The Golden Jubilee of the Provincial Exhibition founded in 1889 will commence with the opening night in the Pavilion Monday evening, August 14th. No doubt there will be some present who attended the first opening but they are few. One who will be a guest of the management is Alexander Kennedy, Southport, who has attended every Exhibition including 1889. Dr. J. M. Nicholson has a very vivid recollection of the first Exhibition particularly of the races, and with his retentive memory can give many interesting details. It must have been a proud night for the founders when they opened the doors of the Main Building that late September evening fifty years ago. They had good reason to be proud of their judgment in selecting the site, planning the buildings and carrying the Fair through to a successful conclusion. Other brains and other hands have been carried on through the years by secretaries A. B. Warburton and Charles R. Smallwood, and the last ten years J. W. Boulter.

Great changes have come about in fifty years and Exhibitions or Fairs have changed with them, but it has been the endeavor of the different managements to cater to the public with a pleasing program every year, having in mind that the great purpose of the organization is the improvement of live stock, agriculture, industry and the benefitting of agriculture and industry. In this respect the Fair of 1939 will perhaps excel all others as a larger Prize List is given and greater efforts taken to interest more people to become competitors. That that campaign has been successful is shown by the thousands of entries that are piling in to the Secretary's office. It is a rash thing to make predictions, but we believe we can confidently state that this year will see the greatest number of entries ever known in the history of the Provincial Fair.

Just to take the horse section of the Prize List for instance, Yesterday Raoul Raymond of Southport, handed in no less than 23 entries, and we could name many other exhibitors who have large entries. Horse accommodation has been increased by the construction of a new barn but even then it will be difficult to house them all.

The Main Building, always a bright and attractive spot, will be even more so this year and the Flower Show to which Lieutenant Governor George D. DeBlois has contributed \$10,000, will be a particularly pleasing feature. Florists from the three cities will vie with each other last year in making attractive exhibits, stimulated by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor's awards. Our advice is that exhibitors will be even better with a larger number of entries. In all sections of the Main Building increased entry lists are looked for.

Things are humming at the Exhibition grounds now, with carpenters building dressing quarters for the vaudeville troupes which will come here, whose personnel number 39, including the orchestral band—but not the bears. These quarters were very urgently needed and will make a much more comfortable for the performers. Other construction work is a new barn for horses and repairs to two large cattle barns and renovating and painting and will be made as attractive as other years.

Bill Lynch's big Midway will arrive early Monday morning, August 14th by a special trip of boat and train and will be all set up Monday evening. It will have all the popular former features and some new ones. Bill Lynch's Midway has made a reputation for itself and offers from large cities in the eastern United States and Canada have been made to him but Bill believes that as the Maritimes have treated him well he had better stick here.

Race horse entries closed with Secretary J. W. Boulter, Saturday, and there is a whole of an entry list with some on the way that will add to it. They are coming from all parts of the Maritimes and Maine too. Such a galaxy of speed is not foregathered on any track in the Maritimes for many years. Norma Shearer and Clark Gable score personal triumphs in their latest co-starring roles in "Idiot's Delight," which opens an engagement of two days at the Prince Edward Theatre today. Brought to the screen by Hunt Stromberg, this Pulitzer prize-winning play by Robert Sherwood is an improvement on the stage original. Sherwood wrote the screen play and has taken full advantage of the greater range of the camera. Clarence Brown has directed one of his finest.

A capable supporting cast includes such notable players as Edward Arnold, Charles Coburn, Joseph Schildkraut, Burgess Meredith, Laura Hope Crews and Skeets Gallagher. Each of them gives a distinguished performance. Laurels also were bestowed on a group called "Gable's Glamour Girls," including Virginia Grey, Paula Stone, Lorraine Krueger, Bernadine Hayes, Joan Marsh and Virginia Dale.
