RAILWAY PARTY.—Mr. Geo. E. R. Jackson, President of the Maine Central Railway, and a party of fourteen friends are visiting the Island. They are staying at the "Revere."

Y. M. C. A.—The delegates who attended the Convention at Moncton are expected to report at the meeting to-morrow (Sunday) afternoon, at 4 o'clock. Friends are cordially invited to attend.

LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS.—The Nova Scotia Glass Co., New Glasgow, have just placed an order for 10,000 boxes to pack the goods of their manufacture. This means the cutting up of some 250,000 feet of lumber. The company are pushing their works forward and they confidently anticipate being able to make glass Monday week. The crucibles have just been set.

THE Rev. Geo. Granville Bradley, master of University College, Oxford, and chaplain-in-ordinary to the Queen, has accepted the Deanery of Westminster Abbey. Mr. Bradley, who is in the sixtieth year of his age, was educated at Rugby, from which school he was elected to an open scholarship at University College, Oxford, when he was a favorite pupil of Dean Stanley, who at that time was a tutor.

THE letter received by Senator Howland from Senator Carvell, which the former sent to the editor of an obscure city paper, has been made the text of an ill-written letter dated from 'King's County' and signed "Liberal-Conservative," in yesterday's issue. It is only fair to Senator Howland to say that no one will credit him with the authorship of the letter referred to.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT ST. JOHN.—Hilyard's mill, on the Straight Shore, St. John, was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon. The fire was caused by an arch of the furnace giving way. The building was of wood and burned rapidly. The mill was a two-gang, worth from \$30,000 to \$40,000 and gave employment to one hundred men and boys. It was insured for \$10,000, divided as follows:—Queen, \$5,000; Commercial Union, \$3,000; Liverpool, London and Globe, \$2,000.

A SAD END.—On the evening of Thursday last Hugh McGillivray, a young man belonging to Bailie's Brook, Pictou County, N. S., was found dead at the door of Mrs. McFhee's house, near the Railway Station, on Monday. McGillivray was addicted to drink for years, and during the present summer seemed to give way to it altogether. When last seen alive he was in a state of intoxication, and evidence brought out at the inquest leaves little doubt that the liquor which caused his death was obtained at the house above named.—Eastern Chronicle.

LOOK OUT FOR HIM.—Alex. Vander Haver, who has been passing himself off as a Catholic priest, and who was lately arrested in St. John and sent back to Halifax for stealing \$300 from a Mrs. Mooney, has been discharged from Custody, the complainant not wishing to prosecute. Officers of the Missouri Penitentiary went to Halifax to secure the rascal's extradition (he having once escaped from that institution) but they changed their minds in the end, and effected a compromise of some sort. Vander Haver left Halifax on Tuesday, and it is more than likely he will resume his swindling operations in the Lower Provinces. Look out for the fraud.—Times.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

Official bulletin, 8 30.—The President slept the most of the night; has taken liquid food by the mouth at stated intervals and in sufficient quantity so that emetics has not been renewed. No modification of patrotid swelling is yet observed. His general condition is much the same as at this time yesterday. Pulse, 106; temperature, 98.5; resp., 18.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25. Executive Mansion.—At 9 o'clock to-morrow Secretary Blaine sent the following despatch to Lowell, Minister, London:—

The President has lost ground to-day; some of his symptoms this afternoon and evening are of the gravest character. The condition of the swollen gland and of the pulse and temperature suggests serious and alarming complications. His mind at intervals has been somewhat beclouded and wandering. His strength fails, but he still swallows liquid food of a nourishing character, and apparently digests it. On this one fact rests the hope that is left of a reaction.

Private advices over the associated press wire from Washington indicate that no worse is feared. These having access to the President's chamber appear to be dazed and will say nothing. It is quite evident that some new and alarming change has taken place.

A Washington special says the President yielded without remark to the decision of the Council against his removal. He resigns himself, but the effect on his spirits could be noticed and gives him a view of his real condition never before presented to him. Mrs. Garfield took upon herself the onerous task of telling the President that his earnest wish must be denied. He received the decision calmly and without a protest but tears could not be wholly restrained. She saw in it very plainly another evidence that her husband's hold on life was too frail for experiment of any kind.

Executive Mansion, 10 p. m.—Although no information can yet be obtained directly from the attending surgeons, it is understood that the President's eye has taken an unfavorable turn this evening, and that the swelling parotid gland throughout which the pus is now forming in small cells or pockets, threatens immediate dangerous consequences, unless a favorable change takes place within the next 24 hours, the worst is apprehended.

Executive Mansion, midnight.—Soon after the evening bulletin was issued the attending surgeons began to notice a change for the worse in some of the President's symptoms. He became more restless than he had been during the day. His pulse grew more frequent until it reached about 120 beats and he began to be subject to hallucinations with regard to his circumstances and surroundings. Most of the time he seemed rational, but at intervals, especially just after waking from sleep, talked incoherently and did not seem to be conscious of his condition. An examination was made of the inflamed parotid gland and its appearance gave reason to apprehend serious consequences. Little more could be done for it, however, than to continue poulticing and general method of treatment adopted yesterday. During the evening the patient slept a little but was very restless, and awoke at short intervals. About 10 o'clock his pulse began to subside and he seemed to be passing into a quieter condition. At this hour his pulse has fallen to 112 and he is asleep. There has, however, been no marked change in his general condition and it continues to be a subject of the gravest anxiety.

Rumors are afloat that a general anti-rising is being organized against the Boers. Additional precautions have been taken in the larger towns.

A telegram from Birmingham states that a basket left at the Midland railway station on Monday by two men, who immediately decamped, was found to contain a large quantity of gunpowder and cartridges. It has now transpired that the explosives were intended for shooting-galleries on the race courses. They were consigned under a false description to evade extra payment for the transit of explosives.

It is reported that Tisza, the Hungarian premier, has officially warned the provincial authorities, to guard against secret Pan-Slavic agitation in Hungary.

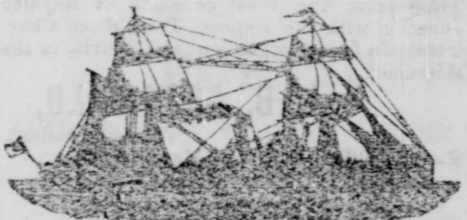

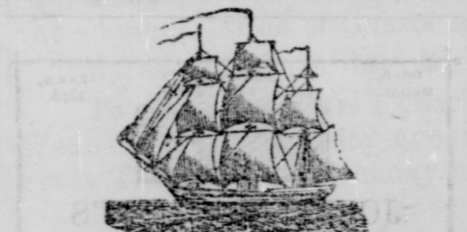
