains went to Pacific Petroleum, at 17 1/2, Pembina, at 9 1/2 and Home A, at 18. Central Del Rio and Bailey-Selburn each added 15 cents.
Sapphire Pete added 32 cents at \$1.01 to lead speculative issues. Speculatives, however, were quiet.
Index changes: Golds off .01 to 83.90; base metals up .60 to 172.65; western oils up .70 to 133.23.
